# Twister Wrecks House; Rain for Period Is 1.06 One Is Injured In Windstorm

A twister which swooped across a corner of Eastland Lake late Wednesday afternoon unroofed the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Gibson, on their farm about two miles northwest of Eastland, and slightly injured Mr. Gibson.

The Gibsons were working in their garden when the wind, rain and hail storm blew up. They went inside when the rain started.

Both were alarmed by the funnel-shaped cloud.

As the roof was being torn to pieces, he ran to the bedroom.

For protection from the flying debris, Mrs. Gibson crawled under the bed and Mr. Gibson lay flat on the floor, with his head inside a clothes closet, thinking that it might protect his head.

It so happened that the bedroom was the section of the house from which the roof was not ripped.

Roofing was cast a considerable distance and a big portion was up-ripped against a tree on the Gibson property.

All the while rain was soaking bedding, clothing and furnishings in the roofless home and hail was stacking up on the floor.

But it was home — despite the wreckage — and when the storm was over the elderly couple declined with thanks the offer of friends to visit with them until repairs could be made.

"We've got food in the house, the electricity is working, and the phone will be back in order soon," said Mr. Gibson, "so we'll just stay here."

"Besides, part of the house has a roof over it."

He looked out across the place. "We had a good garden. But the storm beat it to pieces.

"The drought had got our oat crop — \$60 or \$70 for seed thrown away."

"But our chickens made it through the storm" (he said, brightening) "not a one of 'em got killed."

Then he trudged back into the wrecked house to help the calm little lady straighten about a bit where it could be done, and fix a "bite for supper."

There was a cake on a plate on a divan in the living room, where it had been carried out of the rain, from a roofless room. It was a good-looking cake.

That would be nice.

And Mrs. Gibson surveyed the dripping clothing, upholstery, and bedding. She said, with a smile: "If the sun is bright tomorrow, I believe it will dry out before long."

Over on a nearby hill, at the W. L. Keith home, the Keiths were busy clearing away wreckage from where their garage had been unroofed.

And in town — the northwest part — many tree limbs had been blown off and almost countless TV antennas had been curled down by the blow and in a number of cases electrical and phone service was affected.

A scary time it was, around Eastland.

Put there was good news: The storm had raised the total rainfall, Monday through Wednesday, to 1.06 inches.

The Western Union telegraph line was producing badly garbled copy after the storm. The trouble was thought to be between Ranger and Eastland.

Several thousand dollars' damage was reported at Cisco where winds up to 60 and 70 miles per hour with heavy hail struck during a heavy rain.

About 1.30 inches of rain fell there in 20 minutes. A vacant business building the Poe Building on 12th St. and Ave D, had its west end blown down by the winds.

Damage was also inflicted on TV antennas, garages, outhouses and roofs in that area.

Police in Cisco reported no injuries from the storm though several were knocked down.

Hail was several inches thick on the ground after the storm.

While in Ranger, the storm warning siren became short circuited during the height of the gale, and heightened the concern of tornadoes.

Other area cities to receive rain Wednesday were Brownwood, 1.20 Albany, .50; Breckenridge, .95; Comanche, 1.26; Colorado City, 1.26; Merkel, .61; Midland, .71; Odessa, 2.10; Rotan, 1.30; San Angelo, .33; Snyder, .41; Throckmorton, .10; Winters, .70; and Wichita Falls, .81.

## Recruiting Sgt. Tells Training On Maintenance

"A medium jet bomber wing today includes 942 aircraft maintenance men," according to Sergeant Grady Hoyle, local United States Air Force recruiter.

Many of these men are expertly trained technicians specializing in jet engine maintenance and repair.

Where do these top-flight maintenance men receive their training? The Technical Training Air Force, a new and important subdivision of the Air Training Command, is responsible for the training of these and other technicians of the Air Force that handles the 199 technical positions.

If an airman is to become an airplane mechanic, he enrolls at Sheppard Air Force Base at Wichita Falls, Texas, where students learn maintenance and repair of jet and reciprocating engine aircraft.

The prospective jet engine mechanic enters training at Amarillo Air Force Base in the Texas panhandle region. Amarillo is the Air Force's first all-jet mechanics school.

The courses at both are complete and the instructors are armed with the latest in training devices as well as a first-hand knowledge of their subject. Utilizing the "learn-while-doing" method of teaching, practical training is the keynote in every classroom and on every airstrip.

The success of Technical Training Air Force may be measured by the fact that in their first three years of operation, they have graduated over one million technicians, many of whom are currently serving in all parts of the world with the Air Force.

Qualified young men, interested in jet mechanics and other technical courses offered by the Air Force, are urged to visit Sergeant Hoyle at Eastland Selective Service Board.

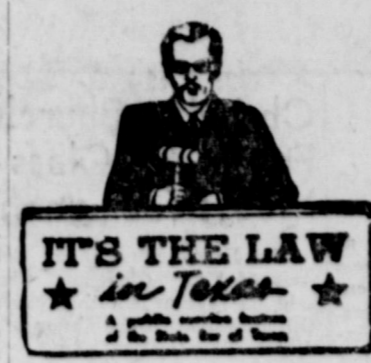
Further discussion of rules:  
 4.22 — A FAIR BALL is a legally batted ball that settles on fair ground between home and first base, or between home and third base, or that is on or over fair territory when bounding to the outfield past first base or third base, or that touches first or

third base, or that first falls on fair territory on or beyond first base or third base; or that, while on or over fair territory, touches the person of an umpire or player. A fair fly must be judged according to the relative position of the ball and the foul line, including the foul pole, and not as to whether the fielder is on fair or foul territory at the time he touches the ball.  
 4.23 — FAIR TERRITORY is that part of the playing field within, and including the first base and third base lines, from home base to the bottom of the playing field fence and perpendicularly upwards. All foul lines are in fair territory.  
 4.36 — An INFIELD FLY is

an out called by the umpire on the batter — If, before two are out, while first second and third bases are occupied, he hit a fair fly ball, other than a line drive, that in the judgment of the umpire can reasonably be caught by an infielder. Where a defensive player who normally plays in the outfield places himself in the infield, he shall for the purpose of the Infield-Fly rule be considered an infielder. In such case the umpire shall declare it an INFIELD-FLY. However, the runners may be off their bases or advance at the risk of the ball being caught, the same as on any other fly ball. If a runner is hit by the ball while standing on base, he shall not be called out, but the ball is dead and the batter shall be called out; but if a base runner is hit while off

base, both he and the batter shall be called out and the ball is dead. Provided that with first and second and third bases occupied, before two are out, any attempt to bunt which results as a fair fly ball shall not be regarded as an Infield-Fly.  
 4.38 — An INNING is that portion of a game, within which the teams alternate on offense and defense and in which there are three putouts for each team. It will be held that an inning starts the moment the third out is made completing the preceding inning.  
 6.05F — The umpire shall call "Time" whenever, in his opinion, any member of the offensive team makes any movement calculated to cause a pitcher to commit a balk.  
 6.14 — It is a regulation game when: 6.14-E, note 3. If the game is called after four or more full innings have been completed, and the home team is at bat and has scored an equal number or more runs in the entire game than the visiting team, the score shall be the total number of runs scored.

by each team at the time the game is called.  
 7.13-D — With less than two out, the standing of the following runner is not affected by a preceding runner's failure to touch a base. If, upon appeal, a runner is the third out, no runners following him may score.  
 7.15-C — When a base runner leaves his base before the pitched ball has reached the batter and the batter bunts or hits the ball within the infield, no runner shall be allowed to score. If three runners were on bases and the batter reaches first base safely, each runner shall advance to the base beyond the one he occupied at the start of the play except the runner who occupied third base, which runner shall be removed from the base without a run being scored.  
 EXCEPTION: If at the conclusion of the play there is an open base, paragraphs A and B will apply.  
 7.23 — If players or coaches of an offensive team interfere with a defensive player who is attempting to field a batted or thrown ball or interfere with a thrown ball, "interference" shall be called. The ball is dead. The offensive player on whom the play was being made shall be declared out and other runners may not advance.



### CONTRACTS WITH MINORS RISKY

Your son or daughter is considered a minor in the law of contracts until he or she becomes 21 years old. A parent frequently asks, "Am I responsible for the contracts entered into by my child?" A parent father wonders what rights his child may have once he enters into a contract.  
 All adults, particularly businessmen, contracts with minors are in their peril. What are their rights? As a parent you are not responsible for the contracts of your minor child unless you, yourself, enter into the contract or unless you guarantee the child's performance of the terms of the contract.  
 What rights does your minor child have? The law of contracts protects those who are not yet twenty-one years of age. Contracts of minors are "voidable." This means that those contracts are perfectly valid ones and adult parties are bound by them but the minor party has a right to refuse to perform his part of the contract and the law will not require him to do so.  
 Most contracts may be rejected by the minor either before he is 21 years old or shortly afterwards. If a minor rejects a contract, he "disaffirms" it. He may notify the other party and the contract becomes null and void. This right applies to many types of contracts, such as deeds, mortgages, promissory notes, contracts of employment, street improvement contracts and contracts for the purchase of automobiles.  
 The law requires a minor who desires to reject his contract to do so within a reasonable time after he reaches 21 years of age. If he fails to disaffirm within a reasonable time, he is regarded as having accepted the contract and is bound by it.  
 What constitutes a "reasonable time" depends upon the facts of each individual case. The fact that the parent approves the contract does not prevent a minor, at any time, from rejecting it.  
 An adult who contracts with a minor, as has been seen, is at a serious disadvantage. The law requires him to perform his part of the bargain the minor may elect to disaffirm the contract.  
 The duty is upon those who contract with minors to ascertain their ages; otherwise, such persons may be defeated by the shield with which the law protects the minor.  
 If a minor purchases an automobile, or some other article of value, and he wishes to revoke the purchase contract, he may recover from the seller the money that he has paid. But he must restore, or offer to restore, the automobile or article to the seller if he still has it.  
 After a child reaches the age of 21, he is no longer a minor and he may ratify any contracts that he made during his minority; and they are then valid and binding. He may ratify by expressly stating that he will perform the obligations of the contracts. If he uses the purchased property beyond a reasonable time after becoming of age, the law may hold that this amounts to a ratification and require him to perform his obligations under the contract.

 The show was open to not only the breeders of Hereford and Angus cattle in Eastland but also in adjoining counties as well if they had their animals properly entered by April 1, it was said. Ed Huestis, Cisco is grounds superintendent of the affair.  
 The entry deadline was April 1.  
 All animals must be in their pens by 9 a.m. on the day of the show. They can be released and taken home by 4 p.m. of the same day.  
 No cash prizes are offered. Breeders will compete for ribbons only. Although no public sale or auction of the animal will be held breeders may sell at private treaty during the show.  
 Animals to be shown will be of the Angus or Hereford breeds. No other livestock except beef cattle will be shown at the one day affair.

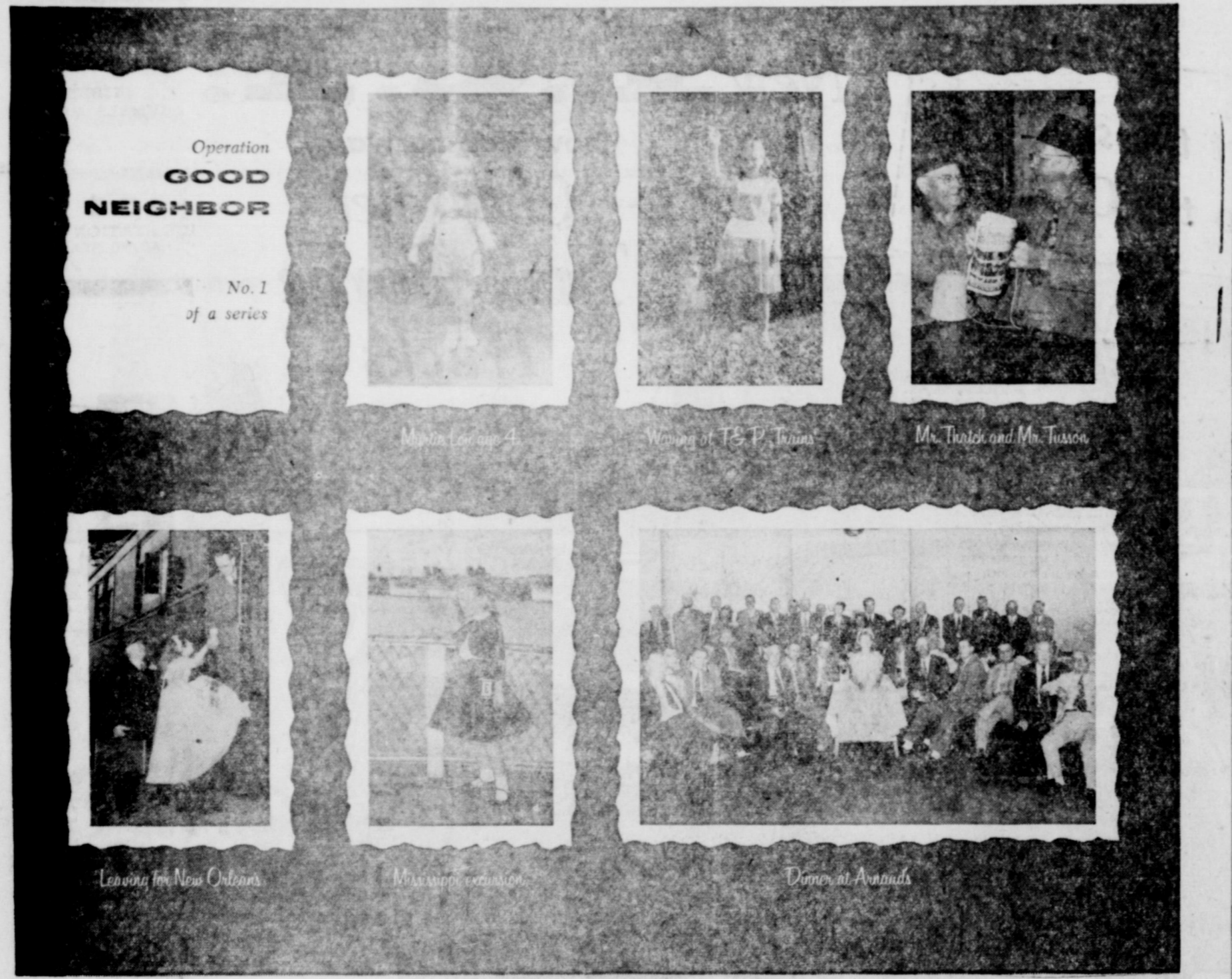

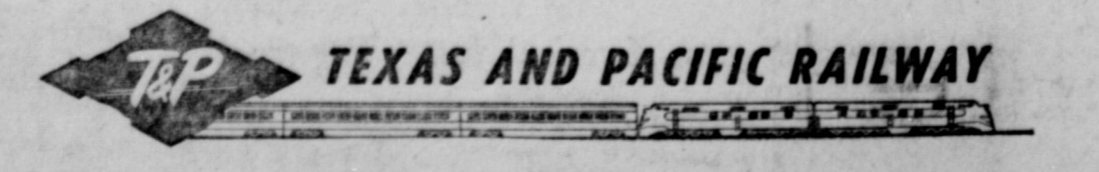

With Billy Graham 1000 Clergymen Dedicate Lives As Climax of Scotland Crusade

GLASGOW — Evangelist Billy Graham, an American farm boy who grew up to become the world's most famous preacher, climaxed the All Scotland Crusade with the plainest, most important message of his phenomenal ministry. And when he finished, over 1,000 clergymen of Scotland made decisions to re-dedicate their lives to God.

Ministers overflowed the Renfield Street Church for the final meeting. During his address Billy summarized the crusade — what has happened, why did it happen, and what lies ahead. But near the finish he stated:

"I may be completely out of order in doing this, but I have some suggestions for you ministers. When you go into the pulpit next Sunday preach with clarity and simplicity. Preach to the people, not to other preachers. Don't shoot over their heads — that only preaches you can't shoot. And preach with your natural voices. If many of you went into a grocery store and ordered a loaf of bread in the sing-song manner you affect in the pulpit, you would never get the bread because the clerk wouldn't be able to understand you. You don't talk in a chant. Then why preach that way? The reason theatres are filled and churches are empty is that the people can understand what is being said in a theatre.

"I would like to also stress the importance of making sure that you have a gospel to preach. The pastor of a leading Glasgow church came to me the other day and said, 'Billy, I don't have a gospel for my people.' People don't want good advice. They want the good news of Jesus Christ. 'For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.' Preach the Bible with authority. 'Early in my ministry I was do-

ing a lot of preaching but didn't have any power. One day I fell on my knees and said, 'Oh, God, I am going to have to get out of the ministry unless I find a message with power.' As I prayed I accepted by faith the Bible as the inspiring word of God. From that moment my ministry has been different."

Billy urged the ministers to preach the Bible with urgency and give the people an opportunity to accept Christ. "Go into your pulpits," he said, "and preach a Gospel message. Then ask for decisions and rededications." Scotland before the crusade has practically abandoned such an invitation. Ministers said it was obsolete, but now thousands have changed their minds and methods.

In discussing what happened in Scotland during the six-week crusade, Billy stated, "People are no longer indifferent about religion and the greatest problem facing the clergy is indifference. Religion is the main topic of conversation in Scotland again. Newspaper reporters who made decisions during the campaign are forming a Fellowship for Study. A man told some of his friends in a club about two weeks ago that his wife had made a decision at Kelvin and that he noticed a difference in her. The man went back to the club and told the same group he had accepted Christ.

"Revivals have broken out in small towns far from here as people listen to a voice over the relay. Churches are working together. A Baptist minister told me the other day he had never had much use for Presbyterians but had learned during the crusade to respect their work. Brother, that's revival. Maybe we can't agree on everything, but we can love one another.

"Thousands have accepted Christ and vows have been renewed. Paul Mickelson was sitting at his organ in an empty Kelvin Hall one afternoon when a workman walked up and said, 'I was an alcoholic and my home was wrecked, but since my conversion God has taken the desire for alcohol away from me and my home has been restored.' I saw a giant highlander wearing kilts walk forward one night. He lived in some remote area north of here and told us later, 'All my life I've wanted God but didn't know where to find him. Someone told me that people were finding him here and I came down.' That highlander would have made a decision if there hadn't been a service.

"A social impact has been made on Scotland. A department store head said employees had come to him admitting thefts. Barlinnie Prison, which usually had 50 or 60 at religious services now has an average of 300. A businessman has instituted new relations with his workers.

"Churches have received a new breath of life. Ministers are having old truths and feeding hungry people. One pastor told me his congregation had doubled.

"Now you ask why all this has happened. It has happened because people are hungry to hear the word of God. It has happened in answer to the prayers of Christian people. As I have told you before Glasgow, because of modern communications, is the most prayed for city in the history of the Christian church. There were thousands of prayer meetings around the world. Four hundred lepers in Africa prayed for an hour every morning.

"It has happened because of the power of the holy spirit which convicted people of sin after the word has been preached. It happened because there was a unity among the churches, because there was organization and publicity. Some have criticized the meetings, saying they cost too much money. Let me tell you something. People don't mind spending money on all forms of pleasures and amusements, but when it comes to spending money to bring a man to Jesus Christ they yelp to high heavens. Such thinking is greed and God hates it."

Turning to the question of what lies ahead, Billy said: "If your ministers fail to go out and help these people who need spiritual growth there could be a revolution of laymen in Scotland with the blessings outside rather than inside the church. There could well be a disaster unless the clergy takes its place of proper leadership.

"Our campaign has been like a short subject at the movie. The main feature is now about to go on. We have only scratched surface. The main harvest is yet to come. As far as Billy Graham is concerned, I fell no glow of personal victory or triumph this morning. This has been God's doing and it is marvelous in our eyes."

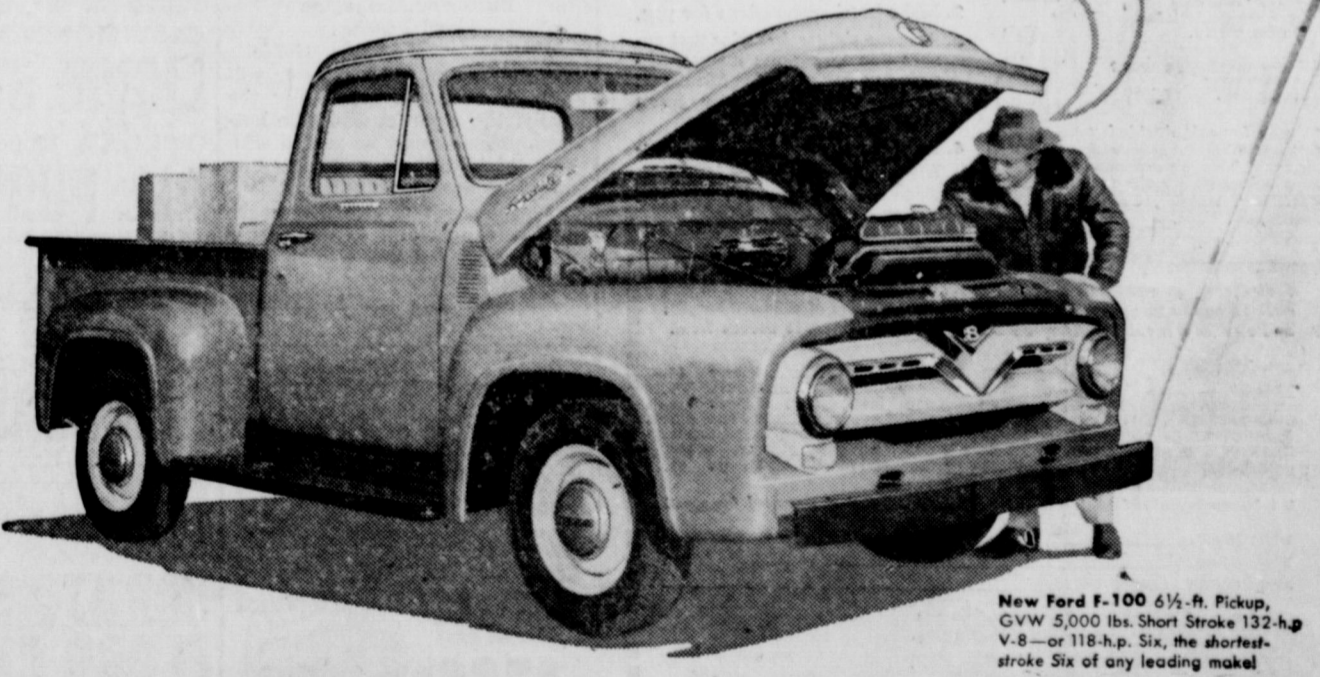

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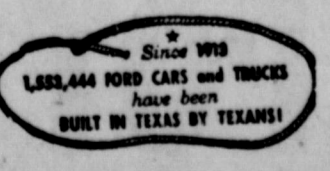

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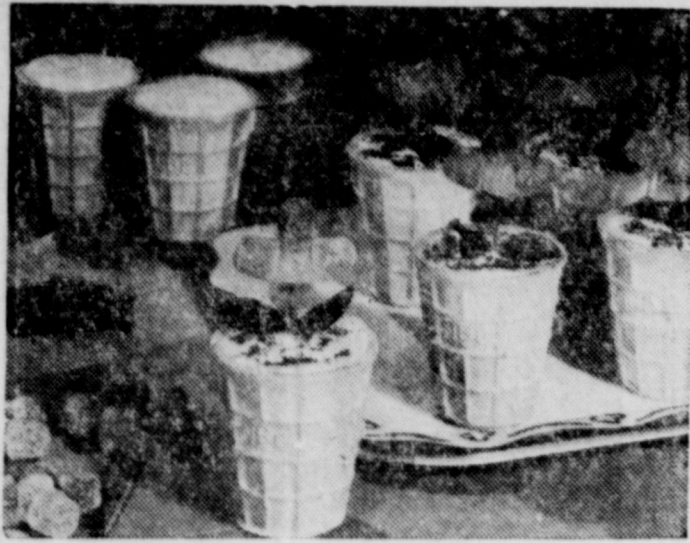

**Teen Age Party Refreshment Ideas**

If your teen-age daughter entertains her crowd often you need a good reserve of party refreshment ideas for her. These young cooks enjoy easy-to-prepare recipes with just enough "fuss" to make them fun. That's why prepared mixes are so wonderful for them to use.

Flavored freezing mix for instance, is perfect for year-round party refreshments. Ice cream is so versatile, too — there are countless ways to dress it up before you freeze it or when you're ready to serve it.

So, keep all flavors of freezing mix handy for your teen-age hostess to use. And, add these recipes to your file of perfect teen-age party desserts.

**SPRING FLOWER POT**  
(pictured above)

- 1 cup heavy cream
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 package vanillin freezing mix
  - 10 waffle cuplets
  - 1 4 cup crushed chocolate wafers
  - Colored toothpicks
  - Multicolored gum drops
  - Gumdrop leaves
- Combine milk and cream in a deep bowl. Whip until a deep layer of foam forms—takes 1 to 2 minutes. Add contents of package of freezing mix. Whip 1 more minute to dissolve. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until firm, but not too hard. Spoon ice cream into waffle cuplets, filling to the top. Sprinkle each with a few chocolate wafer crumbs. Place cuplets in

freezing compartment or freezer until ready to decorate.

Make gumdrop flowers using assorted colors. Fasten together with toothpicks. When ready to serve, decorate each cuplet with a flower and gumdrop leaves.

**COCONUT STICKS**

- 1 cup heavy cream
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 pkg. vanillin freezing mix
  - 1/2 cup shredded coconut, cut fine
  - 1 pkg. frozen strawberries, thawed
- Combine milk and cream in a deep bowl. Whip until a deep layer of foam forms—takes 1 to 2 minutes. Add contents of package of freezing mix. Whip 1 more minute to dissolve. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until firm, but not too hard. Cut ice cream in slices 1 to 1 1/2" wide. Roll in shredded coconut. Return to freezing compartment until ready to serve. For each serving, garnish 2 coconut sticks with a generous helping of strawberries.

**CHOCOLATE MACARON PIE**

- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 cup milk
- 1 pkg. chocolate freezing mix
- 1-2 3 cups crumbled coconut bar cookies
- 1 4 cup sugar
- 1 4 cup butter
- Whipped cream
- Toasted coconut

Combine cream and milk in a deep bowl. Whip until a deep layer of foam forms—takes 1 to 2 minutes. Add contents of package of freezing mix. Whip 1 more minute to dissolve. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until firm, but not too hard.

When ice cream is frozen, pile coconut crust. Mix crumbled coconut bars, sugar and butter thoroughly. Press into 9" pie pan. Chill.

When ice cream is frozen, pile into coconut crust, decorate with puffs of whipped cream and toasted coconut.

**Keep Family Happy While Member Diets**

If you or someone in the family is on a reducing diet, you can adapt the family's meals to suit the dieter's needs. Weight can be lost safely and comfortably. The best reducing diet is adequate in all respects, except that it is low in energy value. On such a diet, excess fat will help supply energy requirements for work and play.

The dieter needs more lean meat than other members of the family. An average-size woman should have at least seven ounces of meat for dinner and the average-size man should have nine ounces. Meat is important in a reducing diet for nutrients which help to maintain body functions. Meat is a satisfying food, too—the dieter will not feel famished nor crave high-calorie foods when she has eaten meat. She can eat less of other foods than the other members of the family do and ignore the "extra." Here is a dinner menu idea:

Roast Beef  
Asparagus Tips  
Beet - Onion Salad

From this menu, the dieter will have an adequate meal. For the family, the asparagus may be buttered, dressing may be served with the salad and bread and butter or margarine can be unlimited. Cookies may be served with the peaches. Whole milk and sugar and cream for coffee may also be served to non-dieters while the dieter drinks skim milk and black coffee.
