Tornadic Safeguards

Frequently you hear someone speak of feeling "helpless" when a storm brews. The comment to that would be "yes" and "no"-as Andy says.

There are some things to do. The US Weather Bureau suggests: 1. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except caves or underground excavations. 2. If you're in open country move at right angles to the tornado's path; they usually move ahead at 25 to 40 miles an hour . . . If there's no time to escape. lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine. 3. If in a city or town: seek inside shelter and stay away from windows; in a home, the southwest corner of the lowest floor or basement offers the greatest safety. 4. In schools-if the school building is of good steel reinforced construction, stay inside; in a rural district, remove the children and the teachers to a storm shelter or ravine. I. If in a factory, workers should be taken to the part of the building offering greatest protection.

"To know what to do when a tornado is observed may mean the difference between life and death." So says the Weather Bureau. And, surely, there can be no doubt of it. Reduce the chances to the minimum.
