County Pecan Show Attracts 248 Entries

The Eastland County Pecan Growers 9th Annual Pecan Show, held in Ranger December 8 and 9, was termed a big success by officers of the Association. A large number of people visited the two-day show, where 248 entries and 25 improved varieties, plus seedlings and natives were judged Saturday by a team of judges from College Station.

Winners of the Eastland County show will be entered in the state show January 5 at College Station.

The Eastland County Association was organized in December 1956 with 29 charter members. The Association now has over 200

members, the largest membership in the state. Eastland County has the honor of staging the first Pecan Show in the state and also holds the honor of having the first State Pecan Queen. Eastland County Queens have won three state contests.

Hank Sims of Eastland, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, in commenting on the show this year said that Ranger is the friendliest and extended the warmest welcome to exhibitors of any show that he has ever attended. Oscar Schaefer of Cisco, past president of the Association, said that more enthusiasm is shown by Ranger people in producing the show than any in past years.

McMinn Guilty; Given Sentence Of One Year

M. L. McMinn of Olden was found guilty of failing to stop and render aid at the scene of an automobile accident and was sentenced to one year in jail by a 91st District Court jury Wednesday.

The verdict was returned at 9:15 p.m.

The incident occurred March 25, 1960 between Eastland and Olden on Highway 80.

Homer Hopper died as the result of injuries sustained in the accident.

McMinn was indicted in June, 1960 by the 91st District Court Grand Jury.

H. L. Strawn of Sonora, investigating highway patrolmen, testified that blood and hair samples which he took from McMinn's pickup were later found to match those taken from the deceased Hopper.

Frank Sparks represented McMinn and Earl Conner, District Attorney, prosecuted the case.

TRAFFIC REPORTS
December is the holiday month. It's the last month of the year—and has the distinction of being considered one of the most dangerous on streets and roads.

Motorists are being urged to drive especially careful during this holiday season. There are youngsters darting across our streets, and more traffic in general, what with the hurry-scurry for shopping and holiday visiting.

Five people have already died in Eastland County this year as a result of automobile accidents.

During the first eleven months, another 74 people were injured.

The month of November compared with July in highway tragedies.

Two were killed and six were injured last month. In July two were killed and 13 were injured.

In addition to the lives and suffering from injuries, the cold dollar and cents loss has been great. In the first 11 months, \$84,144 loss was reported in property damage.

Last month, \$7,225 was reported by Sgt. J. O. Tanner of the Texas Department of Public Safety office in Eastland.

There were 11 accidents in November, bringing the year's total to 126.

The new year might hold a brighter outlook, at least for the first month, if it compares with the present year.

January was the best looking month of 1961 because only two accidents were reported, with no fatalities and only three injuries.

Property damage amounted to \$1,300.

A third of this month is gone. On Dec. 31st will the records show that in fact, December is the most dangerous month of the year?

It's pretty much up to you.

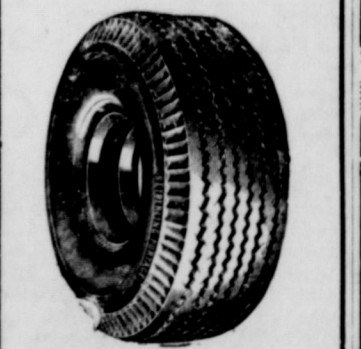

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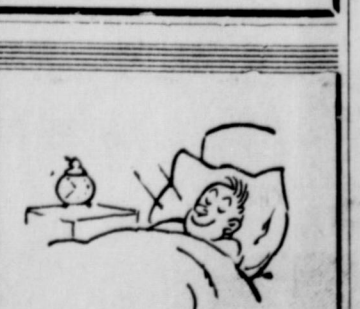
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WET NOVEMBER

Rainfall in Eastland Has Topped 31 Inches

Eastland had 2.67 inches of rain last month which was exactly one inch above the average for November.
The dampness last month brought the total rainfall for the year to 31.55 which is already beyond the 25.83 average for a year, and it looks as though December will might be a wet one.
Rain fell in measurable amounts on four days in November, with 1.04 being recorded on the 2nd.

It was the wettest November since 1957.
Temperatures ran the range from a low of 23 on the 23rd to a high of 83 recorded on the second and the 27th.
Driest month this year was August when only .05 was reported, and June was the wettest with 7.63.

Cotton Producers To Vote Tuesday On Market Quotas

Area cotton producers will vote on Cotton Marketing Quotas for the 1962 crop Tuesday, Dec. 12. In more than two-thirds of the farmers voting over the nation approve marketing quotas, penalties will apply on farms having excess cotton acreage in 1962 and price support will be available to co-operators within the range of 65 to 95 per cent of parity—the ex-

act level is to be announced later. If marketing quotas are not approved, there will be no penalties on 1962 crop cotton and price support to co-operators will be at a rate equal to 50 percent of parity. Allotments will be in effect regardless of votes. This is a vote on marketing quotas only. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. at the following places: Smith Chevrolet Co., Gorman; Collins Insurance Co., Carbo; Roach Motor Co., Rising Star; and the A.S.C.S. Office, Eastland.

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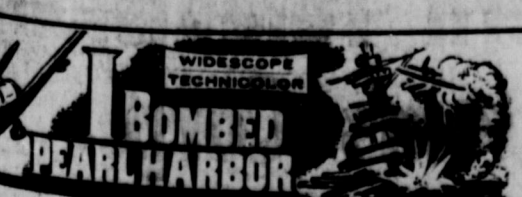

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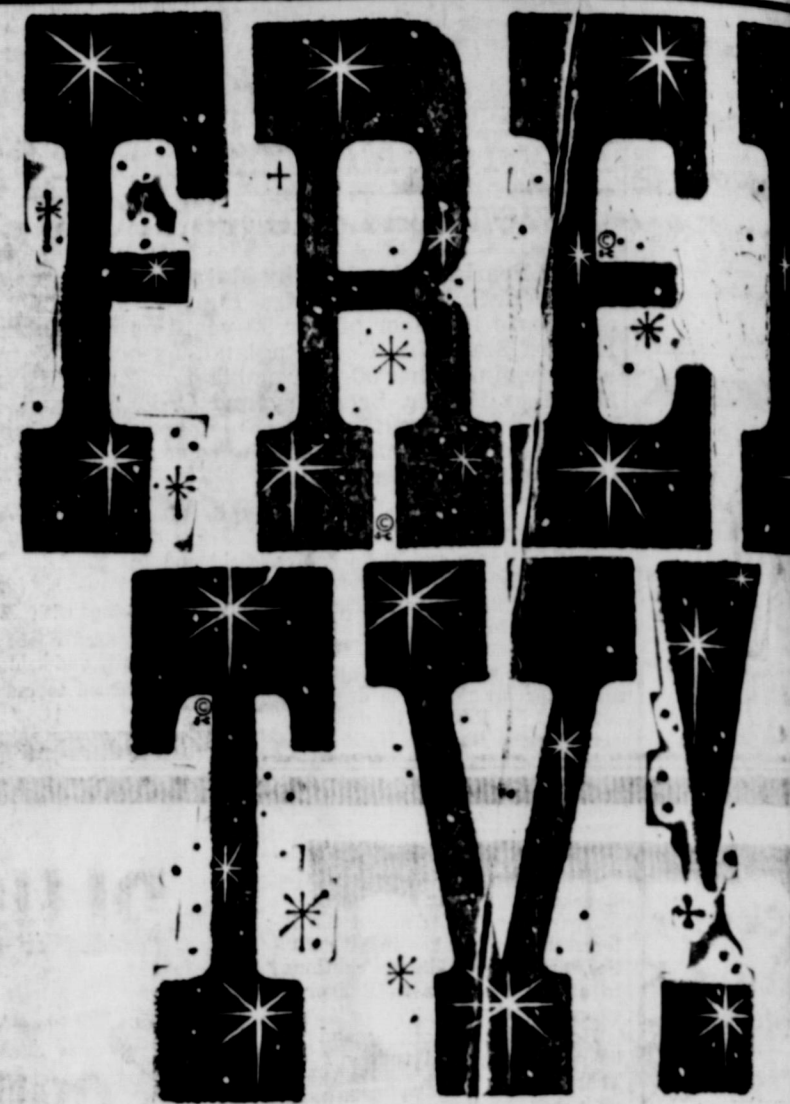
