Eastland County voters said "no" to consolidating their schools Saturday, with a loud, loud voice.

The number of votes cast Saturday is believed to be a record for a special issue.

In all there were 3,542 votes cast with only 487 persons indicating they wanted consolidation of the Ranger, Eastland, Olden, Carbon and Desdemona school districts.

Marking their ballots against consolidation were 3,055 voters in the six districts.

Not a single district carried for the measure which has been brewing in this county for two years.

In all the issue was defeated by about six to one over the six districts.

The Gorman district recorded the greatest ratio of negative in defeating consolidation almost 19 to 1.

Carbon said "No" by about 13 to 1 and the one district which had been reported to be most likely to favor the measure, Desdemona, voted 12 to 1 against it.

It was a heavy vote all day long.

In Eastland E. E. Layton, election judge, had to order more ballots printed about 3 p.m. when his original supply of 1,000 ran low. In all 1,022 valid votes were cast in the county seat town—five votes were disqualified in Eastland.

Ranger neared the end of their supplies when 908 voters marched in.

In Olden, 236 votes were cast, in what Mrs. O. H. Dick, judge, said was the heaviest vote in a special election in about five years.

Eastland's vote was the heaviest recorded in recent years in a special election.

All boxes were reported in by 7:45 p.m. and there was a good crowd at the County Clerk's office waiting the returns.

In the last county-wide special election, the special Senatorial run-off last May, there were only 2,798 votes cast.

Eastland's vote was about 5 to 1 against, which is about the lowest ratio for the six districts.

It was reasoned that the 260 voted "for" in Eastland probably was the result of it being the home of the issue's leading proponent, Dr. James Whittington, and Mrs. Joseph Perkins, chairman of the recently-organized Six District Committee for Better Education.

Voters in Ranger voted 8 to 1 against joining the districts.

His loudest opponent, Eastland Mayor Cyrus Frost, who went to bat in a public debate several weeks ago, issued the following statement concerning the results of the election. "The excellence of our pre-

C-C Directors Hear Republican Hayes

The board of directors of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce heard O. W. (Bill) Hayes, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor, fire a verbal broadside at political corruption, particularly in Harris County.

Hayes, en route to Wellington to deliver a major speech tonight, he borrowed from the speech for his talk here.

He was introduced by County Republican Chairman Bill Crocker, whom Hayes had called from Cisco.

The remarks made in Eastland concerning Harris County were also released to the major wire services to be released Friday morning.

Hayes, a Temple farm equipment manufacturer and business man was the first Republican to announce for office this year.

Currently listed in the 1961 edition of the "World Who's Who in Commerce and Industry," he spent 13 years in professional baseball, nine of which were as a general manager. In 1938, he received the U. S. Baseball Congress National Good Sportsmanship award.

"I'm not a conservative—I'm a firm conservative," he says.

The Texas legislature has drawn strong criticism from Hayes during his campaign.

His Eastland appearance was the 211th speaking engagement.

The directors also heard two brief committee reports and gave authority to purchase a duplicating machine for the chamber office.

Frank Sayre, highway committee chairman, reported on his and Manager Lee Ellis' recent attendance at the Interstate 20 meeting in Big Spring.

Dues re-evaluation work is progressing satisfactorily. Membership Chairman Bill Crocker reported, and new members are being added regularly.

The duplicating machine will be brought in a joint effort by the chamber and two other organizations.

Joe Burkett, Former Judge Buried in San Antonio

Joe Burkett, former district judge, 91st District Court here, and former county judge, died in San Antonio Saturday and was buried Monday, March 12th, in San Antonio.

Mr. Burkett practiced law in Eastland during the oil boom days and was well known in the district.

He moved to San Antonio in 1925 and was associated in the practice of law with Hosea C. Dakan, also a former Eastland resident for several years until he was appointed special district judge of Bexar County when he and Dakan dissolved partnership. Mr. Dakan still is engaged in law practice in San Antonio.

Mr. Burkett served several terms as special district judge in San Antonio, and at the time of his death was a candidate for the 150th District Court.

He was 76 years old, and was active up until his death.

County Livestock Show Expected To Be 'Biggest'

The 1962 Eastland County Livestock Show, March 30-31, is expected to be the largest ever held, according to Ross Wilson, Gorman, president of the County Livestock Association, sponsor of the annual affair.

Ben McKinnis, Eastland, General Superintendent, informed Wilson recently that 701 animals had been entered. The largest division will be fat lambs, with 270 entered.

McKinnis said that a total of 105 sheep will be entered in the breeding classes. Sixty goats, 140 fat pigs, as well as 53 sows and gilts will be exhibited.

Twenty-seven dairy animals, 19 head of beef animals, and 27 fat steers are also entered.

All animals must be entered and in their places by 11:00

A.M. on the opening day.

Breeding classes are open to both adults and F.F.A. and 4-H Club members. The junior exhibitors must be enrolled in a public school to be eligible to show. Adults will compete for ribbons only. The F.F.A. and 4-H Club Boys and Girls will compete for the 2,000.00 in cash premiums to be awarded the winners.

Entries are limited to two animals per class in both breeding and fat divisions, except for F.F.A. Chapters or 4-H Clubs. These can show a total of 5 animals.

Brandy Humphreys, Eastland rancher, is assistant superintendent. Park Plambeck, Pleasant Hill, and Charles Veale, Ranger, are superintendents of the swine division of the show. Billy Bacon, Cisco, Don Bradford, Ranger, and C. E. Bridge, Olden, will have charge of the sheep and goat division. Lee J. Williamson, Olden, is superintendent of the dairy cattle. Joe Criswell, Angus breeder, Rising Star, and Jerry Chaney, Eastland, will superintend the beef cattle and fat steers.

Other officers of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association include Waverly Massengale, vice president, Glyn Gilliam, secretary, and C. M. McCain, treasurer. All are from Eastland.

Five years ago, in 1957, the share had climbed to 68.3 percent, and during the five-year period, 1957-1961, the percentage increased 8.5 percent from 68.3 to 76.8 percent.

When Paul wrote to the Hebrews, in the tenth chapter and the twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth verses, he said:

I belong to a service club that meets once a week. They not only expect me to be present, they demand perfect attendance. If I miss I must make up by attending a similar club in another town the same week I am absent. Loyalty is of primary importance.

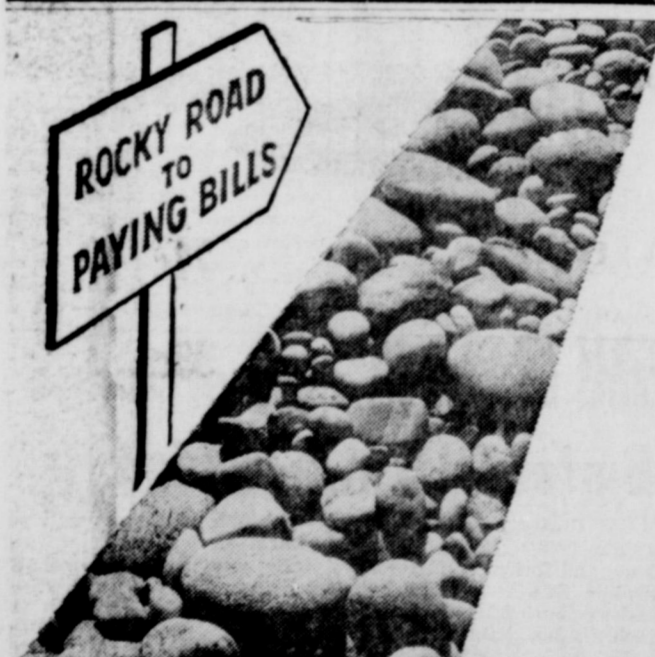

Antees Don't Show, \$50 Check Goes Back

Since the election was not county-wide, and involved only six of the county's nine school districts, the absentee ballots were not required to be counted separately.

After absentee deadline Tuesday, the ballots were delivered to the voting precinct to which they belonged, and were counted by the precinct judge along with ballots cast in person Saturday.

Had the election been county-wide, the county clerk would have counted the absentee ballots as a separate box.

Records are kept of course, of the absentee ballots cast in absenteeism at the courthouse, and the number returned to each precinct.

The total of 90 was extremely heavy, even though it was considerably below what was cast in the last general election.

Reports are that the 90 absentee votes is about equal to a primary election in this county, where 140 votes were cast last year before election day. Naturally, in a primary, voting is from over the entire county.

The 90 is high when it is considered that in Saturday's vote there was only one issue, whereas in a primary there are generally several issues at stake.

\$50 Check Goes Back

Six-District Committee for Better Education has been returned.

A check for that amount, with a letter explaining that the committee wanted to help the involved districts pay for the cost of holding the consolidation election Saturday, was mailed to County Judge John Hart this past week.

Judge Hart returned the check accompanied by a letter which read in part:

"Dr. J. C. Whittington 'We hereby acknowledge receipt of the March 14th letter signed by Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins and accompanying check in the amount of \$50, signed by you.

"It was stated in the letter that the check was money secured from voluntary contributions and was given to the County to be applied to the election expenses of the March 17th relative to the proposed school consolidation referendum.

"The expenses of this school consolidation referendum will be born by the six different school districts involved and not by Eastland County.

"The Attorney General of Texas has ruled that the county cannot bear the school consolidation referend-

um expense. We notified the Presidents of the Board of Trustees of the six different school districts involved to this effect in a letter to them under date of Feb. 20th.

"We are therefore returning the \$50 check to you and should we receive any further contributions toward said expense we shall return same to the sender."

His work in experimenting in color genetics, hair pigment of mice producing such colors as red, lilac, blue, etc. brought him national fame in this field.

Cinematographer for National Newsreels filming such celebrities as Ex-president Truman, Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, Cecil B. DeMille, John Hopkins, the Piccard Brothers, and many news events has given Larson a wide scope and

understanding of world affairs. Larson is also an author and writer, some of his subjects being treatises on "Tropical Fish", "Trick and Fancy Roping", and "People and their Hobbies".



7. No person shall be elected a Director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the District. No members of the governing body of the City of Ranger or the City of Eastland and no employee of either of said Cities shall be elected a Director.

8. Notice of said election shall be given by publishing a copy of this order in the "Ranger Times" and in the "Eastland Telegram", newspapers of general circulation published within said District, one time, such publication to be at least ten (10) days before the date herein set for said election.

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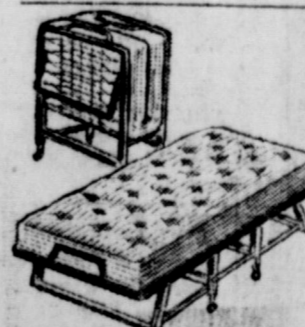
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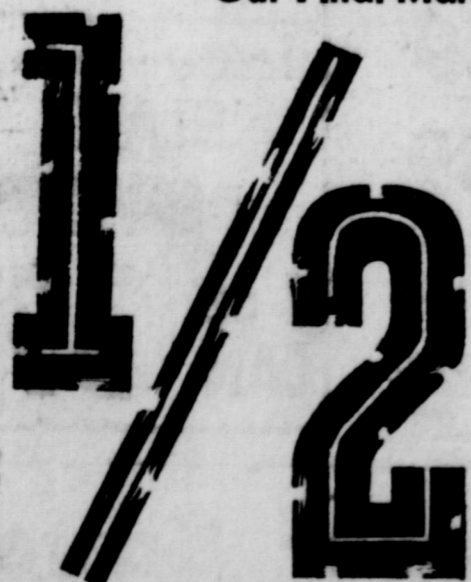
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
