670 Register For 'M' Night Meeting

A capacity crowd of 670 people heard Dr. W. H. (Dub) Jackson, Southern Baptist missionary to Japan, speak at the First Baptist Church Monday night.

Dr. Jackson, speaking on the theme "Lengthen and Strengthen," encouraged the workers from the various churches represented to strengthen their home churches in order that Baptist missionaries could lengthen their ministry around the world.

The service was the annual "M Night Meeting of the Cisco Baptist Association. This meeting was promoted by the Training Union organization of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Thirty-four of the 39 churches in the Cisco Association were represented. There were 24 pastors present. The goal for the meeting had been set for 600.

FINED \$400 Parker Found Guilty Aggravated Assault

Hoye Parker, Breckenridge area rancher, was found guilty of aggravated assault by a 91st District Court jury in Eastland Tuesday and fined \$400.

The jury was out about an hour and a half, and Foreman J. W. Elder Sr. read the verdict about 9:30 p.m.

The case grew out of an incident at a cafe in Eastland last March.

During the defense testimony Tuesday afternoon, a parade of 14 character witnesses testified to Parker's quiet, peaceable, law-

abiding nature and attested to his good reputation.

Questioned jointly, in what some called unusual courtroom procedure, the following men answered "yes" to his truthfulness: Sam Kinbell and Punk Thornton, both of Cisco, Sloan Baker, C. W. Wilkey, A. J. Nehaffey, Bill Pembrough Porter McConnell, Johnny Tomlin, Sam Ball, O. Tomlin, George Thorp, Clarence Comp-ton, Toby Boies and Don Crenshaw, all of Breckenridge.

John Robertson and James Henderson, both of Ranger, both testified to having talked with Parker on the day of the incident.

"You get a funny feeling watching something like that," Johnny Justice said Tuesday morning in 91st District Court in Eastland during cross examination in a felony case in which a Breckenridge man is being tried for assault with intent to murder.

Justice was describing an incident which allegedly happened last March 3rd at a cafe on the west edge of Eastland.

On trial was Hoye Parker of Breckenridge.

A 91st District Court grand jury indicted Parker and his son, H. C., for assaulting Harmon C. (Shorty) Ables, with the intent to murder.

The trial was slow getting started this week when a venue of about 50 citizens were called, as potential jurors. All did not appear and the court instructed officers to go and bring those who had not appeared.

A jury was finally selected at 4:10 p.m. Monday, and testimony got underway.

Jurors hearing the Parker case are G. T. Dawkins, C. A. Nance, J. W. Elder Sr., Arthur Deffenbach, J. F. Alderman, Mrs. F. L. Crawford, J. J. Holder, R. O. Buckley, Wilson W. Meglasson, D. C. Arterburn, Mrs. Bruce Putler and Lee Culewell.

Justice was one of several witnesses who took the stand Tuesday.

According to Justice's testimony, he and his wife had driven up to the cafe about 9:30 p.m. and Ables and someone else was sitting in Ables' car in front of the cafe. Another man, whom he identified as Hoye Parker, was standing outside the auto talking with Ables.

"Don't run off," Justice quoted Ables saying, and the elder Parker told him to go on into the cafe. And, he and his wife did go on in, Justice said.

He testified that he saw Parker "punch" Ables several times through the open auto door, and that he saw the C. H. Parker with a pistol.

LIVES IN OKLAHOMA NOW Former Eastland Resident Flew With VIPs, Including Ike

Mrs. R. B. Hall — an Eastland native, an accomplished musician, a graduate in English with a degree, and one of four airline hostesses to accompany former President Dwight D. Eisenhower on his goodwill tour of South and Central America — has come to live in Frederick, Okla., with her husband who is minister of music at First Baptist Church.

Mrs. Hall has had enough experience in her one year as an airline hostess to last her a lifetime. It was a dream of hers to become an airline hostess since she was a child, and her dream came true after her graduation from Waco's Baylor University.

Leaving her home town of Eastland, she was interviewed for a hostess job at Baylor and passed. Then she flew to Atlanta for a further interview and that day she also read where another airline was interviewing applicants also.

The second airline accepted her immediately and two weeks later she was on her way to becoming hostess never thinking that her dreams of youth would be fulfilled and that so many exciting things would happen — even if for only a year.

Mrs. Hall — then Miss Helen Taylor — began her six-week training as a stewardess on one of the jets. She learned to speak Spanish as the planes went to South and Central American countries, on many islands.

The most exciting trip she made was the day "the telephone rang and it was my boss telling me to get ready for a charter trip for a very special person. My curiosity was aroused as charter trips are always extra-special and finally he told me the "special" person was President Eisenhower and that my roommate and I were one of the four hostesses to be chosen for the 15-day trip. I almost fainted."

"We left Washington the latter part of February and returned to the U. S. March 6. The president had his own plane, the Columbine, and also a jet and then our plane took the press, reporters, and photographers had to take care of 130 men and women."

"Our plane usually landed one hour before the president's did so the photographers could be set to take photographs. We stayed three days at Ramey Air Force Base in Puerto Rico and it was during this time we got to visit personally with the president. He was very nice."

Mrs. Hall said every trip was exciting and one of the hardest things she had to get used to was the weather.

"Part of the countries we would visit would be having their winter weather and others summer. After the first few flights, I never left without taking my bathing suit and my winter coat, and I always got to wear both before I got home. Sometimes we would start out on a trip for overnight and it might be two weeks before we would turn if the chartered members desired to stay longer. I learned to take enough clothing to last after the first few trips. The return if the chartered members time element was also confusing at first. In some parts of the country it would be daylight at 9:30 p. m. and then at 5:30 the sun would be up again.

Among her trips was the experience of meeting with Castro's men in Cuba. There was one exciting time when they were already to take off at the air-

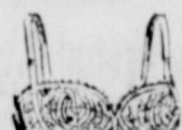

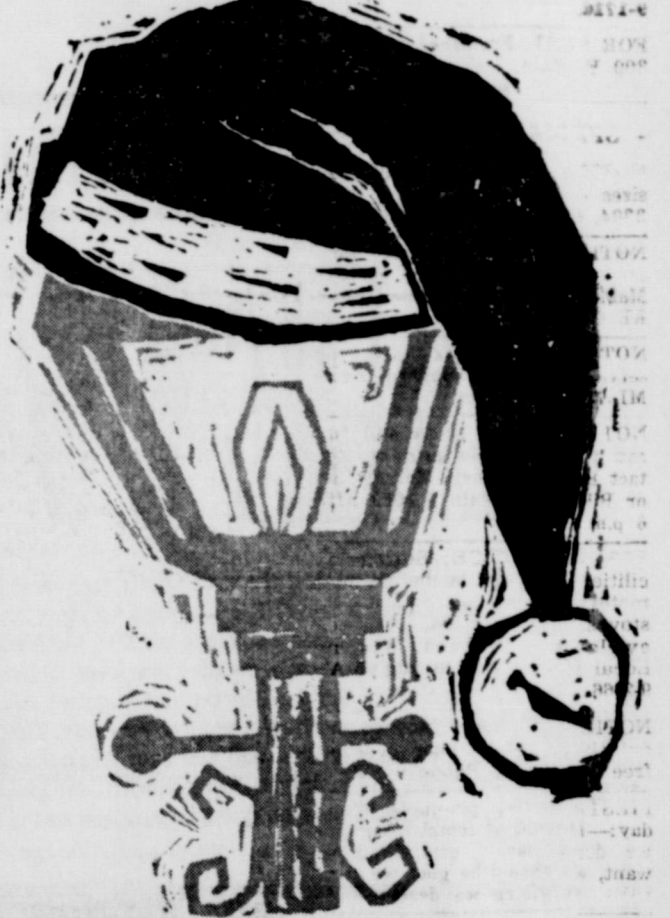

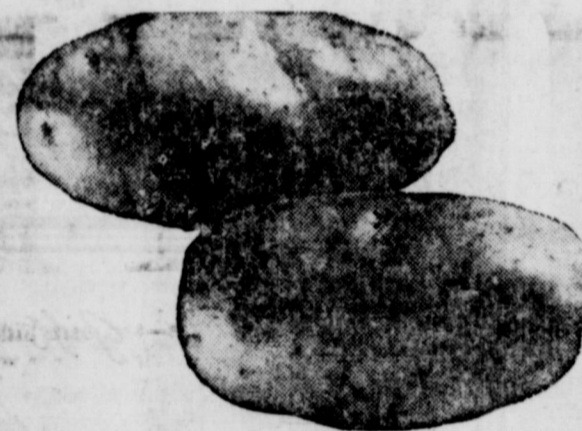

A FEATURE OF the Christmas season each year is the many colorful decorations that you see in increasing numbers as the year moves toward its end. Driving down south the other night, we noted that all cities in the area had donned their yuletide dress.

Rising Star has streamers of multicolored lights with a number of huge stars outlined with electric lights. The big community building in Rising Star is framed with lights and a huge Christmas scene glows on the front lawn — an impressive sight indeed.

At May, there are light streamers across the highway. Brownwood has elaborate streamers across the business streets with a star at the city's entrance. These show up pretty well in the daytime, too.
