# Lake Leon Is Big Gainer In Deluge Here

Torrential rainfall drenched Eastland County late Wednesday afternoon and night and gauge readings in Eastland ranged from 10.42 to 11 inches, five inches of this amount falling in an hour and three-quarters.

Eastland Lake had been flowing

four feet deep in the spillway for several hours early Thursday. Lake Leon, with 35-mile shoreline, built to serve both Eastland and Ranger, reportedly was within twelve feet of full at 9 a. m. Thursday and rising at between 12 to 18 inches an hour.

Larry E. McGraw of the Water Board visited Lake Leon Thursday morning and, upon his return, estimated that the big lake will fill "not later than midnight tonight—even if no more rain falls today."

Mr. McGraw said that he had figured the torrential rain would damage farmlands heavily, but that he and County Agent Cooper and Assistant County Agent Higgins, who were with him on the trip into the country, were amazed at the way "the rows held," and the small damage which had occurred on the farms.

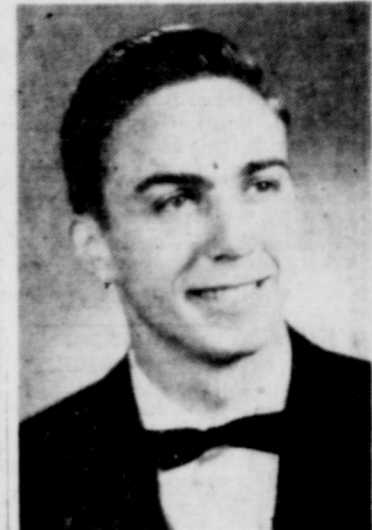
The deluge in Eastland caused damage to streets but it was not as high as it otherwise would have been had not 90 blocks of graveled streets been salt-stabilized previously.

Lowland areas in the vicinity of both the North and South Forks of the Leon River were inundated and in the north section of Eastland where there is a negro community, numerous residents were evacuated during the night.

National guard units from both Cisco and Ranger assisted and Eastland City Manager A. E. Taylor said there had been wonderful co-operation, with boats offered from all surrounding towns. The Red Cross offered to send in a flood relief kitchen but it was believed it would not be needed by the evacuees, as a committee headed by Police Chief Ray Laney and County Assessor - Collector Stanley Webb was busy arranging any necessary care for them. Mr. Taylor stated. He said the basement of the jail had 4 feet of water in it and that water had invaded two or three low-land businesses.

Southwestern Bell Telephone line crews were having a busy time at Eastland, where 400 phones were out Thursday morning, but Dist. Manager Frank Sayre of the Texas Electric Service Company said that his facilities weren't hit hard and such service calls as were occasioned in the area had been taken care of by 9:30 p. m. Wednesday. He said that he was informed by the Leon Plant of the company that 8,000-acre feet of water had been turned loose by 8:30 a. m. and would add to the supply in Lake Leon.

City authorities at Eastland had learned of no injuries.

June 3, 1955, is the final date for making application for release acreage.

June 18, 1955, is the final date for releasing 1955 peanut acreage. June 20, 1955, is the final date for making application for release acreage.

"If producers do not intend to plant the peanut and cotton acreage the acreage should be released. If the acreage is released the farm will receive credit history and an allotment will come back to the farm for 1956," it was announced.

## Sheriff's Posse To Perform In Ranger Parade

Ranger has sent a special invitation to all residents in this area to attend their giant Armed Forces Day Parade, military display and public barbecue, Saturday, May 21.

The parade will wind down the streets of Ranger at 4 p. m. while the display will begin at the National Guard Armory immediately following the parade. The barbecue, also, at the Armory, will begin at 6 p. m.

Tickets for the barbecue will be on sale for 75 cents each beginning today. Spokesmen guarantee all you can eat for six-bits.

Included at the display at the Armory will be a M-41 tank, one of the Army's newest lethal weapons and an Air Force helicopter. The public will be allowed to enter each of the units. Also, rides will be furnished children in various types of the equipment.

Units from over the entire county are planning to enter the parade. Also, marching troops from Walters Air Force Base in Mineral Wells will perform, as will the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse, a number of high school bands, the Rangemans of Ranger Junior College plus a post of other entries.

Low flying jet aircraft will scream over the city during intervals during the day.

More than 500 persons are expected for barbecue while at least 8,000 are expected to gather for the parade.

Nearly 27 cities within Eastland County will be represented by some entry in the huge parade, that will be highlighted by its military flavor.

All servicemen who attend the barbecue in uniform will be fed free of charge. Arrangements have been made for 150 of these servicemen.

With considerable interest and satisfaction, we have learned of the likelihood of numerous unpaved streets' being hot-topped within the next few weeks. It's a property-owners-city participation arrangement that is quite economical for the owners—about 35¢ per lineal foot material cost (for a twenty-foot depth side), as the city furnishes the labor without charge. Last year this plan resulted in the topping of twenty-blocks. Property owners of several blocks have turned in their payments this season, thus far, and it is believed likely the number of blocks to be paved this year will be around last year's figure before all's said and done. An improvement like this means a lot to the individual property; it means a lot to the community, too. All success to the program.

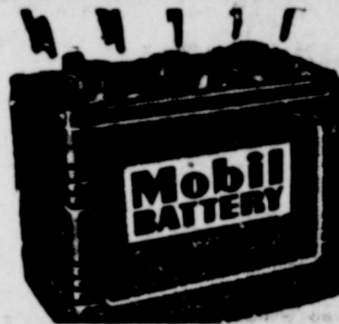

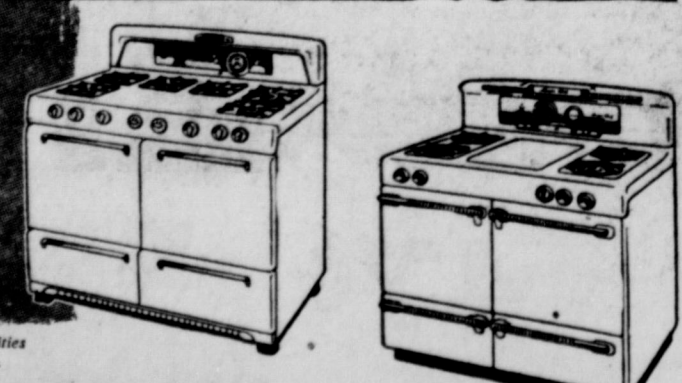

### FAMOUS TEXANS' RECIPES

#### Glamorous Cattle-Raiser Picks Beef and Kidney Pie



Greer Garson

Fort Worth—Beef & Kidney Pie, a legacy from her native England, wins praise for Texas' most glamorous cattle-raiser, Greer Garson. The casserole is admired by the celebrated actress' Texas friends almost as much as her prize winning herd of all white beef Shorthorns which she imported from Scotland.

Miss Garson, wife of Dallas oil executive, E. E. Fogelson, exercised her rights to Texas citizenship five years ago when she purchased the small pure-bred Shorthorn herd and began to expand it. Currently, Mrs. Fogelson is engaged in a cross-breeding experimental program with the object of producing a new type of beef. When asked to name her favorite beef recipe for the Texas Beef Council's "Famous Texan" collection, Miss Garson narrowed it down to three, each expressing her personality. The publishers plan to include all three in the book which is now being compiled. Rich in taste, delicate in spicing, the following recipe serves six.

**Beef and Kidney Pie**  
2 pounds top sirloin (or triangle) cut 1/2" square

2 beef kidneys cut 1/2" pieces  
4 ounces chopped onions  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 clove garlic chopped  
2 tablespoons tomato puree  
1 cup sherry (or dry red wine) salt, pepper, thyme, parsley to taste  
1 bay leaf (optional)  
1/2 pound mushrooms, fourthed  
1 egg, beaten

Saute beef rapidly, remove from pan, drain. Saute kidneys, drain off excess grease and water. Combine beef and kidneys; return to pot; stir in onions and brown. Blend in flour, chopped garlic, tomato puree and wine. Add enough water to cover, mix in seasonings, and simmer two hours. In separate container, saute mushrooms; add to beef and kidney mixture when cooked. Pour into baking dish; cover with

#### Pie Crust Dough

3/4 pound flour  
3/4 cup cold water  
6 ounces salted butter  
Combine flour and water; spread dough on table. Place butter in center. Fold dough over the butter (like a book). Roll it with rolling pin. Fold it twice and let rest 20 minutes; fold it twice more and wait 20 minutes and repeat the process a third time. Roll dough out 1/4-inch thick and cover the beef-kidney mixture. Brush top with beaten egg to give a golden color to crust. Bake in moderate oven (350°) for about 30 minutes.

### Cool Pants Are the Fashion for Stylish Babies

IN warm weather, the most stylish babies wear the very least. A diaper, plus an undershirt if the doctor recommends it, is the minimum that means high style for the chopped-spinach set.

Mother looks yearningly at those old, waterproof panties when the heat-rash season comes on. She'd really love to pop them on baby, but she's unwilling to make her precious that warm.

A brand-new kind of baby apparel may solve her dilemma. They're of tissue-thin latex, stretchy as can be. But the remarkable news is the inside of these toddler style-setters. The inside is of a fleecy fabric that means real coolness for the household-heir or heiress.

The maker of these pants ran some tests that may soothe mothers worried about the possible warmth inside. They found only a 1-degree difference in skin temperature between babies wearing these pants, plus diapers, and babies wearing diapers only.

These pants have scallops top and bottom to satisfy mothers who like their babies to look cute while dressed in their hot-weather minimum. No snaps, buttons or zippers for sitting or sleeping discomfort.

They can be bought by baby weight, an easier method for those whose babies won't adjust to size sizes.

Baby's all set for warm weather in these—waterproof latex pants, fabric lined to keep her cool. Who needs dusting powder? (17-18)



### Now is Time to Sow Pansies for Next Spring

While listed as annuals in the seed catalogues, pansies and their cousins the violas are really biennials. To get them in bloom early in the spring, whose cool weather they like best, sow them in mid-summer and keep them over the winter in a cold frame, or some other even simpler shelter.

The plants will hold their green leaves all winter and bloom in a cold frame as soon as the earliest spring flowers are out. If grown in the shade, with faded flowers removed promptly, they will bloom all summer.

It is easy to start a flat or two of these lovely flowers each year. Sow the seed by August 15 in soil prepared by mixing a third sharp sand, a third peat moss, and a third sifted top soil. Cover the surface with a half-inch layer of sphagnum moss, and broadcast the seed in this, with a little moss to cover them. Keep moist until the seeds germinate.

The moss will prevent damping-off, a fungus-disease which is dangerous in hot weather. Let the plants grow out in the open until fall. Then if you have a cold frame put the flat in it and cover with leaves for the winter.

Lacking a cold frame, set the flat in a protected corner, and cover. It is better to transplant the seedlings, setting them seven to eight inches apart in additional flats, but if you sowed thinly, this can be skipped and the plants left to winter in the original flat.

When the garden soil has been prepared in the spring, move the plants to a portion of the border which is on the shady side of a building. They may not grow as fast at first as plants in full sun, but they will soon catch up, and

# Cisco Stock Show To Be Held Sat.

The 2d annual registered beef calf show will get underway at Cisco Livestock Show barn here next Saturday, May 21, at 9 a.m. with approximately 50 animals entered, according to T. G. Caudle, hereford breeder and general show superintendent.

All calves in the show entered for competition will be of the same sex and will be shown in pens of three. All of them must be purebred and subject to registration. They must have been dropped on or after September 1,

1954. Each breeder may show two pens if he chooses. They may be two pens of the same sex or one pen of bulls and one of heifers.

A pen of mixed sex or individual animals may be shown for exhibit purposes only. The livestock will be in their places by 9 a.m. and may be released by 4 p.m. of the same day, officials said.

Each exhibitor is responsible for the panels for his pen or pens of calves. Ed Huestis, Cisco, ground superintendent, asks that all panels be brought in the day before, if at all possible, and set up.

The calves shown will have been fed in any way the breeder desired with the exception that none have suckled any cow except their own dam.

The quality of the animals are expected to be high, according to Sutton Crofts, president of the Cisco Livestock Show Association, sponsors of the show, and Supt. Caudle.

# Lovely Summer Flowers Can Be Grown from Bulbs

Beginners in gardening find bulbs often easier to grow than seeds. A bulb is a "package deal" containing not only an embryo plant, as the seed also does, but food to nourish it until it flowers.



There are many summer flowering bulbs which, like the gladiolus, are easy to grow and can be lifted before frost comes, and saved over winter to plant again next year. They are all attractive subjects to plant in groups near a patio or terrace, where they can be admired at leisure. They also contribute interesting flowers to the garden border, and cut flowers for home decoration.



Montbretias, cousins of the gladiolus and in a way resembling a miniature of that plant, have spikes of orange, yellow and scarlet flowers. The newer named varieties are double the size of the old timers. They show rapid increase and a few bulbs will give a fine stock for another year.

The three-cornered blooms of the tigridia or tiger flower in brilliant red, yellow or white with striking spots in the center of the flower always attract attention with their dazzling display. They are an easily grown bulb that will provide much beauty during the summer.

The summer hyacinth with its huge spike or drooping white bells catalogued as hyacinthus canadensis, is another striking subject of very easy culture that will always attract attention and serve as a focal point.

Another is the Peruvian daffodil, Ismene calathina. It really is not a daffodil at all but is a white lily-like bloom with a green trimmed cup in the center of the flower, the stalk bearing the cluster of big snowy blooms coming from an ornamental fountain of strap-shaped foliage that is attractive when the plant is not in bloom.

The little fairy lilies that send up 6 to 8-inch stems bearing rose and white blooms can be planted

in clumps and furnish a beautiful display all summer. These in the catalogue are zephyranthus, relatives of the amaryllis.

For the finest and most powerful fragrance a few bulbs of the old favorite tuberose should be planted for autumn bloom. This is an easily grown bulb that is always admired and loved for its odor.

The gorgeous tuberous begonias are fine subjects for a sheltered shady corner that you can keep well watered. They give an astonishing display. They are even finer for pots or boxes on a porch but they can't stand hot sun. They come in both double and single forms.

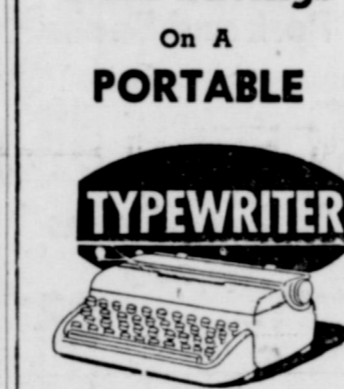

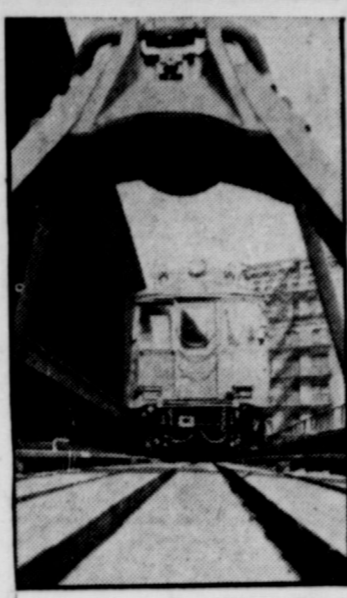

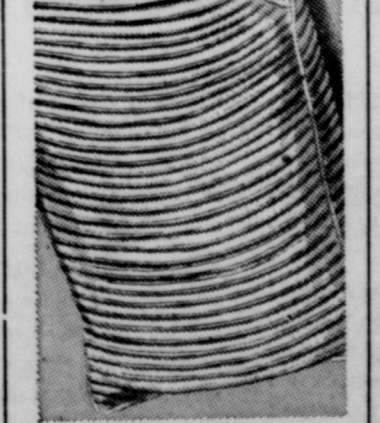

**LITTLE LEAGUE CHAT**  
By H. E. B.

When we think or say BASEBALL we immediately think or say PITCHER. That does not mean that the other positions are not important, for they are essential. But

the pitcher is the man around which the team moves. It may be of interest to take a look at the pitcher.

The pitcher need not have a blazing fast ball to be a winning pitcher. But he must develop a variety of pitches, and pinpoint control. But there is a little secret at this point. A Pitcher must have a superb CATCHER. This combination, THE BATTERY — Pitcher and Catcher, must think — act — work — and confide one in the other. Their signals must be accurate, quick, and decisive. This means study, and constant study of the batter, and train — train — train.

Little League rules for the Pitcher are—

1. An ILLEGAL PITCH is a pitch delivered to the batter when the pitcher is not in pitching position, providing batter does not hit ball. If batter hits, the pitch is legal. (4.34)

2. A PITCHER is the defensive player designed to deliver the pitch to the batter. (4.50)

3. The PITCHER'S PIVOT FOOT is that foot which is in con-

tact with the pitcher's plate or rubber as he delivers the pitch to the batter. (4.51)

4. The SET POSITION is the pitcher's position when he stands facing the batter, with his entire pivot foot on, or in front of, and in contact with, but not off the end of, the pitcher's plate and his other foot in front of the pitcher's plate, holding the ball in both hands in front of his body. (4.59)

5. WIND-UP POSITION is the pitcher's position when he stands facing the batter, his pivot foot on, or in front of and touching the pitcher's plate, and the other foot free. (4.67)

6. A balk shall be called if, with one or more runners, The Pitcher: (8.12)

A. While touching his plate, makes any motion naturally associated with his pitch and fails to deliver the ball.

B. While touching his plate, feints a throw to first base and fails to complete the throw.

C. Fails to step directly toward any base before throwing to that base.

D. While touching his plate, throws or feints a throw to an unoccupied base, except to make a play.

E. Delivers the ball while his pivot foot is in back of, or not in contact with, the pitcher's plate.

F. Delivers the ball while he is not facing the batter.

G. Makes any motion naturally associated with his pitch while he is not touching the pitcher's plate.

H. Unnecessarily delays the game.

I. Without the ball in his possession stands on or astride the pitcher's plate.

J. Without the ball in his possession feints a pitch.

K. After assuming the set position, removes one hand from the ball except in an actual pitch, or in throwing to a base.

L. While touching his plate, accidentally or intentionally drops the ball.

M. Pitches while the catcher is not in his box.

So you see that pitching is more than "chanking-that-ball."

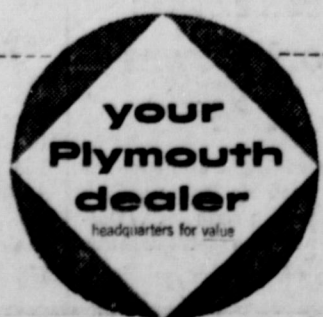
