

Molasses Barbecued Spareribs 3 pounds spareribs, cut into

serving pieces
lemon, thinly sliced
medium onion, chopped
cup unsulphured molasses
teaspoon chili pointlesses

1 tablespoon celery seed
1/4 cup vinegar
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1 cup catchup
1/2 teaspoon Tabasco

Place spareribs, meat side up, in shallow baking pan. Spr'nkle with salt. Top with lemon slices and chopped onion. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 minutes. Combine unsulphured molasses with chili powder and celery seed; stir in remaining ingredients. Pour over spareribs. Continue baking 1 hour longer, basting frequently. Yield: 4 servings.


