



## Obituary Of A Building

The roaring crescendo and the screech of ripping timbers now mark the death throes of the old edifice that has served as a bulwark for the southeast corner of the city square for sixty-two years. The present owners have learned with regret that the condition of the foundation makes impractical its renovation. Therefore, its days are numbered.

But let us go back to the beginnings.

In 1911 District Judge E.A. Hill saw the urgent need for a hotel to accommodate the jurors and other business visitors to the county seat. Even from Gorman it was an overnight trip. Forthwith Judge Hill bought the lots from J.W. Hatcher and contracted for the erection of the building.

It was completed in the summer of 1912 and named The Charlotte Hotel in honor of the Judge's daughter Charlotte Hill.

Without delay the P.L. Parker family moved in and became the

first managers. Guy (Pete) Parker recalls that he and his brother Don, both young boys at the time, served as "chamber maids". The plumbing consisted of a large bowl and pitcher in each room but no running water. Consequently many times a day the boys carried water from the underground cistern at the southeast corner of the courthouse to the hotel. The town water supply was drawn up in buckets by rope and pulley from four large cisterns—one at each corner of the courthouse.

In 1915 the management changed hands and the O.P. Morris family assumed the duties of running the hotel. It was during the years between 1915 and 1919 that it flourished and became famous for the delicious meals served in its dining room under the direction of Mrs. Morris.

In 1917 the McCleskey well in Ranger blew in and for the next three years, needless to say, the hotel prospered beyond all imaginings. Men would pay almost any price for a place to sleep and food to eat. The small lobby and spacious dining room were filled to capacity day and night with oil men, promoters, men hunting royalties and leases, drillers, rough necks, adventurers and drifters, all looking for the main chance to get oil-rich.

Hundreds of big "deals", were made in the cramped lobby and over the dining room tables.

Joe Perkins, a young geologist from Massachusetts, was one of the lucky ones who had a room there. He made it the center of his operations and later after the boom decided to stay in Eastland and put down roots.

He now resides at 1021 S. Seaman St. His wife, Emily Gleason and fine family have greatly enriched the life of our community.

Walter Gray, the father of Joe Gray, the present district clerk, lived at the Charlotte before his marriage and many others found a pleasant shelter there.

When the fabulous oil bubble burst the Charlotte went into a rapid decline. In the spring of 1921 the restaurant was closed and the fixtures sold.

Ernest Halkias, owner of the Majestic Cafe, bought the building and made a rooming house of the second floor. After a few years when the reputation of the rooming house became tawdry the second floor was closed and the ground floor was leased to a series of various businesses.

Mrs. D.L. Haule had a hat shop there. The Witttrups, Ed and Katherine, ran a flower shop for several years. Then after they moved away James Dabney set up a photography studio.

Among the last tenants was Carl Timmons who operated a machine shop. Thurman Electric was the last occupant.

The sturdy old landmark has now reached the end of its career, but there are many who will remember with fond nostalgia the Charlotte as the place where the action was.

The good people in our offices will be doing their usual good job, and "keeping the store" in our absence. We look forward to going - and coming home.

There'll be 20 in our group, made up of newspaper people from throughout the state. Cities we're scheduled to visit include Amsterdam, Holland, Zurich and Lucerne, Switzerland, Moscow, Leningrad and Kiev, Soviet Union; East and West Berlin, Germany; and Madrid, Spain.

We go in humility and covet your prayers that good might come from the undertaking.

## Total Of \$66,653.19 Distributed Between School Districts In Eastland County

A total of \$66,653.19 is being distributed between school districts in Eastland County to be used for building improvements or retirement of bonded indebtedness, County School Supt. O.L. Stamey has announced.

Mr. Stamey and members of the County School Board have worked out arrangements and money is being distributed on the basis of scholastic enrollment, he said.

The money comes from the sale of permanent school fund bonds, the interest on which has been distributed yearly, but under recent legislation, permission was granted to sell the bonds and distribute the principal.

The money will be divided this way:

Carbon-\$3,103.57  
Cisco-\$19,579.31  
Eastland-\$16,746.56

Gorman-\$6,727.81  
Ranger-\$12,080.87  
Rising Star-\$5,894.65.

Neighboring, but out-of-county districts will get funds too, because of scholastics picked up from this county in consolidations.

Cross Plains will receive \$1,395.59 for enrollment in the Scranton and Pioneer areas; DeLeon will get \$1,020.64 for Desdemona area students; and Lingleville will get \$104.19.

Jerry Pruitt of Cisco is chairman of the county board and in a recent meet the board and Supt. Stamey expressed their appreciation to Mr. I.C. Inzer, Eastland member who has served as chairman for a number of years, but who asked to be replaced this year.

Mr. Ross Wilson has been named to the board. Other members are George Steel of Rising Star and Luther Fanbro of Ranger.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — A flood of Mexican aliens, estimated at more than a million a year, is pouring into Texas, according to a new Texas Good Neighbor Commission report.

More than half the illegal entrants cross the Rio Grande into Texas. Good Neighbor Commission said the number of such entries is greater than the total number of immigrants who entered the U.S. legally from all the countries of the world.

Last year, the GNC noted, 575,000 deportable Mexican aliens were found in the U.S., and immigration officials figure one escapes for every one apprehended. Sophisticated smuggling techniques aid the crossings.

Immigrations have a social and economic impact in virtually all regions, since the aliens move on to metropolitan areas all over the U.S. in search of better jobs and safety from arrests.

Top AFL-CIO officials promptly called for tough new state laws making it an offense to hire illegal aliens, punishable by stiff fines or prison terms.

DEMOCRATS TO DELAY — Democrats are still in a dither about whether they should "recess" their September 17 state convention until September 19 to avoid a conflict with a high Jewish holy day.

A rules change to allow the delay will be aired at a special meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee in Austin July 16.

If hotel rooms can be made available September 19, SDEC will consider the change (to keep the convention from falling on Rosh Hashana, the Jewish New Year). But a three-fourth majority is necessary to order the rules amendment. APPOINTMENTS — Clyde Johnson of Bulverde and San Antonio was named by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to the Texas Water Quality Board, succeeding the late Gordon Fulcher of Atlanta.

Briscoe also named E. Carl Dillard of Pearsall to the State Judicial Qualifications Commission. He reappointed five State Health Advisory Committee members and appointed as new committee members Mrs. Edd Henard of Wellington, Mrs. Emma Nugent of Orange, Mrs. H.L.

Long of Kilgore, Mrs. Marie Bynum of Longview, Rogers Wilson of Austin, W.W. Manley of Terrell, Rev. Claude Black of San Antonio, Domingo Pena of Corpus Christi, Ernest Coker Jr. of Conroe, Ronnie Boules of Pecos and Ed Baker of Arlington.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. John Hill held a newspaper's donating free space to an official's column when he is a candidate for reelection is not a campaign contribution under the law.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: \* A county commissioner may not be paid for serving as appointed lawyer for an indigent defendant. \* Texas Water Development Board has a duty to approve or disapprove plans for proposed levees along any stream subject to floods or overflows.

\* An appointed attorney who represents both an indigent criminal defendant in district court and a juvenile in juvenile court the same day may not receive more than one fee. WELFARE ROLLS DECLINE — Fewer Texans got welfare benefits last year, the Department of Public Welfare reported.

The department's annual report showed Old Age Assistance was down from an average of 210,000 monthly in 1972 to 182,000 in 1973.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children declined from a peak of 121,588 in February 1973 to 118,681 families in July.

COURTS SPEAK — The State Supreme Court held unconstitutional a new state law regulating juke boxes and other coin-operated amusement machines.

Attorney General Hill called on the U.S. Supreme Court to accelerate a Texas case challenging impoundment of water pollution funds by President Nixon.

Austin, San Antonio and Lower Colorado River Authority called on the Third Court of Civil Appeals to require the Texas Railroad Commission to force Lo Vaca Gathering Company to live up to its gas supply contracts.

The Court of Criminal Appeals upheld a life sentence given a Dallas man for assault to murder a police officer.

A hearing was set in the Supreme Court for July 17 on whether two elderly sisters can get back \$100,000 and 7,500 acres of land they gave to the Stephens County Museum, Inc.

The high court ordered the Dallas Court of Civil Appeals to take another look at adequacy of a \$4,146 damage award given a Van Zandt County man who was bitten on the hand by a neighbor's hog.

OIL ALLOWABLE SET — The statewide oil allowable for July was fixed by the Railroad Commission, for the 28th straight month, a 100 per cent level.

Major crude oil buyers asked for 3,843,362 barrels of oil daily in July, a decrease of 36,087 from June.

Commission Chairman Jim Langdon pointed out that the U.S. still imports 1.5 billion barrels of crude annually — a "very long way" from self-sufficiency. Exceptions to the 100

per cent order were East Texas and Kelly-Snyder fields which were restricted to 86 per cent production. BEAUTIFICATION AWARDS MADE — Seven cities received Governor's Community Achievement Awards for outstanding community beautification projects during the last year.

Winning cities were Stanton (under 2,500); Eastland (2,501 - 5,000); Athens and Jacksonville (5,001 - 10,000); Lufkin (10,001 - 20,000); New Braunfels (20,001 - 60,000) and San Antonio (over 60,000).

Eighty-six communities submitted entries in the competition. Awards were made at the seventh annual meeting of the Beautify Texas Council here.

BUDGET HEARINGS START — Hearings of the 1976-77 state budget — the first to use the new zero-base system — are under way. Some of the early requests by state agencies reviewed by the Legislative Budget Board and the governor's office are running almost twice current spending.

Requests, under the new plan, are divided into three levels — bare minimum, middle bracket and highest feasible.

SHORT SNORTS Twenty key state agencies report substantial employment increases for blacks and Mexican-Americans.

New textbooks considered for school use will go on display July 1 in 20 regional education service centers.

A \$48,000 state award from the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation will assist Attorney General Hill in legal research on rights of the mentally retarded.

Texas is seeking more than \$17 million in federal funds to help finance public school programs for children of migrant farm workers during the 1974-75 school year.

More than 175 Texas areas are eligible for flood insurance through a new special program administered by the National Flood Insurers Association.

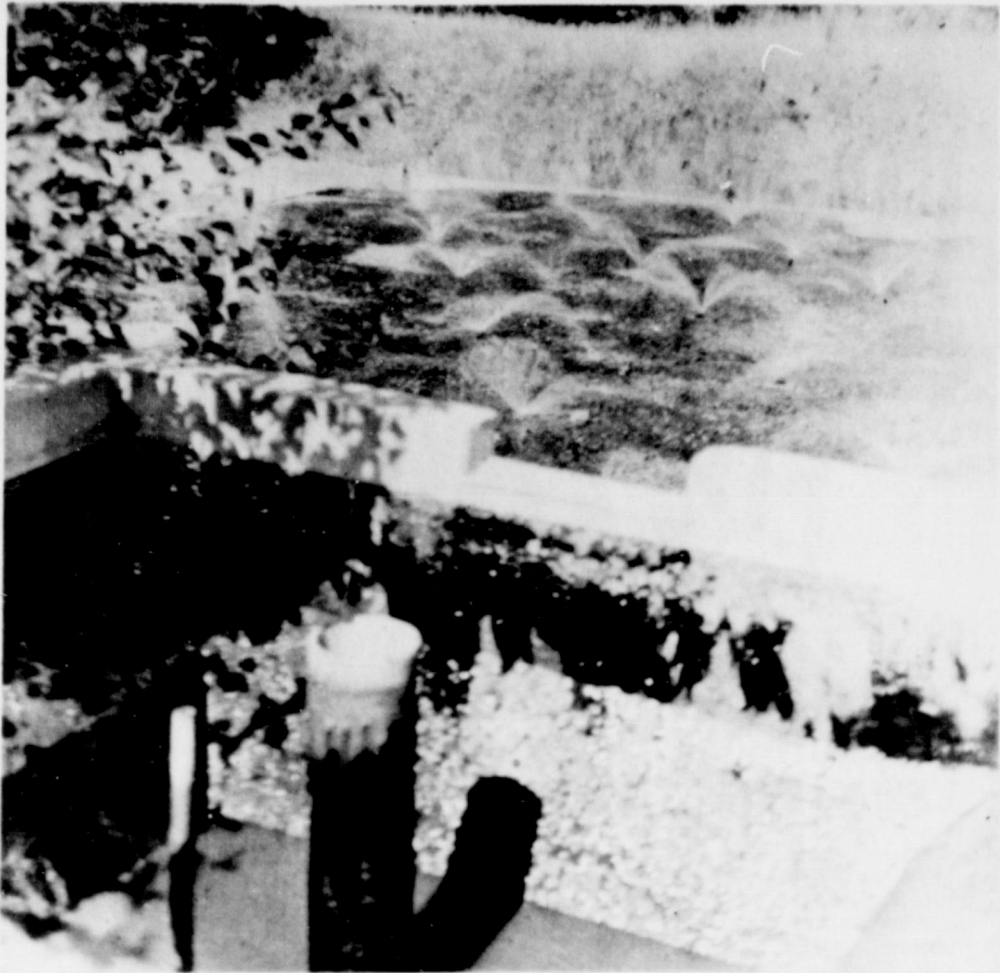

**Construction Underway On New Plant**

Dirt is flying in the southeast part of town where construction is underway on Eastland's new waste-water treatment plant.

It was a long time a'borning-but will be worth the wait.

Site preparation is well underway and actual completion is seen for some nine months away.

Location is on the city's old dump ground, a proper utilization since the opening of the new sanitary landfill.

The Environmental Protection Agency has approved an additional \$70,950 grant to the City of Eastland to be used in

constructing a new sewage treatment plant.

Announcement of the grant approval was made through the office of U.S. Rep. Omar Burleson.

Construction will cost an estimated \$351,481.

City voters in September, 1971, approved a \$92,000 bond issue which at the time was to have been the city's share of an expected \$198,700 needed to build the plant.

Several delays have been encountered by the city since 1971 and original projected costs have risen. Part of the

recent EPA grant will go to offset increases in costs.

At the time of the bond issue, the city applied to the federal government for a grant of \$106,700 to cover the remaining portion of the expected cost at that time.

The new plant will handle 400,000 gallons of waste daily compared to a 55-year-old facility now in use that handles only 200,000 gallons daily.

Abilene consulting engineers Yeatts & Decker have estimated that the new plant will be able to handle 900,000 gallons daily under peak load, and that it will be able to take care of the city's waste needs through the year 2000.

West-Tex Construction Co. of Borger is the prime contractor on the job.

Mrs. Blackmon said she found the object Saturday morning as she was straightening up the apartment she had just moved into. She said she immediately notified Chief of Police Johnnie Morren, who in turn called Fort Hood.

Morren said at first he thought it could have been one

of many souvenirs of the Vietnam war that some ex-GI had probably left at the apartment as he moved out.

Mrs. Blackmon, the mother of two children, Delia, 13 and Mike, 14, said she carefully laid the object on a mattress (at the suggestion of Morren), and "left it alone" until Lt. Harry Sawyer and SP-4 Barry Klipsch of the 47th Ordnance Detachment arrived from Fort Hood in a Huey Helicopter at about 4:40 p.m., accompanied by a pilot, co-pilot and crew chief.

As soon as the ordinance experts from Fort Hood saw the "round of ammunition" they identified it as a training round,

and said that it was harmless, but that Chief Morren had done the proper thing in calling them, as it is sometimes hard to tell the real thing from a training round.

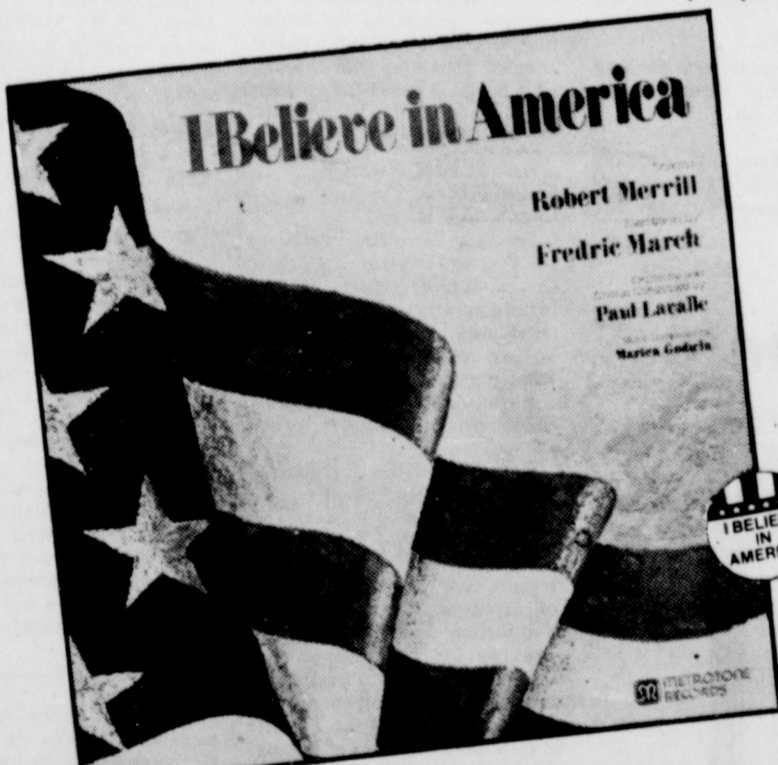

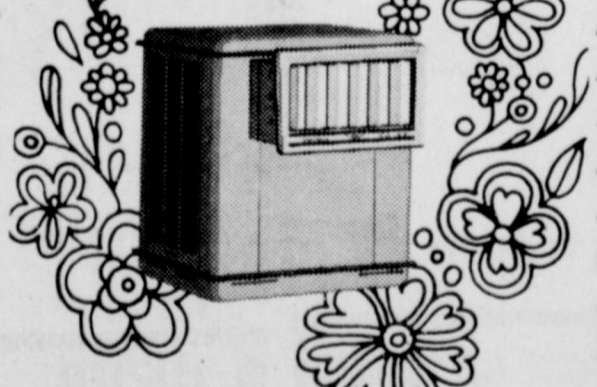
