## Interstate 20 **Hearing Set** Wednesday

A public hearing to discuss 'design" of Interstate 20 through Eastland County will be held in the County Court-room in Eastland Wednesday, Jan. 15th, beginning at 10 a.

Under construction from the west county boundary line to the western city limits of Cisco, Interstate 20 is due to be completed through the county by 1970, Resident Engineer R. P. (Buddy) Haun reported.

The meeting Wednesday was expected to be similar to that held in Ranger recently, at which the Highway Department officials explained that the meeting was for the purpose of discussing the "d e sign" of the highway and not the "location."

The location was decided, Department says, in a public hearing held by the Bureau of Roads in 1957.




