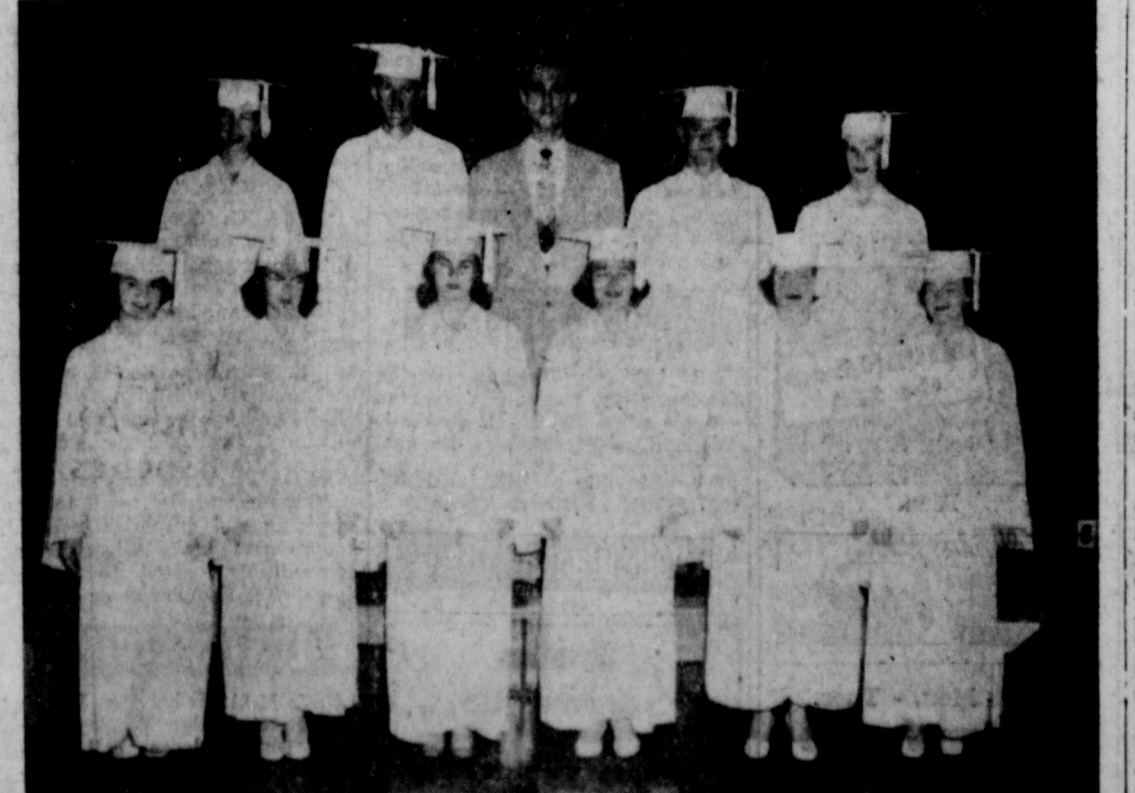

John, who won the Class B state championship as freshmen this spring, putted beautifully for a 37 on the back nine after posting a 47 on the front nine.

John met Corbin in first round play this morning. Phillips may also find a stern test in opening play when he meets Boone Yarborough, Ranger High School coach, who qualified with a 79.

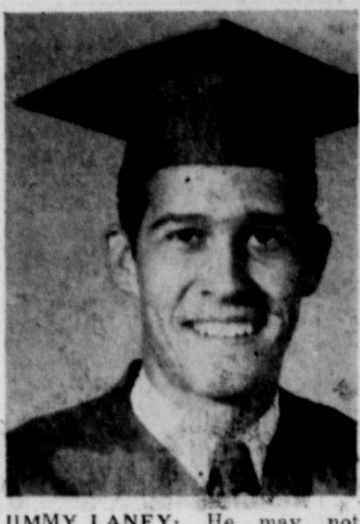

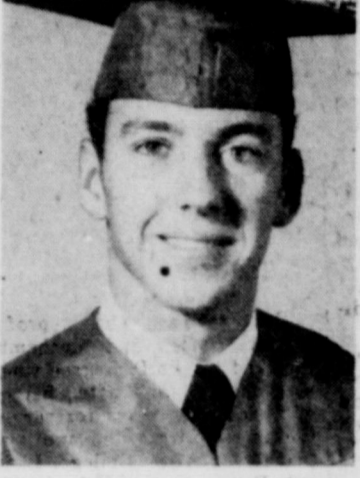

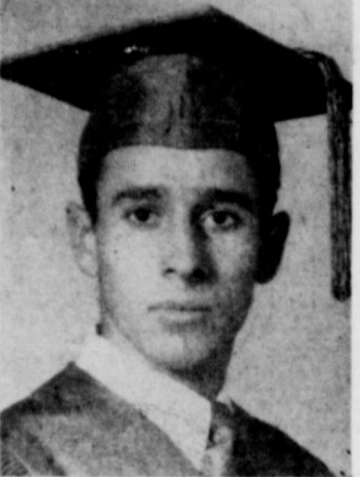

Deepest of three new wildcats announced for the county will be George Blackberry, et al, of Wichita Falls No. 1 W. O. Dawson, 12 miles southeast of Ranger.

Staked for 3,200 feet with cable tools, it spots 1,415 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of S. R. Boggus Survey.

Trumter Petroleum Corp. of Ft. Worth staked No. 1 O. R. Buchanan as a 1,750-foot rotary wildcat three miles northwest of Rising Star.

Location spots 1,271 feet from the north and 1,607 feet from the east lines of Section 15, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

In the same area, same operator staked No. 2 Pauline Roberts as a 1,750-foot rotary test. Site spots 1,155 feet from the south and 380 feet from the west lines of Section 26, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

Burris and Jackson of Olney completed No. 1 J. Z. Miller, Jr. as a regular field producer three and a half miles northeast of Eastland in Section 2, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 34 barrels of 42 gravity oil, pumping from 48 perforations at 1,604-1,620 feet. Casing was set at 1,635 feet, total depth.

There will be a meeting of the church school officers and teachers on Monday night, in the minister's study, at seven-thirty o'clock.

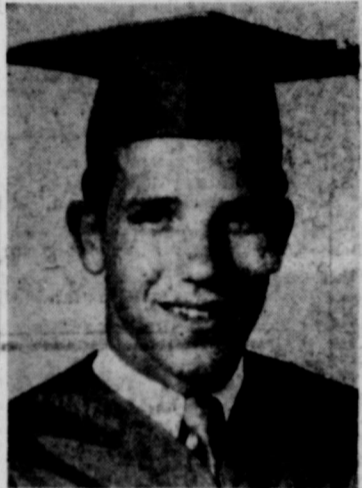

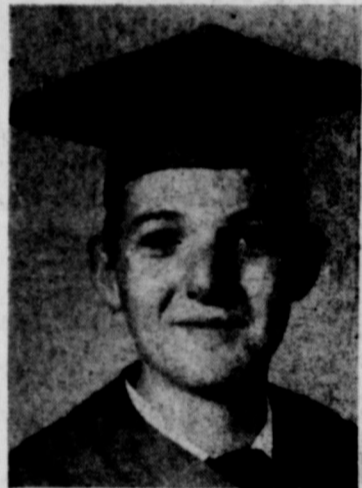
