## Safety Head Urges Periodical Auto Checks

"Is your car accident prone?" E. C. McFadden of Dallas, Vice-President, Employers' Casualty Company and President, Texas Safety Association, Inc. asked that question of Texas drivers today, and he warned them that they could not answer it accurately if they had not had their cars safety checked recently.

McFadden spoke in behalf of the vehicle safety check program which is recommended by the Texas Safety Association, Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

"It is the civic duty of every driver to see that his car gets a complete mechanical check-up," McFadden said, "because a car in unsafe mechanical condition is a menace to the community."  
He added that only a check of the 10 major safety points by a qualified mechanic can give a car a clean bill of health. He listed the 10 points as follows: brakes, headlights, rear and stop lights, tires, wheel alignment, exhaust system and muffler, windshield wipers, glass, horn, and rear-view mirror.

In addition to periodic professional checks, McFadden advised drivers to check constantly for obvious danger signs such as loss of brake efficiency, excessive tire wear, unsatisfactory windshield wipers.

"At the first sign of trouble," he said, "the conscientious driver will have the necessary repairs made. Such foresight can save his own life and the lives of others."

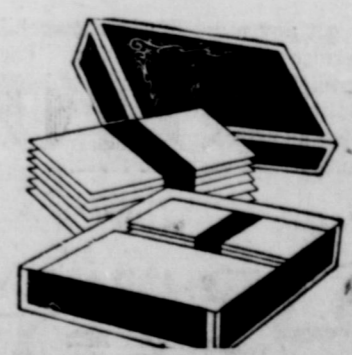

**Trained Student Drivers Get 10% Insurance Cut**

The recent announcement by the Board of Insurance Commissioners, that effective May 1, 1955 liability and collision insurance premiums for students under 25 who have successfully completed the accredited driver education course sponsored by schools and colleges, will be reduced ten percent, was viewed with satisfaction by E. C. McFadden, Vice President of Employers' Casualty Co., Dallas and President of the Texas Safety Association.

Savings for boys from 14 to 25 might amount to as much as \$110.00 over the ten-year period during which rates are the highest. Parents of a girl would realize a profit of \$91.00 over the ten years when daughter drives the family car, if she has had the state approved course in driver education in her high school program.

The reduction in rates is based on statistics which show that youth trained in such courses are not as accident-prone as others in the same age bracket. Schools sponsoring driver education programs are certifying to insurance companies that students have had courses and qualify for reduced rates.
