





Explanation of estimated receipts: 1. Local maintenance taxes based on a combined property valuation of \$18,012,320, with a maintenance tax rate of \$1.25, and 90 per cent collection of taxes.

2. Debt service taxes, based on valuation of \$18,012,320, with a bond tax rate of \$.25 (service old debt requirements), and 90 per cent collection.

3. County available fund, furnished by Texas Education Agen-

State Per Capita, furnished by the Agency. 5. Foundation Program Funds, furnished by the Agency.

Explanation of estimated disbursements:

1. Administration, based on the state average for school systems of this size and property values.

2. Instruction, based on 78% of current expenditures being spent for salaries of principals, teachers, supervisors, libraries, audiovisual aids, newspapers, periodicals, teaching supplies, clerical salaries for instruction and travel of instructional personnel. This is the state average for schools of this size.

3. Transporation, based on the state allowance furnished to this writer by the Texas Education Agency, plus \$5,000. The additional money may not be needed after the survey, but it certainly is a safe figure. If it does not prove necessary, it could be used to advantage in the instructional program.

4. All other estimated expenditures are based on state averages for systems of this size except health services. A nurse's salary is
