Long Distance Charges To Be Eliminated

Long distance charges on all telephone calls between Eastland and Cisco and Eastland and Ranger will be eliminated July 9, according to Southwestern Bell Manager Burnice Gorr.

The new Extended Area Service between Eastland and the other cities will go in operation at 12:01 that morning. This means Eastland telephone users can dial direct to and be dialed direct from any

telephone in Cisco and Ranger without a message charge. "In other words, calls be-

tween Eastland and the other two cities will be local calls -- just like dialing within town at present", Mrs. Gorr explained. It will not be necessary to dial

the "1" before the number. At present, calls between Eastland and Cisco and Eastland and Ranger are handled as long distance calls. A new telephone directory

containing numbers for customers in all three towns will be mailed to Eastland, Cisco and Ranger subscribers just prior to the change, Mrs. Gorr said. Calls between Eastland and
