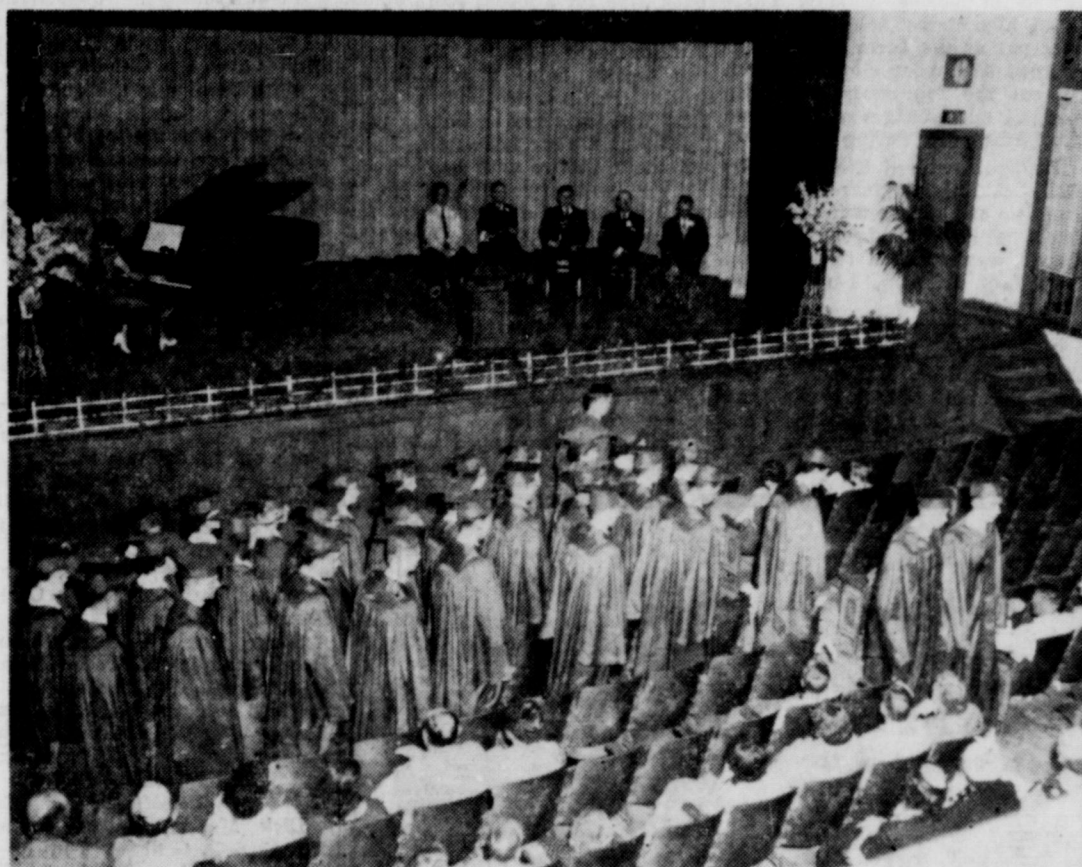
game preserve in Eastland County alone. The group will likely take in landowners in North, Comanche County also.

# Phillips Edges Martin 2-1 To Win Golf Tourney Title

Jimmy Phillips, a Ranger resident for 25 years before moving to Tulsa, Okla. and a favorite among the tournament gallery, Sunday won the 20th Annual Ranger Invitation Golf Tournament.

The veteran Phillips posted a respectable one over par 73 to nose out Dick Martin of Dallas, 2-1 after he had sized the boggy greens Saturday in the semi-finals.

Martin shot one of his poorer rounds in losing Sunday. Three down after nine holes and four over par at the turn, Martin was plagued with poor clutch putting. He cut the four over par down one but missed six par putts and two birdie putts during the round.

Phillips entered the finals by easily taking 17-year-old Jack Donovan of Dallas out in the semi-finals Sunday morning 7-6, while Martin was pushed to beat Jim Russell of Graham, 1-up on the 20th hole.

Russell, who eagled Nos. 8 and 9 to go 1-up at the first turn, fell behind on Nos. 12 and 13 but scrambled back with a birdie four on No. 18. A sheer streak of luck gave Martin the victory. An iron shot approaching the green, was caught by the wind and began fading. Just before real trouble developed, the ball clipped a tree limb and bounced back just in front of the green.

Martin chipped on in three and dropped a 14-inch putt to par while Russell had to settle with a bogie five after missing an eight foot putt.

Russell was four under par on the first nine and even par on the back nine for a medal score of 68.

In the championship match, Phillips went 1-up on Martin at the second hole. Martin bogied while Phillips dropped a seven foot putt for a par of three.

The next four holes were halved, the first two with bogie fives. Phillips went two up on No. 7 when he canned a 12-foot putt for a birdie two. Martin, over the green, chipped in close and took a par three.

At the turn, it stood three up after Phillips won No. 8 with a par while Martin bogied and they halved No. 9. Both players parred 10 and 11 and Martin took 12 to reduce Phillips lead.

Phillips again jumped into a 3-shot approach on 13. His approach shot settled within 7 feet of the cup. Martin went to the right on his second effort, chipped ten feet past, and missed his putt five inches.

Halving 14 and 15, Martin took 16 with a birdie two on an 11-foot putt. They halved 17 and Martin was down. Phillips birdied the 467 yard hole with a three foot putt. Martin, too late, sunk a ten footer to halve.

In Saturday's quarterfinals, Phillips eliminated Andy Mosley of Cisco, 6-5 while firing eight birdies over the 13-hole route.

With Phillips in the quarter finals winners circle were Martin, who took out Jackie Milner of Abilene, 7-6; Russell over Charles Ford of Dallas, 7-5; and 17-year old Jack Donovan of Dallas, who knocked out Art Corbin of Dallas, 1-up.

Phillips didn't par a hole on the first nine as he went 4-up on Mosley. Phillips bogied two and birdied the other seven. His score for the first nine holes of the second round match was a 31. He holds the course record of 30. The tourney favorite required only 17 putts on 13 holes.

## Tornadic Safeguards

Frequently you hear someone speak of feeling "helpless" when a storm brews. The comment to that would be "yes" and "no"—as Andy says.

There are some things to do. The US Weather Bureau suggests: 1. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. 2. If you're in open country move at right angles to the tornado's path; they usually move ahead at 25 to 40 miles an hour. . . . If there's no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine. 3. If in a city or town: seek inside shelter and stay away from windows; in a home, the southwest corner of the lowest floor or basement offers the greatest safety. 4. In schools—if the school building is of good steel reinforced construction, stay inside; in a rural district, remove the children and the teachers to a storm shelter or ravine. I. If in a factory, workers should be taken to the part of the building offering greatest protection.

"To know what to do when a tornado is observed may mean the difference between life and death." So says the Weather Bureau. And, surely, there can be no doubt of it. Reduce the chances to the minimum.

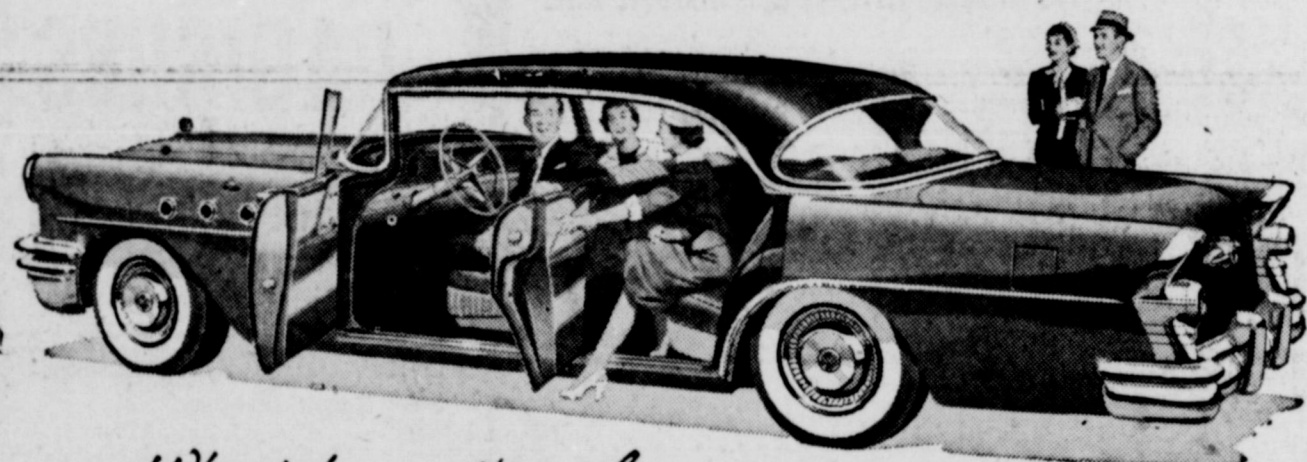

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## .20 Inches Rain Here Twisters Skip Across West Texas Areas

Tornado laden clouds dumped an additional .20 inches of rain on the Eastland county area early Monday morning.

Striking with the fury of a tropical hurricane, 4 a.m., winds contributed to an already heavy television antenna damage, toppled trees and severely shook small dwellings and barns in the area.

The locality was alerted when a funnel shaped cloud was spotted in the early morning near DeLeon. Apparently the twister never touched the ground, however.

Scattered thundershowers with accompanying squall lines are expected to move out of this section of the state today before returning in force Wednesday.

However, the weather is not expected to be so severe as last

week's downpours that threatened several localities with floods.

Weather through most of the state Sunday night and Monday showed heavy rain in some portions and tornadoes in others.

Tornado activity centered mostly around the Lubbock area where an undetermined number of Dame Nature's most destructive freaks ripped roofs from houses, knocked down utility poles and barns and caused general concern before jumping back into dark, hovering clouds.

Kilgore and Tyler reported rain up to three inches Monday from clouds that "turned the sky as dark as night," causing motorists to drive with their car lights turned on and flooding the city streets.

A tornado struck near Abernathy bringing destruction to farm buildings and equipment during a rain and hail storm that kept persons in the path of the twister from noticing its approach.

Other areas reporting rain: Cisco, .50; Buffalo Gap, .80; Sweetwater, .60; Hermleigh, 1.02; Throckmorton, .45; and Baird, .50.

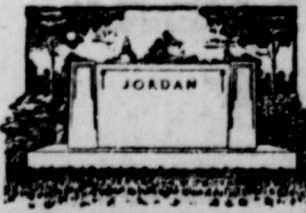
