Boost In Economy of County Is Predicted

ton, and in addition the \$9.25 per and other fees has been removed, much of an increase, however. Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association and Cong. Omar Burleson notified the Telegram Saturday.

The new support price and the removal of the differential charge will mean that Eastland County peanut growers will receive \$29 per ton more for their peanuts this year. That's an increase of 44c a bushel.

This is by far the largest increase for any commodity," Cong. Burleson stated.

Wilson said the price quoted is 85 percent of parity and represents an increase of six and one-half percent of parity. He also explained that the price could go up, but not down. He said the price of peanuts could increase if the demand showed the need.

The dropping of the differential charge was an extra added bonus. It will simply mean that the new support price is based on a net figure while the 1960 support price was a gross figure.
