Wright Attends Veterans Service Officer Meeting

This Regional Clinic was conducted by the Veterans Affairs Commission, in cooperation with the various Veterans Organizations and the Veterans County Service Officers Association of Texas. The purpose of the Clinic was to offer Service Officers from the 51-County North Texas Region an opportunity to gain first-hand knowledge of recently enacted legislation dealing with benefits to veterans, their dependents, and survivors. Topics discussed during the two-day clinic included compensation, pension, government insurance, GI loans, education and training for veterans and war orphans, veterans employment and re-employment rights, and hospital and outpatient treatment for veterans.

Conducted annually, these clinics serve as in-service refresher training courses for County, Post and Chapter Veterans Service Officers. Five such clinics are to be conducted over the State during this spring.

GRAY MATTER SAYS

Texas Should Do Away With Outdated Poll Tax

All of the 17th Congressional District of Texas can well be proud that our representative in the noble United States House of Representatives is the author of a bill to outlaw the poll tax in federal elections. This is something that should have been done a long, long time ago.

The poll tax was made a prerequisite in most of the Southern states only after the rise of influence of the Populist Party of the 19th Century. The landed aristocracy then had to find some way to stop the people and their aspirations for a voice in the government so they decided to make the poll tax a requirement for the "God-given" right to vote in a democracy.

Some states even went so far as to make the payment of a poll tax retroactive. By that we mean that if the tax payer skipped a year in paying his tax, as many people in Texas do, he had to pay for the skipped year as well as for the year in which he wanted to vote if he voted in the election to be held that year.

It's easy to see what this does to poor people's right to vote.

Some will of course argue that \$1.75 won't hurt anyone. It does hurt some people but there is another thing that is fundamentally wrong with the poll tax as administered in Texas and that is the taxpayer has to pay it before the end of January to vote in an election to be held in November. That sort of thing is just so much nonsense.

Actually, the state ought to repeal the poll-tax law in this state but it'll take a constitutional amendment to do that, and the last time we voted on that the people voted it down. The vote in that case was about 10 percent of what it would have been in a state with the same population as Texas without the poll tax requirement.

If the legislature were to see fit I don't think it would take a constitutional amendment to change the date by which a poll tax would be paid, but I don't look for our legislature to do much along this line for the people of this state. It ought to be an easy thing for the legislature to write a law that said something about anyone who paid his poll tax any time up to, shall we say, 30 days before the election, shall be eligible to vote in all elections coming after that date within that year.

This would be about the same as a registering law, but we'd still collect the \$1.75 and give the people until 30 days before the election to pay their poll taxes, or, if you want to call it that, to register for the election.

Actually, this is something Texas ought to do. Our state continues to be a laughing stock among the states of the union. Hardly any are left now so reactionary as to charge a tax for the right to vote, but Texas still does. No wonder we get some of the representation in Austin we do.

On this point too we have those who argue for states' rights on the matter of eligibility for voting. This is something that I can't see too well. We've let this argument of states' right run away with our reasoning sometimes.

No state ought to have the right

to take the rights of Americans away from them because they didn't have a dollar-six-bits by Jan. 31 of any given year, but that's what this poll tax business actually amounts to. For too long we've allowed ourselves to deprive other people of the fundamental rights this country was founded for by claiming "states' rights" when actually we mean the right for a state to "do nothing" about an important problem.

I used to be one of the loudest states' rightsers that ever lived until I began to study the House Journal out of Austin and keeping an eagle eye for the Texas Legislature.

Today I'll admit that I'm not much of a states' right man any longer.

I remembered when I used to go to Austin as a kid and when I stood in front of our state capitol there beat within my breast a sense of pride that is hard to describe. The last time I was in Austin, about a month ago, when I stood at the same place and gazed toward the point of the steeple overlooking our state capitol the thought ran through my mind about whether or not there was a bigger bunch of crooks under one roof anywhere in the world than the ones meeting in Austin then.

Our legislature, for example, talks about free competition, but when the House had an opportunity to vote on making automobile insurance rates competitive they turned it down by a vote of 120-40. That's about 15 percent of the people voting in favor of the people on this one issue.

Although every man who voted

not to make insurance competitive isn't against the people as opposed to corporate entity, the ratio within our legislature is about the same, or 85 percent of our legislators are more interested in the vested interests of this state than they are in you and I.

You see, the trouble is simply this. We can't offer the nice fat "retainer" fees like the vested interests.

This is one of the reasons I've advocated having all the members of legislature filing their federal income tax reports with the Secretary of State of Texas. I think now I'd even go further than that now. We ought to make every lobbyist file his income tax with the same state official as well as statement of all of his expenses, and when and where the expense were incurred.

If Lobbyist Jim Jones spent \$100 entertaining Representative John Doe he ought to have to report it on his expense statement to be filed with the Secretary of State.

If the State were doing the job it ought to do I'd be in favor of states' rights. But it isn't. No state in America is. Therefore somebody has to do the job that's got to be done. If that somebody is the Federal Government then it'll have to be the Federal Government. But we must have a government that is responsive to the needs and will of the people. We have had enough of this "take care of the boys on the back row" sort of government.

Let's let the people rule for a change and let's have all of the people voting. The poll tax must go.

Ribbing That's Fun



Barbecued spareribs make a dinner as much fun as a picnic. The succulent spareribs are the more enjoyable too when the meat is glazed with a sweet and pungent barbecue sauce.
Pantry shelf staples provide the prized basting sauce: unsulphured molasses, catchup, spices. There is no fuss to these barbecued spareribs. The ribs are topped with lemon slices and chopped onion and partially baked before the barbecue sauce is added to contribute its mellowness of flavor and shining splendor.

Molasses Barbecued Spareribs
3 pounds spareribs, cut into serving pieces
1 lemon, thinly sliced
1 medium onion, chopped
1/4 cup unsulphured molasses
1 teaspoon chili powder
1 tablespoon celery seed
1/4 cup vinegar
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1 cup catchup
1/2 teaspoon Tabasco
2 cups water
Place spareribs, meat side up, in shallow baking pan. Sprinkle with salt. Top with lemon slices and chopped onion. Bake in moderate oven (350°F) 30 minutes. Combine unsulphured molasses with chili powder and celery seed; stir in remaining ingredients. Pour over spareribs. Continue baking 1 hour longer, basting frequently. Yield: 4 servings.
