### Life on Board Ship Is Peaceful, Perkins Finds

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles written for the Telegram by Joseph M. Perkins who is now on a world tour.)

We have just finished breakfast and I am settling comfortably in a deck chair on B deck after ascending from E deck in one of the ship's electric elevators.

Before me, as far as I can see, lies the blue Pacific calm and peaceful with no ships in sight. Now and then a bird skims over the white caps, probably hundreds of miles from any land. I have sighted only one ship at sea since leaving Los Angeles six days ago.

In the dining room we are seated at a table for eight, including the ship's doctor, two ladies from Australia, an old gentleman from New Zealand and stragly enough, a young lady college student from Sudbury, Mass. born and reared within five miles of our summer home. She and Emily have many friends in common. At a nearby table there is a man and wife with two young children, a boy of six and a little girl somewhat younger. After leaving Hawaii this family became seafaring, all except the boy, and he came to the table all alone for several meals.

The ORIANA docked at Honolulu in mid-forenoon on Monday and as it did not sail until midnight the passengers had most of the day ashore for shopping and sightseeing. We took a bus tour lasting about three hours and visiting points of interest with frequent brief stops. I was favorably impressed with Hawaii. Honolulu is a clean, modern city that is growing rapidly with its beautiful location on the volcanic island—where mountains are its background and its foreground is the sea. It appears to be a land suitable for homes in limited I predict that before many years all of the good building sites will be gone. We saw the land upon which Henry Kaiser is starting a huge land development project including a palatial hotel, cottages, golf course and even a private yacht basin connected with the sea by a walled channel.

Last evening there was held in the ship's ballroom a Deck Gymkhana, followed by dancing. This was a form of popular entertainment new to me and I found it interesting. It consisted of a number of contests on the part of volunteers, both men and women. One contest required the six contestants to flit pancakes (or reasonable facsimiles thereof) over a horizontal bar set at about four feet above the ballroom floor. While the pancakes were in the air the contestant had to duck under the bar and catch the pancake on his plate. It was a hilarious sport.

The winner of each trial was entered in the final contest and his nationality was announced. Since there were many contestants, some from the United States, Canada, England, Australia and New Zealand, this added considerably to the interest. Another stunt of a somewhat similar nature attracted even greater interest. Six ladies were lined up, each with a stick about two feet long and one inch wide, and with a colored inflated balloon about ten inches in diameter. At the starting signal of "Ready, Set, Go!" each attempted to herd the balloon forward a distance of about 30 feet and deposit it into a bucket. This had to be accomplished entirely with the use of the stick and if the balloon was allowed to touch the floor the contestant had to return to the starting line and begin again.

This was a very exciting and spectacular display of skill and final winner was a young lady from Australia. "I am writing this in by air-conditioned state room while listening to sweet music which is piped all over the ship and can be heard by merely turning a switch at any time from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. Last night while waiting for the dining room doors to open, the elderly gentleman, who sits to my right, and who from now on I shall refer to as "The Old Timer," told me some interesting things concerning Australia, where he has lived for 81 years. He said that his mother left England at the age of 13 and made the trip to Australia in a sailing ship which took six months. His parents were real pioneers and he is now an old man quite alone in the world. He travels extensively and is very active. Yesterday he entered the gentlemen's Deck Quits Doubles, and upon losing he lamented the fact that his partner was "a young chap with no experience."

We crossed the equator at 6:30 this morning and are due to pass close to Canton Island at 2:20 p.m. The air temperature is 78 degrees and the water is 82 degrees.

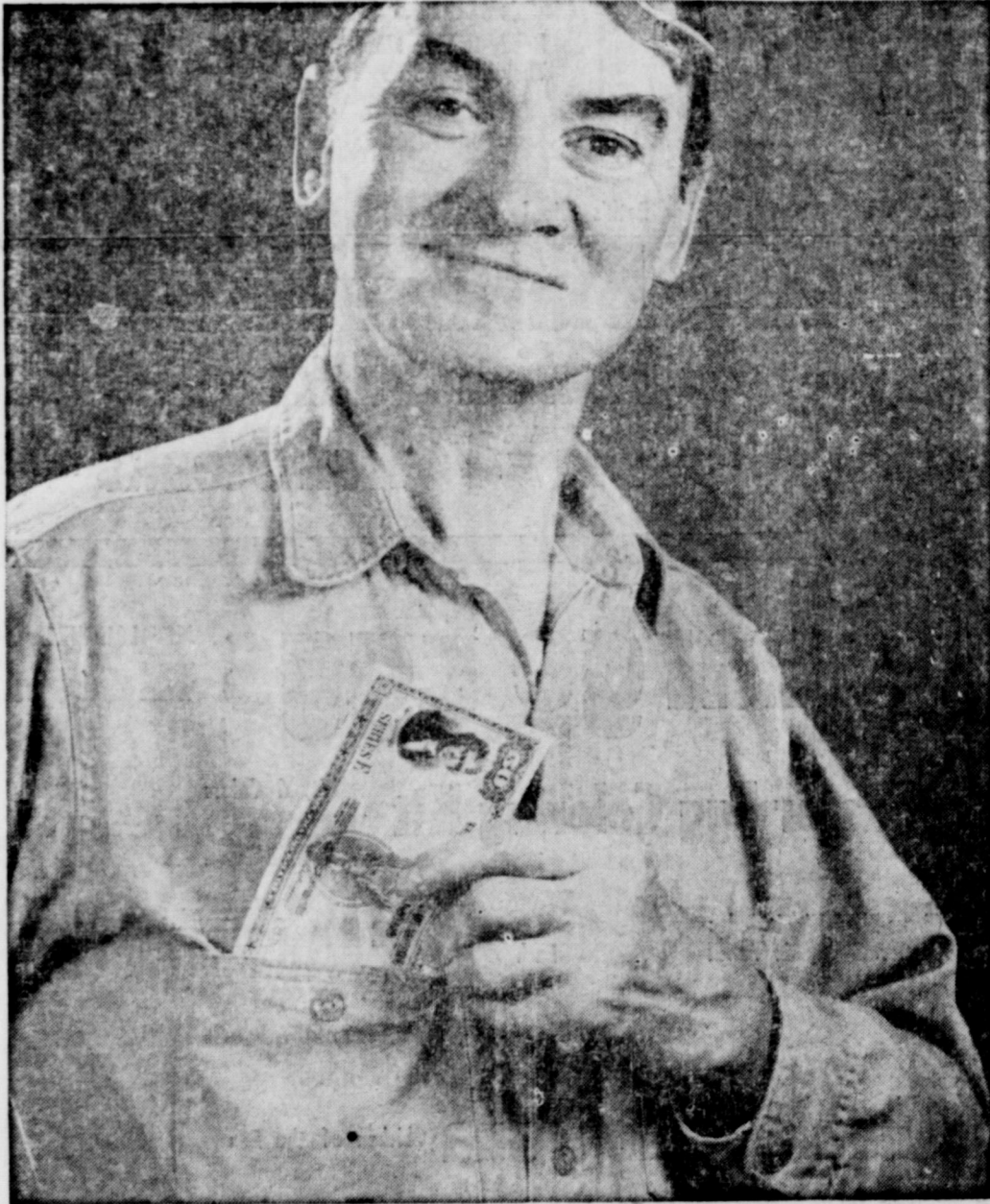

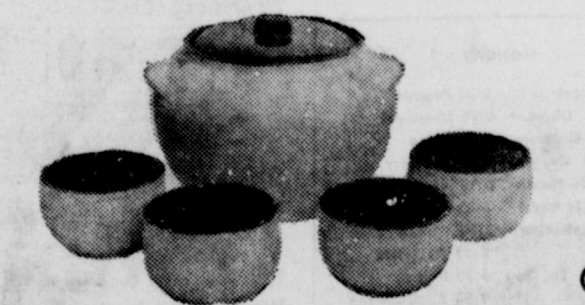
