Eight Week Study of Area Geology to Begin

Dr. L. F. Brown, Jr., assistant professor of geology at Baylor University, Waco, will begin an eight-week period of intensive geologic mapping and field investigation in northern Eastland County on July 18. Brown is on the teaching and graduate research staff at Baylor University.

Brown was on the research staff of the Bureau of Economic Geology, The University of Texas, Austin (Texas Geological Survey) from 1957-60 as a specialist on the surface geology of North-Central Texas. His studies of the rocks of the Cisco group, Pennsylvanian age, in the Brazos and Trinity valleys, North-Central Texas. The projects resulted in publication of several scientific reports.

The Eastland County survey is supported by the Bureau of Economic Geology, the Graduate Research Committee of Baylor University, and Messrs. Virgil Seaberry, Jr. and Guy Quinn, Sr. Brown is donating his time and services; the other supporting groups and individuals are helping with the expenses.

The purpose of the study is to obtain detailed geologic data about the surface rocks of northern Eastland County and prepare and publish a geologic map and report containing description of

the strata. Such information is important in the future long-range economic planning and growth of the area. Clays, building stones, limestone, gravel and sand are but a few of the features to be mapped. The work will be fundamental scientific work but will provide the county with information for industrialization and economic planning.

The project will require considerable walking to trace rock beds through the county. Therefore, access to the land is most important to success of the project. The study will require only observation of the rocks by walking across the area at regular intervals. Permission is always requested and care is exercised in closing gates and caring for private property. No matches or firearms are ever carried on private property. Brown will drive all of the roads of the county during the survey; he will be driving a black pickup truck (ford) with "The University of Texas" on the doors. Help and support of the people of the county will be greatly appreciated and insure maximum coverage of the area. Brown will be headquartered at the Village Hotel.

The study will probably not be completed until the summer of 1962, and publication of the report will take an additional year or two. Completed reports will consist of colored maps of the geologic formations and other illustrations, as well as text. They will be available at cost through the Bureau of Economic Geology in Austin.

One of the aims of the camp was to give campers experience in the practice of democracy; the camp organization was such that small groups could plan and carry out their own programs through use of the patrol system. Livestock Auction Report

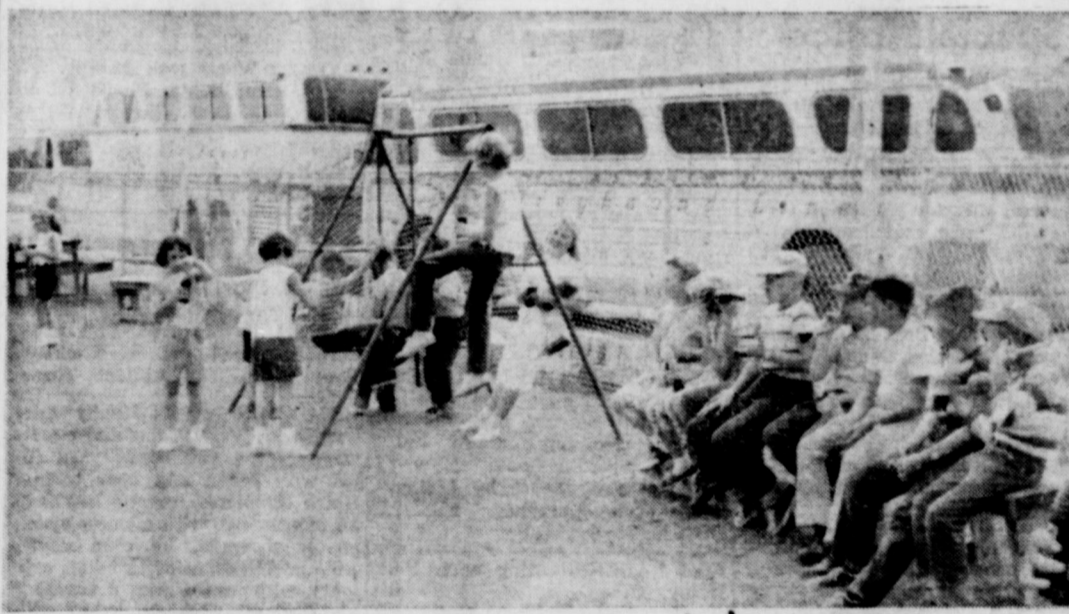
A total of 317 sellers and 96 buyers were on hand Tuesday at the Eastland Livestock Auction Co. sale.

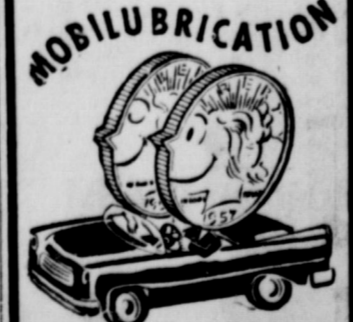

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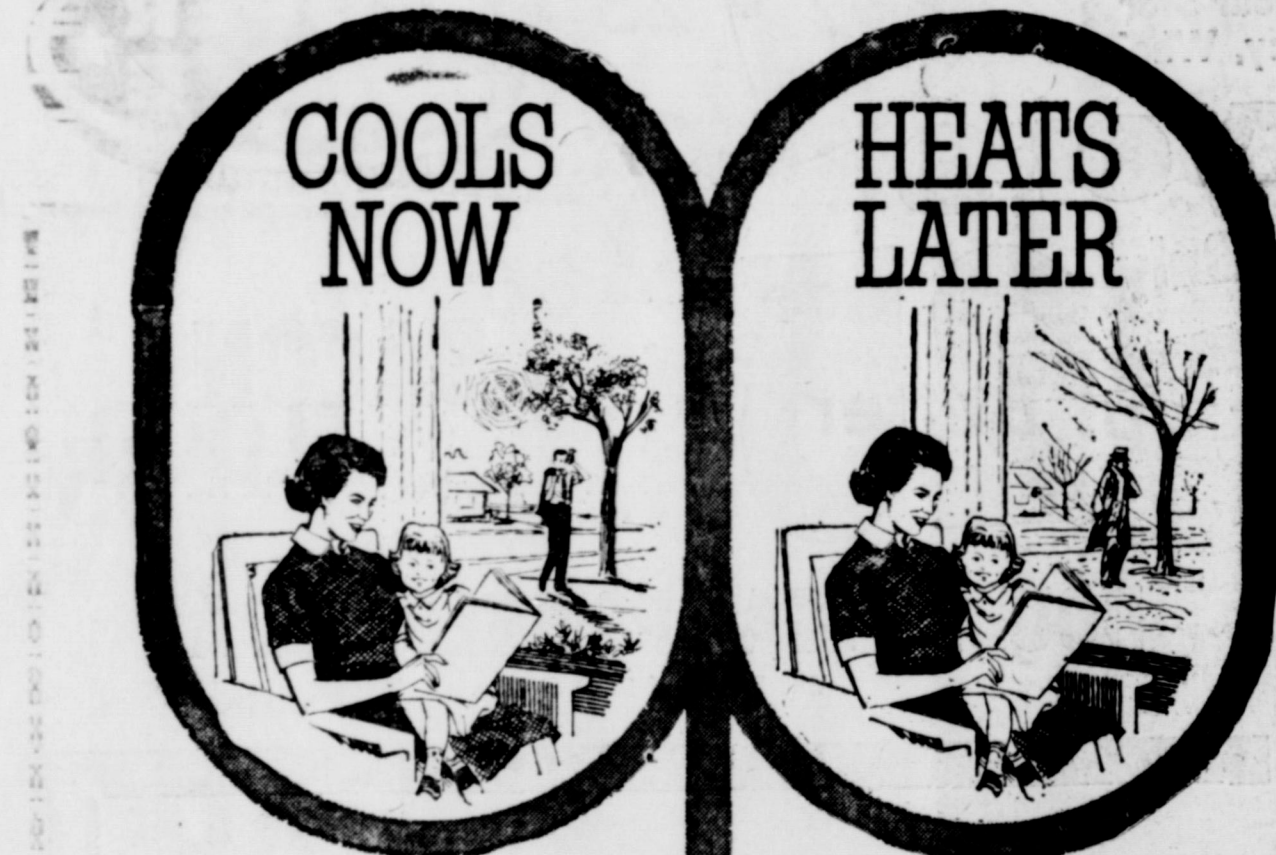
