Victor Hotel Is Purchased By Parmer Company Jan. 1

E. L. Parmer of Houston, owner of several hotels and motels, has purchased the Victor Hotel in Cisco and paper work in the transfer will be completed in about two weeks, according to a report today by Victor Cornelius.

The Parmer company assumed operation of the Victor Hotel as of January 1, 1964, Mr. Cornelius said. The sale covered the coffee shop as well as the hotel building.

The new owner operates the Hotel Coleman at Coleman and the Breakers Hotel in Corpus Christi as well as motels in Beaumont and Falfurrias, it was reported. Announcement concerning the local operation policies and so forth was ex-

pected to come from Mr. Parmer as soon as the sale transfer has been completed.

Mr. Cornelius had operated the hotel for the past five years. During that time, extensive improvements had been made, including building a new banquet room and new equipment and repairs for the coffee shop. The hotel was built in the late 1920s.

No personnel changes were expected in the change of ownership, it was reported. Mr. Parmer visited Cisco several times during the negotiations. Mr. Cornelius told The Press that he decided to sell the hotel in order to devote full time to his theatrical and men's printing business at Eastland. He noted that his menu printing business was growing and that the time he had for other activities was becoming less and less.

"I will always be interested in the progress of Eastland County and its cities," he said. "Our thanks go to a good many people in Cisco who helped to make our business activities pleasant and rewarding."

NEW AVERAGE

It's Plain, There's Been A Rain Gain

It is raining more now — but not quite as much as some think. That's what a review of the "average rainfall" in Eastland County indicates. The Texas Almanac lists the average for the county as 27.51 inches per year — a figure used by many people. For the past 50 years the Eastland Telegram has been recording and reporting the yearly totals, comparing them with the average, based on the preceding years figures. And the Telegram's average has been carried as 25.83 for many years.

But the average apparently hadn't been figure in quite a few years. Current computations on the 50-year figures reveal an average of 26.33 inches — less than the Almanac figure, but an increase over previous local figures. So the question: Does an increase in the average mean that it is raining more now than in years past? Well, 1957's 43.26 inches certainly didn't lower the average any.

Interstate Design Public Hearing Set at Courthouse January 15th

A public hearing regarding the proposed development of Interstate Highway 20 through Eastland County will be held at 10 a. m., Wednesday, Jan. 15th, at the County Courthouse in the Courthouse in Eastland, the Texas Highway Department has announced.

Preliminary drawings, plans and sketches showing the proposed improvements and geometrics are on file at Resident Engineer R. P. Hauns office at the Texas Highway Department offices, at the County Judges office at the courthouse, both in Eastland, and at the City Hall in Cisco. Mr. Haun was out of town

Friday and unavailable for comment, but is assumed that this meeting will be similar in nature to one held in Ranger a few months ago.

At that meeting, it was pointed out in the opening remarks that the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the "design" of the Interstate 20 project, and not the "location" of the route.

The course of the Leon River, southwest of Eastland, will be changed to eliminate the need for several bridges, according to drawings on file.

Department estimates of 1975 traffic on I. H. 20 is 8,800 vehicles a day at the

point where it will intersect State Highway 6, south of Eastland, and 9,950 vehicles on I. H. 20 at the intersection of I. H. 20 and FM 570 (which will be an extension of Business Route 80), east of Eastland. The same estimates indicate that 3,550 vehicles will leave I. H. 20 east of Eastland, turning into the city.

A delegation of Ranger residents attended the recent meeting there and registered their protests to the highway routing.

County Judge Scott Bailey said that the meeting will be moved to a larger court if the attendance justifies.

Eastland students will return to classes at their regular time schedule Monday, January 6, after a two weeks Christmas holiday, according to school superintendent, Wendell Siebert.

There will be no other holidays for the schools until in March, when the schools will dismiss one day for the Oil-belt Teachers Association meeting in Sweetwater and one day for the Eastland County Livestock Show. Easter holidays also fall in March, with school dismissing on March 27 and resuming classes on March 30, for this holiday.

1963 County Rains Near Inch Above Average, But 'Fell Wrong'

Rainfall in Eastland County during 1963 was almost an inch above average, even though most points in the state are reporting less than average totals.

Most agree, however, that the rains in this area came at not exactly the best times for farm crops.

Total for the year is 26.69 inches, .96 of an inch above the average of 25.83 inches. Heavy rains in May, August, September and November, all above average months, helped push the total up. All other

months were below average in rain.

The county peanut crop this year was below average, County Agent J. M. Cooper said, but better than had been anticipated.

The early part of 1963 was the driest, with only 25 of an inch in January, 22 in February and .81 in March. Although some 3.41 inches fell in August, it was generally considered too spotted to offer much help for the crop.

Had more rain fallen generally during that month, the crop

would have been extremely good, it is reported.

December was in extremely dry month with only .21 of an inch recorded — consisting of an inch and a half of snow plus .15 and a .04 measure ment, according to Official James Smith of Eastland.

July was the near-moisture less month of the past year with only .11 of an inch measured.

What's ahead? Well, the averages read like this: 1.37 in and 1.59 for March.

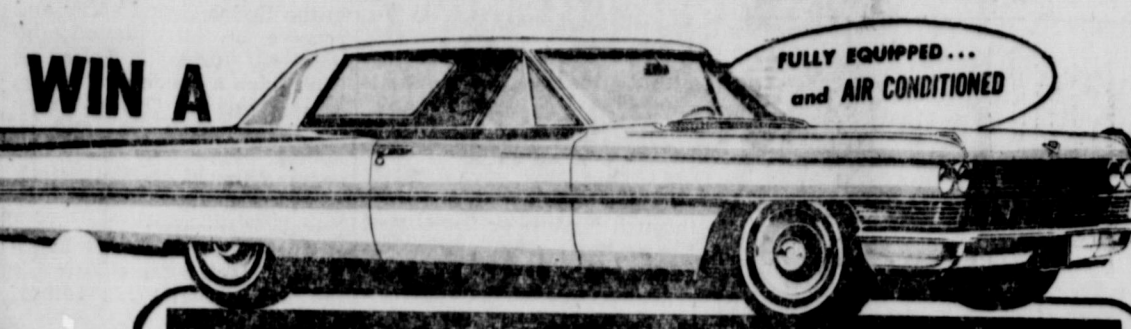

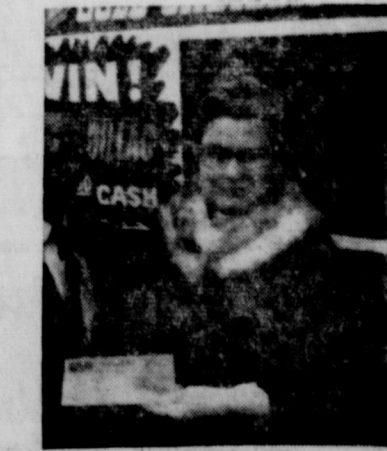

Rising Star News

Since January 1963 and through November the city of Rising Star's rain gauge has registered 20.34 inches of rainfall according to mayor Walter Smith. Most of this precipitation fell during the spring months, he stated, but the month of November was the wettest with a total of 4.06 inches. Last summer was the driest in the city's history and the overall rainfall for the year is much below normal. All this has reflected in shorter crop yields and poorer livestock conditions in the area.

Work on the construction of Rising Star's new sewage disposal plant and outfall line to carry sewage to the plant is scheduled to begin on or before January 6, the deadline for starting the work. The contract has been awarded to the Anderson Construction Company of Abilene. The contract award was approved by the State Health Department through which a grant of \$25,800 to help finance the project has been received. Remainder of the cost will be paid through a revenue bond issue of \$64,000 voted by the City. National Engineering Co. of Austin will have charge of the construction.

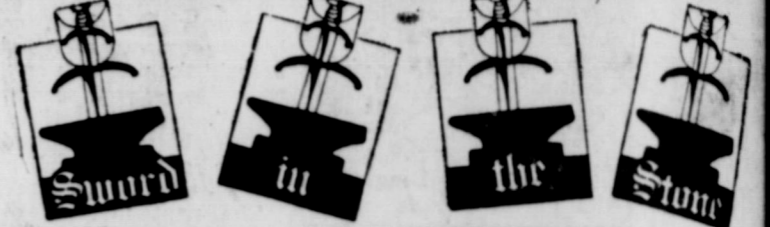

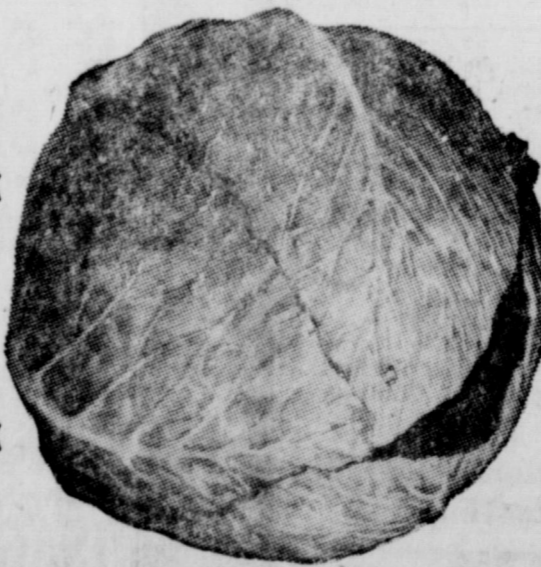
