





Dear Fellow Texans:

The new Cold War Veterans GI Bill to extend educational and on-the-job training opportunities to 4 1-4 million Americans who helped k e e p the Free World's guard high in this Cold war has gone to the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee f o r

Thirty-one Senators joined me sponsorship of this proposal which shows that there is national recognition of the program's val-

Some 200,000 Texans would be eligible for schooling or specialized training under the bill. It passed the Senate 57 to 31 last session but died in the House Veterans Committee.

Today, time and events dictate even more strongly the passage of this program for these reasons: (1) It is a matter of individual justice, because only about 46 percent of our young men serve under current draft procedures; leaving the 54 percent who do not serve with a head start in the economic struggle unless these veterans are furnished some educa-

tional training. (2) It is a matter of national economiic benefit, for it assures that some 4 1-4 million men wiill have a chance for professional or technical training that will in-OUR CHOICE EACH SUNDAY crease productivity and minimize serious, heavy unemployment a-

ong those who are untrained. (3) It is a matter of national ecurity, for it will greatly improve the attitude and morale of men called to service.

In the years immediately ahead, this nation must move forward on all educational fronts. We cannot afford to overlook the value of established programs that have proved out well, from the standpoint both of the individuals concerned and of society as a whole. And that is the kind of program we have in the Cold War GI Bill for here we can point to positive accomplishments and results from our past dealings with the veterans of this nation.

In enacting the two previous GI bills, for veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict, the Congress wisely provided two of the most farsighted, beneficial programs ever known to any society or government. In education alone the two previous GI bills gave the nation 450,000 engineers and 180,000 doctors and nurses. It provided training for more than 150,000 physicists, chemists a n d other scientists. About 230,000 teachers - - our most sorely needed trained human resource - - now very short supply - - are now available because of these bills.

But the college trained profesionals constitute only a part of the national dividends that will accrue from this measure. Equally important are the technicians and skilled workers who will be produced by the training in schools below college level - - on-the-job and on-the-farm training. These types of training, which will be pursued by almost half of the perons expected to seek training under the Cold War bill, are more important than ever before.


