# Support Price On Peanuts Increased \$29 Ton

## Boost In Economy of County Is Predicted

The minimum price support for peanuts has been set at \$221 per ton, and in addition the \$9.25 per ton charge for storage, inspection and other fees has been removed, Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association and Cong. Omar Burleson notified the Telegram Saturday.

The new support price and the removal of the differential charge will mean that Eastland County peanut growers will receive \$29 per ton more for their peanuts this year. That's an increase of 44¢ a bushel.

"This is by far the largest increase for any commodity," Cong. Burleson stated. Wilson said the price quoted is 85 percent of parity and represents an increase of six and one-half percent of parity. He also explained that the price could go up, but not down. He said the price of peanuts could increase if the demand showed the need.

The dropping of the differential charge was an extra added bonus. It will simply mean that the new support price is based on a net figure while the 1960 support price was a gross figure.

Wilson said that if the county can get good weather conditions now and make two or three more good crops "we will be back up now that the support price is more favorable."

Peanut farmers themselves were highly pleased with the increase. It has been felt for sometime now that peanut growers, who have been fighting hard to hold what

they had in recent years, were going to get a break this year when support prices were announced. Most farmers hadn't expected this much of an increase, however. The price increase may mean thousands of dollars more for the county's economy.

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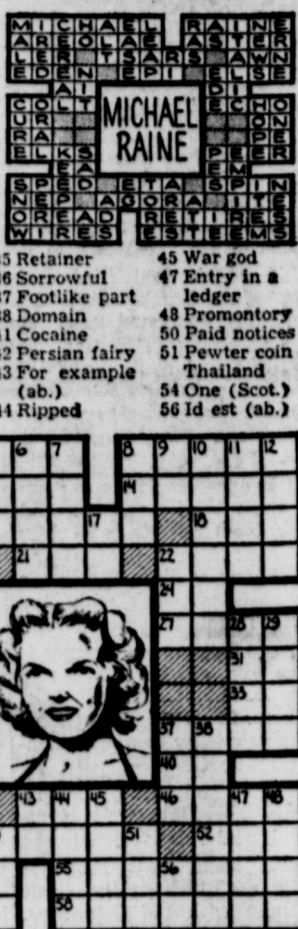
