That's the opinion of Catherine H. Smith, an occupational health nursing consultant for Employers | Wis., which Miss Smith represents, Mutuals of Wausau, Wis. She gives this as the reason:

Husbands, for the most part, work in a plant atmosphere of continuous "good housekeeping." Industry has learned that housekeeping is vital in preventing accidents. Most employers make every effort to have employees leave and non-toxic spot-removers and for home at the end of each day's work safe and sound.

You may be startled by some statistics offered by Miss Smith. Did you know, for example, that for every worker killed on the job, two are killed by accidents off the job? In other words, a man is twice as safe on the job as

he is at home! "Death punches no timeclock!" asserts Miss Smith. "Industry's efforts are cancelled out if the vigilance is not continued throughout the remainder of the day in the home. That's why an accident prevention program in the home is every bit as important as accident prevention in the plant. Many a home is fairly teeming with accidents in the making."






