Final Rites Sunday for Bert Reeves

Bert Vinson Reeves, 71, former Ranger resident, died early Saturday in his sleep at the home of a daughter in Caddo, Mrs. James R. Ingle.

Mr. Reeves had suffered from a heart condition. He was a retired laborer and had lived in Caddo for 11 months. Before that, he lived in Breckenridge for five years and in Ranger for 12 years.

He was a member of the First Christian Church.

Born in Livermore, Iowa Dec. 17, 1889, he married Willie Goldene Montgomery in 1914 at Carlton. She died Sept. 4, 1937.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in Killingsworth Funeral Chapel with Rev. Richard L. Russell, pastor of the First Christian Church, officiating. Burial was in Pioneer Cemetery.

Additional Funds Available for Farm Loans Here

An additional \$50 million has been made available to the Farmers Home Administration for farm housing loans, Homer P. Cole, the agency's county supervisor announced today.

He said that the new loan funds assure an adequate supply of this type of credit for eligible farm families during the balance of the fiscal year. Loans made so far this year plus those being processed had practically exhausted the funds previously available.

Farm housing loans are made throughout the rural areas of the United States. The loans provide farm families with an opportunity to acquire an adequate house and efficient service buildings.

Applications for farm housing loans may be made at the local office of the Farmers Home Administration, Mr. Cole said. The loans bear 4 percent interest and are repayable over periods up to 33 years.

The major demand in Eastland County is for loans to construct and modernize farm houses, and most of the funds are used for new construction.

Improvements financed with the loans include the installation of central heating, and pressure water supply systems, the addition of bathrooms and the modernization of kitchens.

Many local farmers also use the loans to adjust their service buildings to the changing requirements of agriculture.

To be eligible a farmer must own a farm for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities based on 1944 prices and be of sufficient value to adequately secure the loan. In addition, he must lack the resources needed to obtain credit elsewhere and have sufficient income to pay farm operating and family living expense and meet payments when due on his debts.

D. B. Warren, director of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, has announced three county peanut grower meetings to be held next week.

He stated "All peanut growers should plan to attend one of the meetings which will deal with plans to get all of our county peanut allotment planted in 1961. The economy of Eastland County can be greatly improved by getting full use of our acreage."

The first meeting will be held at Rising Star, American Legion Hall, 7:30 p.m. Monday, March 20. Tuesday, March 21 at 7:30 p.m. the second meeting will be held at Nimrod in the Community Center. The last meeting will be held at Carbon, 7:30 p.m., Thursday, March 23 in the High School auditorium.

Emmett Powell, ASC Office manager, will explain the release and reapportionment provisions of the law pertaining to peanuts. Glen Justice, Eastland County Farm Bureau president, will preside at the meetings. A spokesman from Southwestern Peanut Growers Association will be present to aid in the discussion of the peanut program.

OF APPEALS COURT

Breckenridge, Ranger and County Court Oppose Move

New support from a number of sources opposing Abilene's effort to move the 11th Court of Civil Appeals to Abilene has been offered in the last few days.

The Eastland County Commissioners Court went on record Monday as opposing efforts to relocate the Court. The Ranger Times editorially condemned the efforts and the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce has announced it is opposed to the suggested move. Cisco's Chamber of Commerce and The Cisco Press already have indicated they are against the suggested move.

Eastland County Commissioners were unanimous in their opposition. They approved the following resolution:

"The Eastland County Commissioners Court, meeting March 13, 1961, goes on record as opposing efforts to move the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland County to Taylor County.

"Recognizing the fact that Eastland County citizens paid the cost of building an additional floor on the Eastland County courthouse to house the Appeals Court, the Commissioners Court believes it unfair and unjust for Taylor County to try to move the Court after its many years location in Eastland.

"Eastland County is proud of the location of the Appeals Court and the Commissioners Court will do all within its power to keep the Court located in our county.

"During the past 12 months the county has made a number of improvements on the fifth floor of the courthouse in order to better serve the Appeals Court."

The Ranger Times stated that the Abilene move "... should raise a loud voice of protest from the entire county."

The Times stated, "The court being located in the Eastland County courthouse means a lot to the entire county and we should do everything in our power to see that it remains in this county. . . Ranger citizens should join in this fight to keep the court in the county. Every citizen should write to anyone who has any influence and ask them for their support in killing the proposed bill."

Rep. Scott Bailey, who was in the district over the weekend, said he had received a resolution from the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce urging him to work to keep the Court located in Eastland.

Bailey said he is doing research and plans to fight the proposed move when the bill comes before the House Judiciary Committee headed by Rep. Dewitt Hale.

Bailey issued this prepared statement:

"In response to numerous inquiries concerning House Bill 680 now pending in the Texas Legislature. This Bill if enacted into law would move the seat of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland to Abilene. This Bill has been referred to the Committee on Judiciary. A hearing has not been set for this Bill.

"I shall keep well posted on this bill and when this bill comes before the committee, I will vigorously oppose it. At this time I am having information assembled that will, in my opinion, cause the committee to kill this bill in the committee before it ever comes out on the floor for a vote.

"I feel that this measure has strong political implications due to the fact that there have been many recent attempts to divert some of our small towns and districts of their political and economic sovereignty. A recent example of this may be noted in an Abilene Reporter-News article which suggests that Callahan County might be taken from the 76th District and added to Taylor
