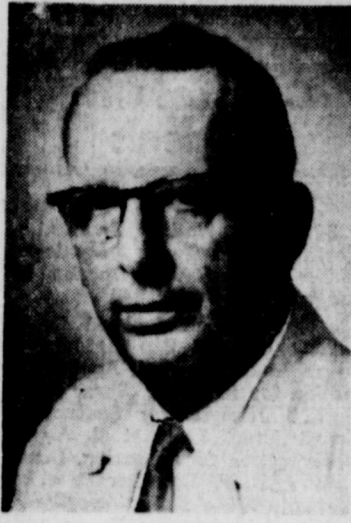

Eastland Bank Joins In 4-H Work Support

Eastland National bank in Eastland has joined with other Texas banks in national support of 4-H Club, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper.

The Eastland National Bank made its contributions to the National 4-H Club Foundation, Washington, D. C., as part of a nationwide fund raising program.

Arlyle S. Elliott, president of the First National Bank of Edna, provided the leadership for this program in Texas.

Banks in Eastland County have supported local 4-H programs for several years, Cooper said. County Bank officials feel the National 4-H Club Foundation provides an excellent opportunity to broaden their support of 4-H.

This local support has been acknowledged by Jesse W. Tapp, Los Angeles, Calif., chairman of the board of the Bank of America, who heads the campaign, and by Grant A. Shrum, the 4-H Foundation's executive director. They have indicated that this County's banks are among more than 2,600 public spirited representatives of private enterprises that are helping to extend and improve the 4-H program through the National 4-H Club Foundation.

County Agent Cooper announced that 4-H recognition plaques will be presented to each of the banks for their "Service to Youth" activities.

The National 4-H Club Foundation is a privately financed educational institution to complement and assist the youth programs of the Cooperative Extension Service. The County Agent is the local representative of the Extensive Service. The "Service to Youth" activities of the National 4-H Club Foundation are in the fields of citizenship education, leadership development, and international understanding. Currently operating are three programs: (1) The National 4-H Center, a working memorial to the 4-H movement in the Nation's Capital; (2) The International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) in which over 200 rural young people are exchanged each year between the United States and 40 countries of the free world so they may learn another way of life by living it; and (3) a broad program in Human Development-Human Relations for training youth leaders for more effective working relationships with young people.

Self-employed lawyers, dentists, osteopaths, veterinarians, chiropractors, naturopaths, and optometrists are subject to Federal self-employment tax for 1960, Fogle said.

He reminded members of this group to pay social security tax for 1960 if their net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

Most self-employed taxpayers use a calendar year for reporting income, he said, and the tax for taxable years beginning in 1960 is 4½ percent on a maximum of \$4,800 of net earnings from self-employment for taxable years ended after 1959.

Only self-employed people not required to pay self-employment tax are: Clergymen with income from services as duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of a church; members of religious orders and Christian Science practitioners who get their income in connection with discharge of their duties or such; and doctors of medicine in private practice. Coverage is available to ministers and Christian Science practitioners at their election.

Full particulars on this subject are in Document 5047, "Self-Employment Tax," available at Internal Revenue Service.

Organization Is Need of Farmers, Justice Declares

Farmers are currently engaged in a number of crucial legislative battles, both in Austin and Washington, and the only way they can win is by joining together to gain strength by organization, says Glenn Justice, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau. The local county Farm Bureau is staging its annual membership drive.

"Farm Bureau is the best means farmers have for effective presentation and defense of their side of issues because it is the only organization which has full time representatives both in Austin and Washington," Justice said. "Through this representation members are kept informed of the progress of favorable legislation and are alerted to possible efforts to pass measures harmful to them."

Current state issues in which farmers have a big stake include the farm-to-market road building program, redistricting of legislative districts, farm labor, taxes and city annexation of farm and ranch properties, according to the Farm Bureau leader.

On the national level, there is a danger of development of farm programs detrimental to agricultural unless farmers succeed in making their position known, he said.

Every farmer and rancher in the county is urged to join the local organization during this membership campaign. The drive ends April 13, 1961.

Free Parking Is Planned Friday And Saturday

Parking will be free Friday and Saturday in Eastland. The free parking was voted on by city commissioners to show visitors to the County Livestock Show they are welcomed here.

Chamber of Commerce President Horace Horton arranged for the parking meters to be covered.

Parade Friday at Two To Get Show Underway

Prospects looked good today for the biggest and best Eastland County Livestock Show ever held. The big event will get underway Friday and come to a conclusion Saturday.

As of this morning 601 entries had been received by Keith McDonald, general show superintendent. The entries include 28 fat steers, 25 breeding beef cattle, 30 dairy cattle, 48 breeding sheep, 50 angora goats, 219 fat lambs, 148 fat hogs and 63 breeding hogs.

A downtown parade is scheduled in Eastland at 2 p.m. Friday. Awards will be given for the best three bands, best riding groups and best floats.

More than \$1,500 in prize money is to be paid to FFA boys and 4-H boys and girls at the show. Ribbons will be awarded winning entries and the grand champions will receive trophies.

Brandy Humphreys is the assistant show superintendent, Park Plambeck and Charles Veal head the swine division, Don Bradford and Billy Bacon are superintendents of the sheep and goats division, C. E. Bridge and L. J. Williams head the dairy cattle division and Joe Criswell and Jerry Chaney are in charge of beef cattle and fat steers.

Don Jeffcoat Is Representative Of Highway Assoc.

Don Jeffcoat of Cisco is serving as county representative for the U. S. Highway 80-Interstate 20 Association.

Jeffcoat said the membership drive in Eastland is now underway. He said drives are being held in cities from Fort Worth to El Paso to enroll business firms in the association.

The Association, a non-profit corporation, recently announced a \$100,000 advertising program for 1961. The Association's purpose is to attract more tourists to the route, to get them to stop on Highway 80 and to accrue both the financial and publicity values from such an effort for all the cities participating.

Jeffcoat said that according to the U. S. Department of Commerce, two dozen tourists a day passing through Eastland will be the equivalent of an industry with an annual payroll of \$100,000.

At the Tuesday meeting R. P. Haun, resident highway engineer, spoke on Eastland County highways. Haun explained that there are 26 numbered highways in Eastland County, including 19 farm to market roads.

The highway engineer explained the costs of road construction, explaining that the average cost per mile for farm-market roads is \$20,000 and the average cost for interstate highways is \$370,000 per mile.

Change In Feed Grain Program Regulations Told

A change in the feed grain program regulations of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation department was noted today by Emmett Powell, county ASC office manager.

Powell said, "The new provision permits grain sorghum which is harvested, used as forage or silage or grazed to be counted toward setting up a base for the season. Even though no grain sorghum is sold the farm should have a base established as it could mean considerable money to the producer. The crop years 1959 and 1960 are being used in setting up the base."

"If a producer has grown grain sorghum for any use or corn in 1959 or 1960 the acreage should be turned in to the county ASC office by March 27."

Eastland school students will get a holiday Friday so that they can attend the County Livestock Show.

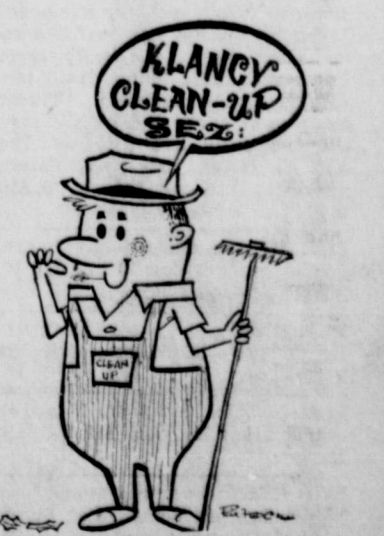
Supt. Wendell Siebert said there would be no classes at all Friday. He also announced that the Easter holidays would begin Friday, March 31 and continue through April 3.

Governor Recommends Driver Education for Safer Traffic

Governor Price Daniel recently congratulated "State and local officials traffic safety organizations, groups and millions of Texas drivers who, in 1960, helped to produce the State's best traffic safety record in eleven years."

The Governor, referring to official report for 1960 released recently by the Department of Public Safety, said the records show 199 fewer traffic deaths than in 1959, and 357 fewer deaths than in 1956, the worst traffic year in Texas history.

"This was an 8 percent reduction in traffic deaths as compared to 1959 and 13.67 percent less than the 1956 death toll," Daniel said.

The Governor said the all-out, statewide effort in 1960 "climaxed four years of a traffic safety crusade that began as soon as I took office and will continue at least as long as I am Governor. We have now proven that it is possible to get the attention of enough Texas drivers to make a significant improvement in saving lives, reducing injuries and cutting down the number of crashes. "We can save even more lives each year," the Governor continued, "if the Legislature will enact the additional laws which I have recommended. These include driver education, stronger driver licensing provisions, additional highway patrolmen and better salaries for patrolmen, chemical test law for DWI cases, and a system of traffic courts."

"Now that we know it is possible to do a better job of saving lives by reducing the number of crashes, the Governor said, "I hope the Legislature will be encouraged to take decisive action on our legislative program. The Members can now do this with full knowledge that their action will be accepted by all law-abiding Texans and that such action will effectively save more lives. The Governor pointed out that 1960 statistics are "almost sensationally good when they show an eight percent reduction in deaths, 10 percent reduction in injuries, 14 percent reduction in total crashes and 30 percent reduction in estimated economic losses" over 1959.

Sheep and Goat Raisers to Meet At Mineral Wells

A wool and mohair clinic will highlight the 1961 Spring Quarterly Directors' Meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, which will be held in Mineral Wells March 24 and 25.

The clinic, conducted by Texas Agricultural Extension Service personnel, will get under way at 3 p.m. Friday, March 24 at the National Guard Armory, located east of Mineral Wells on US 180.

Following the clinic, which will be devoted primarily to wool and mohair preparation for market, parasite disease control, and improvement through selection of sheep and goats, a lamb and goat barbecue will be served at 5:30 p.m. According to TS&GRA President Charles Schreiner III of Kerrville, "a large number of wool and mohair growers in Palo Pinto and surrounding counties are expected to attend the clinic in addition to directors and members of the Association from West and Central Texas. The clinic should prove to be of special interest to mohair producers in the Mineral Wells area which has seen a recent marked increase in goat population."

Subcommittees of the three major TS&GRA committees, Wool and Mohair, General Affairs, and a Livestock will convene Saturday at 10 a.m. in the Baker Hotel. Discussions will include wool and mohair marketing information, sheep and goat improvement programs, ranch labor problems, livestock theft and predatory animal control, animal health matters, and lamb marketing. The recently inaugurated Field Representative Program of the TS&GRA, designed to expand the Association's efforts to curb sheep and goat theft, will be presented. Agricultural water, tax, and transportation matters also will be on the agenda for discussion. A representative of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants will lead the discussion on tax matters in the tax subcommittee. The general session will convene at 1:30 Saturday afternoon in the Baker, at which time committees will report the results of their meetings and other general business will be discussed.

A reception and dance will be provided for the enjoyment of the delegates Friday evening in the Baker. The Saturday noon luncheon will feature an address by Bob Murphey of Nacogdoches. Murphey is well-known for his East Texas backwoods wit, and has appeared at many banquets, civic meetings, etc., across the state.

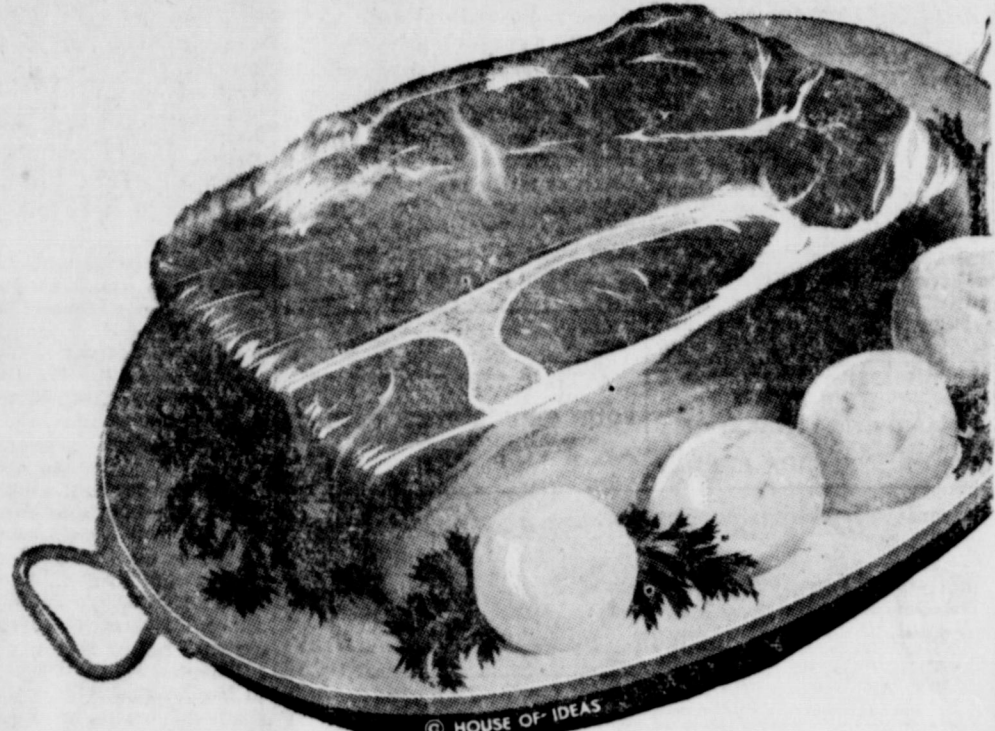

This tribute was written by Will Rogers to his sister: Today, as I write this, I am not in the Follies, the carefree

comedian who jokes about everything. I am out in Oklahoma among my people, my Cherokee people, who don't expect a laugh for everything I say. Back home at the funeral of my sister. She and my other sister started in this little western town—Chelsea, Oklahoma—some 35 years ago. They helped build the Methodist Church, the first church there. They have helped every movement that they knew was for the best upbuilding of their community. They have each raised a large family of boys and girls who are today a credit to their community. They have carried on the same as thousands of women have carried on in every small and big town in the world. They don't think they are doing anything out of the ordinary. They don't want credit. They do good simply because they don't know any other thing to do.

Death didn't scare her. It was only an episode in her life. If you live right, death is a joke to you as far as fear is concerned.

After all, there is nothing in the world like home. You can roam all over the world, but after all, it's what the people at home think of you that really counts. I have just today witnessed a funeral that for real sorrow and affection I don't think will ever be surpassed anywhere. They came in every mode of conveyance, on foot, in buggies, horseback, wagons, cars and trains and there wasn't a soul that came that she hadn't helped or favored at one time or another.

Some uniformed newspapers printed: "Mrs. C. L. Lane sister of the famous comedian, Will Rogers." They were greatly misinformed. It's the other way around. I am the brother of Mrs. C. L. Lane, "The Friend of Humanity." And all the honors that I could ever in my wildest dreams hope to reach, would never equal the honor paid on a little western prairie hilltop, among her people, to Maud Lane. If they will love me like that at the finish, my life will not have been in vain.

AUSTIN REPORT

Last week the 57th Texas House of Representatives moved into the second half of the regular session and many bills which have been under consideration in the various committees will now start making their way to the floor of the House to be voted upon.

There has been much discussion on spending during this session but last week the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, with president J. Carter King, Jr., of Albany as its chief spokesman had much to say about the other side of the coin—saving money. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce added up the savings proposed in all the studies and bills introduced and concluded that the total of these could not only pay off the deficit, but would also go far in financing growth. These bills and studies were aimed at eliminating or cutting down various special funds, programs, and forms of State aid which were thought to have outgrown or out lived their usefulness. I want to take this opportunity to thank the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and its president, for its effort in this matter. The people of West Texas can be justly proud of this thoughtful and dynamic organization.

Bills passed by the House last week include: HB-239, to require Republicans to file as candidates for convention nomination by the same date the Democratic nomination-seekers must file; HJR-5, allowing a vote on whether cities can issue bonds up to 20 cents on the \$100, to build factory buildings for sale or lease to industry; HB-63, putting all countries on the jury wheel system.

The coming of Spring to Austin has brought with it an increasing number of school groups from our district who line the balconies and galleries of the House. Last week I was pleased to receive a visit from a group of students from Putnam and this week I

expect to see students from Cisco High School and the Government class of Ranger College. I sincerely urge and invite more of such visits so that the student can observe and appreciate the workings of his state legislature.

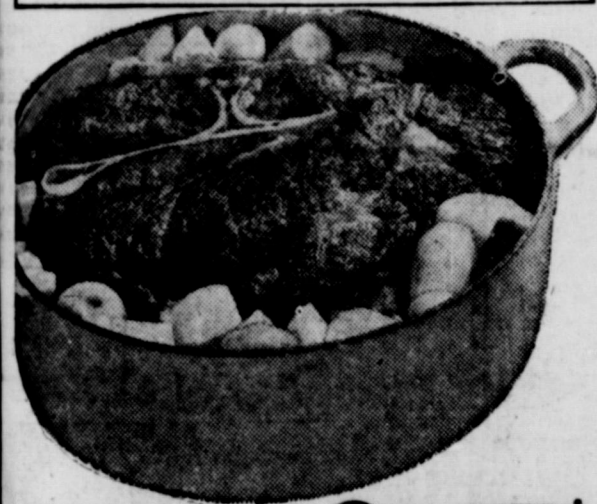

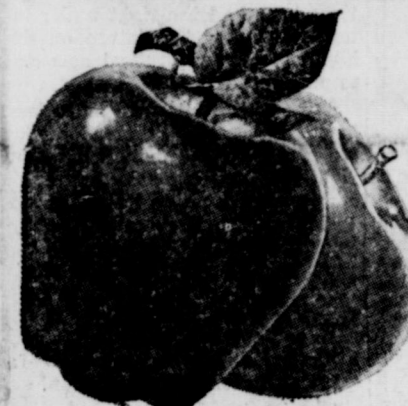

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

Despite what most people think, venereal diseases are not a thing of the past. Case rates over the entire nation are showing a decided increase.

In keeping with the national trend, Texas State Department of Health statistical records show that there has been an overall increase of 93 percent in primary and secondary syphilis for 1960 compared to 1959 in Texas.

"This is sufficient reason for concern," a State Health Department official recently declared, "but it pales in comparison to the concern we feel about the 112 percent increase among youngsters under 19 years of age."

Gonorrhea statistics have indicated similar increases. Improved epidemiological techniques which rapidly uncover more cases of venereal diseases, may be a partial reason for the rise in statistics concerning the diseases. "Epidemiologists" are highly trained disease investigators.

These investigators thoroughly scrutinize each link in chains of infection to insure that all persons in need of examination are placed under medical observation.

Investigation is aimed at persons who are the original source of infection as well as persons to whom the patient may have spread the infection. This service is made available through local health de-

partments to public clinics and private physicians.

Today, State Health Department epidemiologists use long-distance telephone calls, enabling speedy intercity — even interstate — communication, via telephone, to

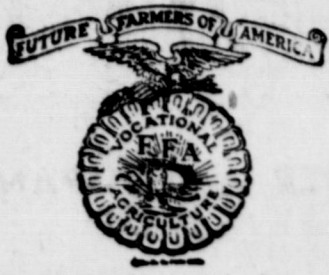
trace down elusive cases which may move from area to area.

The lightning-fast results obtained from telephone calls, permits locating and curing infectious cases before further spread of the disease.

Increased epidemiological and educational efforts, especially among teenagers, is urged by State Health Department authorities.

One pamphlet—What Everyone Should Know About Syphilis and Gonorrhea—was recently made

available by the Texas Department of Health. Schools, PTA groups, organizations may obtain request from their local department or the State Department in Austin.

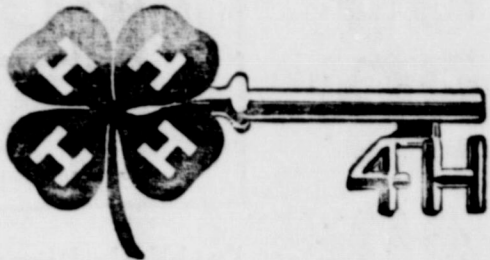

You will find strange words in the U. S. Constitution: "Congress has the power to define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations." No man owns the high seas, and no nation rules it. So that when a crime like piracy takes place, the law does not look upon it as against any one nation, but against the law of nations.

For centuries, all maritime nations have had the right under international law to capture on the high seas guilty piratical acts and to punish them.

Piracy is an international crime, but each country punishes it under its own laws. Any nation has the right and duty to police the high seas, and any pirate loses the protection of the flag he may be flying.

As one court put it, the pirate is "treated as an outlaw, as an enemy of all mankind."

How far this idea of the "enemy of mankind" may go, is now a question before world opinion.

The treaty of Versailles, for example, held that Germans who had broken the law and customs of war should go to trial before the courts of the victors.

World War I Germans did not face trial but those of World War II did and were convicted at Nuremberg. The right of victors to try war criminals has been warmly argued ever since. The forthcoming Eichman trial in Israel has created additional debate in recent months.

Where did we get the idea that there is a law of nations?

It has come to us through centuries of international trade, commerce, war and treaty making. Chiefly it came down through Roman law, and found expression in the belief that God decreed a law of nature through man's reason which is binding on men and nations.

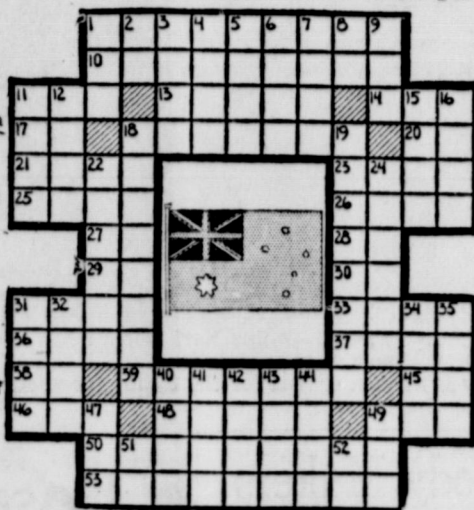

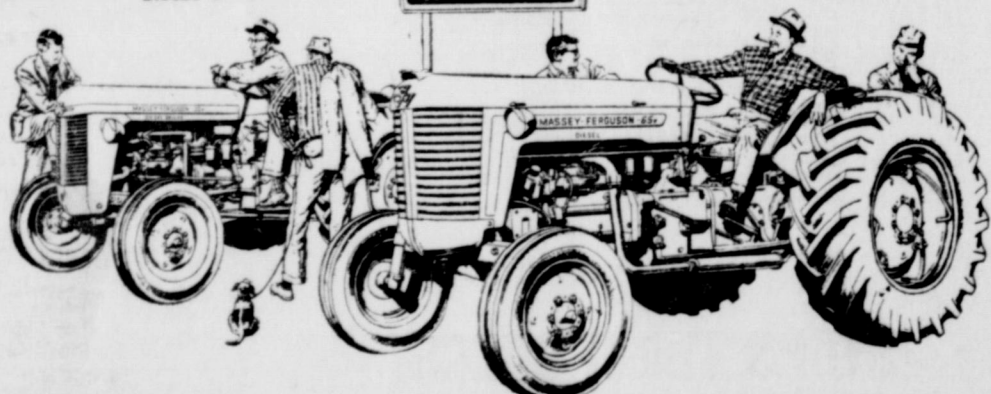
