LIQUOR STORES CLOSED Another Ranger Wet Vote Called by Court

The five retail and the one wholesale liquor merchants in Ranger were ordered by the Liquor Control Board to stop selling alcoholic beverages this week.

Lloyd Owens, Abilene district LCB supervisor, and three companions visited each of the firms Tuesday afternoon and informed managers of the decisions in Austin.

Owners quietly closed their doors upon receiving orders from the enforcing officers.

All stock will have to be removed from the stores and all signs taken down. No deadline was set, but Owens used the term, "A reasonable length of time."

Coke Stevenson Jr. state LCB chief, placed the call to Owens in Abilene after consulting with Attorney General Waggoner Carr's office.

It was originally thought that the dealers would have 30 days to close down, but Owens explained that this is the case only in a local option election when voters decide to go "dry" but it is not the case in the Ranger situation.

Legally, one observer noted, then Ranger has never been wet, since the March 23 election was nullified.

Inspectors Charles Dudley, A. B. Smith and Clyde Crain accompanied Owens.

Qualified voters in Ranger will go to the polls once again to decide whether intoxicants will be legally sold in the city limits of the town.

The County Commissioners Court Monday called the election for Saturday, July 20, at the usual hours of 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

The court made two changes. A new election judge was named and site for the election was moved. A. H. Powell will be election judge when the voters go to the National Guard Armory, west of town, to cast their ballots.

Proposition will be: "For the legal sale of intoxicants for off - premise consumption within the corporate limits of Ranger."

And "Against, the legal sale of intoxicants for off-premise consumption."

Results of the last (March 23) wet vote, which carried

by 11 votes, was declared null and void by Judge T. M. Collier in 91st District Court in Eastland last week. Judge Collier ordered the County Court to re-set a date for the issue.

Commissioners Glenn Justice of Carbon made the motion to call the vote and Buck Collins of Rising Star seconded.

It was a compromise session with the commissioners because during the day-long meet Monday, they heard requests from both the wet and dry groups regarding the election judge and the site for the election.

Both the announced judge and the site were compromises decided on by the court.

Members of the Eastland City Commission met with the Court to discuss the possibility of a county teletype system.

They were told that such a unit would cost the county \$90 per month, which would include installation and repair services. The units are provided by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Earlier in the day, Sheriff Lee Horn told the Court in his opinion such a unit would not be worth the \$80 to his department. The possibility of joining with several county towns for the unit was discussed. No action was taken on the matter.

The Court also read a letter from the Huckabay School District in Erath County asking the County to help with road repairs from the Fambro Ranch west to Eastland.

A motion asking for the withdrawal of an earlier notice of appeal was filed this week by Attorney Frank Sparks in behalf of the contestees in the case. Notice of appeal had been given after Judge Collier's ruling.

Then, too, food dissatisfaction is brought about when the patient cannot receive the type of food desired because of a particular illness.

Meals at the Eastland Memorial Hospital are prepared by the capable hands of Mrs. Doris Lewis, Chief dietician, and her staff, Mrs. Lorene Black, Mrs. Lillie Brown, Mrs. Ruby Cavanaugh, Mrs. Viola Guthrie, Mrs. Lulia Hazard, Mrs. Ottilie Kernell and Mrs. Rowena Hall.

They are indeed faced with a chore to prepare food for a large group of people and especially so when they are hospitalized patients, ill and in most instances, unable to eat as they normally would.

AT HOSPITAL

It becomes more of a task with the many and varied diets that are required for various illnesses. Upon being admitted to the hospital, the patient will specify the type of diet that his patient is to receive. It may be a bland diet, soft diet, salt-free diet, regular diet or another depending upon the type of illness.

Hospital dietitians and cooks must compete with home cooking, restaurants and other commercial food services and still supply the proper nutritional and therapeutic requirements. The foot trays must be attractively arranged to appear inviting and be delivered to the patient at a precise time.

Breakfast is served at the local hospital from 7:15 to 7:30 a. m., lunch at 11:30 a. m. and dinner at 4:30 p. m.

Today's hospital dietary departments are staffed with highly trained personnel under the direction of professional dietitians dedicated to the welfare of those they serve.

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Ground Control Important In Screwworm Cases

Ground control, immediate treatment of all wounds regardless of cause, if of major importance in the screwworm eradication program at this time.

County Chairman Oscar Schaefer said today that it is that time of the year when screwworm cases normally begin a rapid increase and cautioned all livestock producers to be even more alert in their checking for possible worm cases.

"The screwworm will be eradicated by your constant vigilance," Schaefer said. He advised livestock producers to treat every wound, regardless of cause, including those from castration, sheep and hog shearing, wire cuts, and other approved materials. These include EQ335 or five percent Korlan as smears or five percent are recommended for use on all surgical cases, he added.

Schaefer listed the use of .25 percent of Co-Ral or .5 percent Korlan as sprays for control of livestock pests.

He further suggested that all livestock be checked at least once each week, and more often if practical, for screwworm signs.

He emphasized the need for even better reporting of all worm cases and the importance of taking worm samples from every infested wound.

"Be extra observant of all new livestock brought onto the farm or ranch," he concluded.

The school was organized in 1905 about four miles west of Cisco and operated until it was consolidated with Cisco in the 1930s.

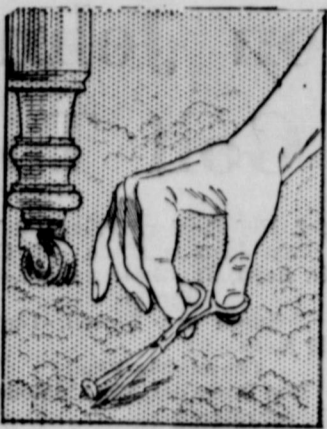

Safety Tips . . .

PROTECT YOUR FOODS FOR JULY 4th HOLIDAY OUTING

The great American holiday — the July 4th weekend — is almost here again.

For millions of American families it will be a fourth year. And for almost every family the long holiday weekend will bring at least one family picnic.

The July 4th picnic is as traditional in America as the hot dog — which often is a main staple of the picnic lunch. Even the flies and the

ants have a big time at picnics.

But now and then picnics end in tragedy — the tragedy of food poisoning. Most foods spoil quickly in hot weather and away from refrigeration. If there are a few staphylococcal bacteria present, they need only a few hours of time and a warm temperature to grow rapidly. Some foods can become poisoned in as little as five or six hours on a hot day.

There are some easy and simple ways to avoid food poisoning on a picnic. One valuable item is a good portable icebox. Chill the foods thoroughly in the refrigerator at home. Use plenty of ice. Make sure the lid is tight. This will keep your perishables fresh.

Take along the sandwich ingredients in the original wrappings and containers and make up your picnic lunch on the spot, just before mealtime. Take the ham in a sealed can and open it at mealtime. The same applies to mayonnaise. Keep the boiled eggs and potatoes separate in the ice box, and mix the potato salad at the last minute.

Stick to canned foods and sealed jars and bottles that can be opened just before serving. Be careful about pies

and cream-filled bakery items. They spoil very fast on a hot day. Fresh fruits keep better and will make good desserts.

It's actually not very difficult to insure safe picnic meals. Just follow your home practice of refrigerating those foods that need it. If you make up a hamper of sandwiches, load it into your hot auto trunk, head for the beach, and eat many hours later — well, you're asking for trouble.

Johnson's winning birdie, his sixth of the match, ousted Powell, 1-up, after the young school teacher had fashioned pressure birdies on holes Nos. 17 and 18 to extend the match. When the bout ended on the 19th hole, Johnson was 5-under par and Powell 4-under. Johnson picked up six birdies and only one bogey in his two swings around the course. Powell had six birdies, but he had two bogeys. Neither bogied on the final 10.

On the final hole, Johnson scooped his approach to the green, then chipped on, leaving himself a 22-footer for a par. Powell's approach shot was short and 25 feet away but the scrappy Weatherford teacher knocked it into the hole and throw the match into overtime.

Johnson's tee ball was 60 yards short of the green on the 300-yard extra hole but he whacked a low iron shot five feet from the pin. Powell's approach was some 23 feet short and he was not strong enough on his birdie putt.
