

Savings Bonds Sales In County Reach \$235,823

Sale of Savings Bonds in Eastland County increased to \$235,823 for the year during May after \$42,118 worth of bonds were sold in the month.

That represents 45 percent of the county's goal of \$520,000, according to Guy Parker of Eastland, county chairman.

The county now ranks second in sales in the nine county district. Only Taylor County sales are higher. Other counties in the district include Stephens, Shackelford, Nolan, Jones, Haskell, Fisher and Callahan.

County sales are shown above average for the state. In Texas a total of \$64,395,836 worth of bonds have been sold. That represents 39 percent of the state goal.

"Never before have United States Savings Bonds been so attractive to investors and small savers alike," Parker stated.

Perkins Traveling On Ship That Has History

We are now running westerly among the south Australian coast aboard the good old ship Strathmore of the P&O Orient Line. This ship is nearly 30 years old and consequently is quite different from the new ORIANA in which we come from the United States to New Zealand. It is somewhat smaller, constructed of heavy steel and I noticed that it has vibrations. It has British officers and an Goanese crew including the waiters in the dining room. During World War II it was requisitioned in February, 1940 by H. M. Government and converted as a troop carrier. It carried Australian troops to the Middle East and later carried troops to Ceylon, India, Africa and Europe.

In 1944 it carried U. S. boys to England in 1945 it repatriated New Zealand forces from Italy to New Zealand.

At Sydney, Melbourne and Adelaide, it took on cargo, mostly sheepskins and canned fruits. While in port with the cargo hatches open, the baled sheepskins gave off an odor quite unlike the better grades of perfume, but at sea with the hatches buttoned down all is sweet and lovely.

Food and service on this ship is excellent. The British custom of serving early morning tea persists and at 6:15 a.m. the steward knocks on our cabin door. The first two mornings I climbed down from my upper berth and came in with a tray on which there was a pot of hot tea, milk, sugar, cups and saucers and sweet crackers. After two days I began to figure out ways to admit him.

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Byrd to Defend Crown at Lakeside Golf Tournament

Eugene Byrd, star of the Texas A&M golf team and defending champion of the Lakeside Country Club tournament, will return to Eastland this weekend to try to repeat as champion of the tourney, something no golfer has ever done.

The young Stephenville golfer has already come as close as any golfer to turning the trick. He won last year's tournament and was beaten out in the finals in the 1959 event by a single stroke.

Things aren't expected to be too easy for Mr. Byrd, however. Interest in the tourney is high and a number of outstanding players from around the state have indicated they will be on hand to try to unseat the Stephenville sharp shooter.

Tournament chairman O. H. Dick has revealed plans to have seven full flights. That will take care of 112 golfers and entries will be shut off after that number register.

The event will get underway with a pro-am beginning at noon Friday. Friday night the annual barbecue will be held, with Gene Townsend of Ranger in charge. Neil Day will again serve as starter.

Entries for the tournament have already been received from Big Spring, Fort Worth, Stephenville, Breckenridge, Cisco, Ranger, El Paso and Abilene. The entry list is expected to swell early this year due to the cut-off ruling.

A total of \$1,500 worth of prizes will be given away to winners in the tournament. First place winners in each flight will receive full sets of irons, runners-up will get full sets of woods and consolation winners will be awarded golf bags.

Qualifying scores for medalist honors must be shot Friday. Golfers not trying for the championship flight can phone in qualifying scores. Medalist in the tourney will receive a 17 jewel watch.

The tournament will be match play all the way. Indications are that college players may offer the stiffest competition. Golfers from North Texas State, Hardin-Simmons, Abilene Christian and McMurray have indicated plans to participate.

The 3,145-yard par 36 Lakeside course is in excellent condition following more than five inches of rainfall last week. With good runoff the course was in workable condition Monday and mowers have been going full steam since then in getting things tidied up.

Year's Rainfall Is Three Inches Above Normal

Official rainfall during the four day period which ended Sunday was 5.07 inches here. Much heavier measurements were reported from many areas in the county and unofficial readings here ran as high as seven inches.

The 5.07 measurement pushed the total for June to 7.44 inches, which makes this June the third wettest since rainfall records have been kept here, dating back to 1911. Only July of 1959 and June of 1940 were wetter.

Water was going over the Lake Leon horn rapidly following the rains. Eastland Lake also filled up and water began going over the spillway Sunday night. Cisco Lake gained more than two feet and stock ponds and other small lakes in the county were full or filling fast following the near-record rainfall.

Total rainfall for the year now stands at 17.15, or 3.30 inches above normal.

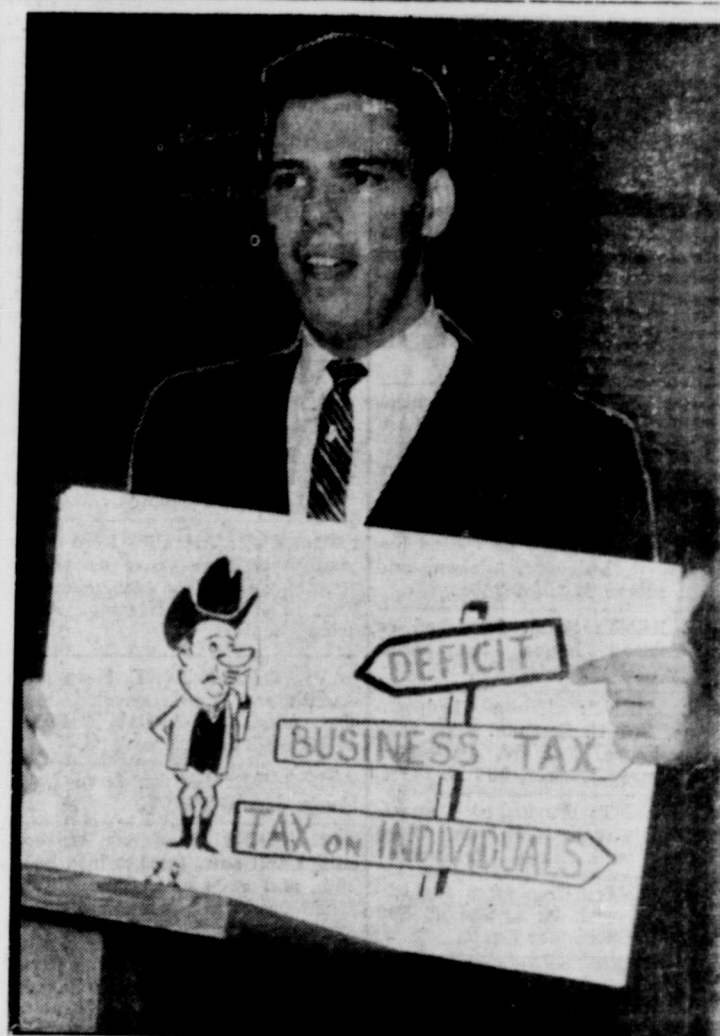

TO DEFICIT SPENDING

Gibbons Thinks Sales Tax Is State's Answer

Wayne Gibbons, state legislator from Breckenridge, told Eastland Lions and Rotarians Monday that the state must come up with a tax with "growth potential" if it is to solve its financial problem.

Gibbons, whose 75th District will be combined with the 76th District next year, told members of the two clubs a sales tax would cost the average Texas family \$24 a year. He said individuals have been carrying a light tax load in Texas and that business has been carrying more than its share. The young Breckenridge legislator is expected to meet Scott Bailey of Cisco in next year's legislative race. Both have been busy lately mending political fences.

A government major in college, Gibbons pointed a finger at the state spending deficit, saying Texas would be \$70 in debt by the end of the year. He used charts to develop his talk, which aimed all the way at a sales tax, the method of taxation he is on record as favoring.

Gibbons declared that while eighty-five cents out of every dollar is now spent on highways, schools and public welfare, the Texas Tech graduate emphasized.

Pointing to proof of his statement that the average Texan does not pay as much state taxes as the average citizen in other states, Gibbons declared that while the average non-Texas family pays \$235 annually in state taxes, Texas families pay just \$116.

He indicated that he did not think selective sales taxes are the answer, pointing out the "huge increase" in recent years on tobacco products, liquor and gasoline.

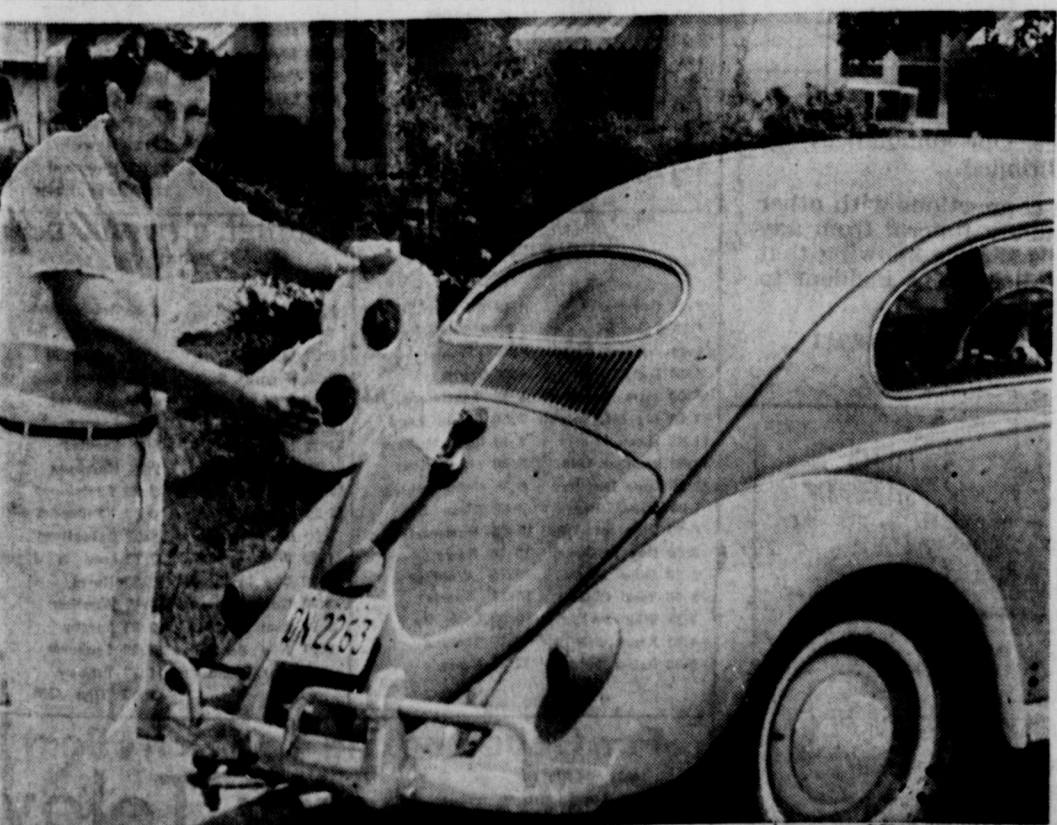
Gibbons said he realized his subject was not a popular one, but said it was one which needed

Warm Springs Center's Drive Is Now Underway

"One of the most frustrating experiences a person can have is to find himself paralyzed, helpless, and dependent," said Ralph Murray, field representative of the Texas Rehabilitation Center of Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, during his visit here Friday.

Murray visited Frank Sayre, local volunteer representative of the Center, to give him a report on physical rehabilitation in Texas.

"Such everyday happenings as a fall from a porch, a bee sting, a stroke, a dive into shallow water, an auto accident, or a gunshot wound can paralyze a person's body," Murray said. "Of course, crippling diseases—muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, polio, cerebral palsy—are responsible for many cases of paralysis, too."

Murray explained to Sayre that there are an estimated 20 to 30 thousand severely physically disabled persons in Texas alone and that a very low percentage of them have received any kind of rehabilitation services.

He said that studies have shown that the majority of these disabled citizens can be restored through physical rehabilitation to a point where they can become qualified for employment. Others, by learning to care for themselves and becoming somewhat independent, can relieve other members of their families for employment.

"As an editorial in the Beeville Bee-Picayune stated recently, 'Rehabilitation is not welfare, it's just plain good business,'"

The program of the Texas Rehabilitation Center at Gonzales, Murray said, is not duplicated anywhere in the state. TRC treats people of all ages, races, and creeds and provides charity treatment from a fund made up of contribution from the people of Texas.

"We have a long waiting list of handicapped Texans, and most of them can't afford to pay for their rehabilitation treatments," said Murray. "The help of the people of this area is needed to assure these people that they will receive the rehabilitation they need to return to a useful, productive life."

The Center, owned and operated by the people who support it, is a non-profit corporation and must depend upon contributions from Texans to continue its program.

Sayre said that the center is an agency of the Eastland United Fund, so does not have to have a separate campaign for funds in Eastland.

National Guard County Units Ready for Camp

The 49th Armored Division is getting its tanks, planes and heavy artillery ready for use at North Fort Hood, July 2, for two weeks of intensive summer training. Eastland County has two 49th Guard units, one in Ranger and the other in Cisco.

The Citizen-soldiers, about 10,000 of them, of the Texas Army National Guard will trade their air conditioners for heat, dust, and a tent city to sharpen their readiness for emergency.

"Testing company-sized units under simulated combat conditions including extensive night tactics, will make up much of the training," Maj. Gen. John L. Thompson, Jr., the Forty-Ninth's commander, said at the division's headquarters in Dallas.

Firing weapons, ranging from pistols to big tank cannons, and Army training tests also will be a part of the training.

The division will make two marches to "fight" in the cedar brakes and rocky terrain of the sprawling Central Texas armour center. One will be in darkness.

Gen. George H. Decker, Chief of Staff of the U. S. Army, will pay the 49th a visit during the two week period to observe training and to participate in the annual Governor's Day Review of the division, July 8.

A team of evaluators from the Active Army will keep a watchful eye on the Lone Star Division, scoring its efficiency with more than 15,000 individual evaluations.

again;

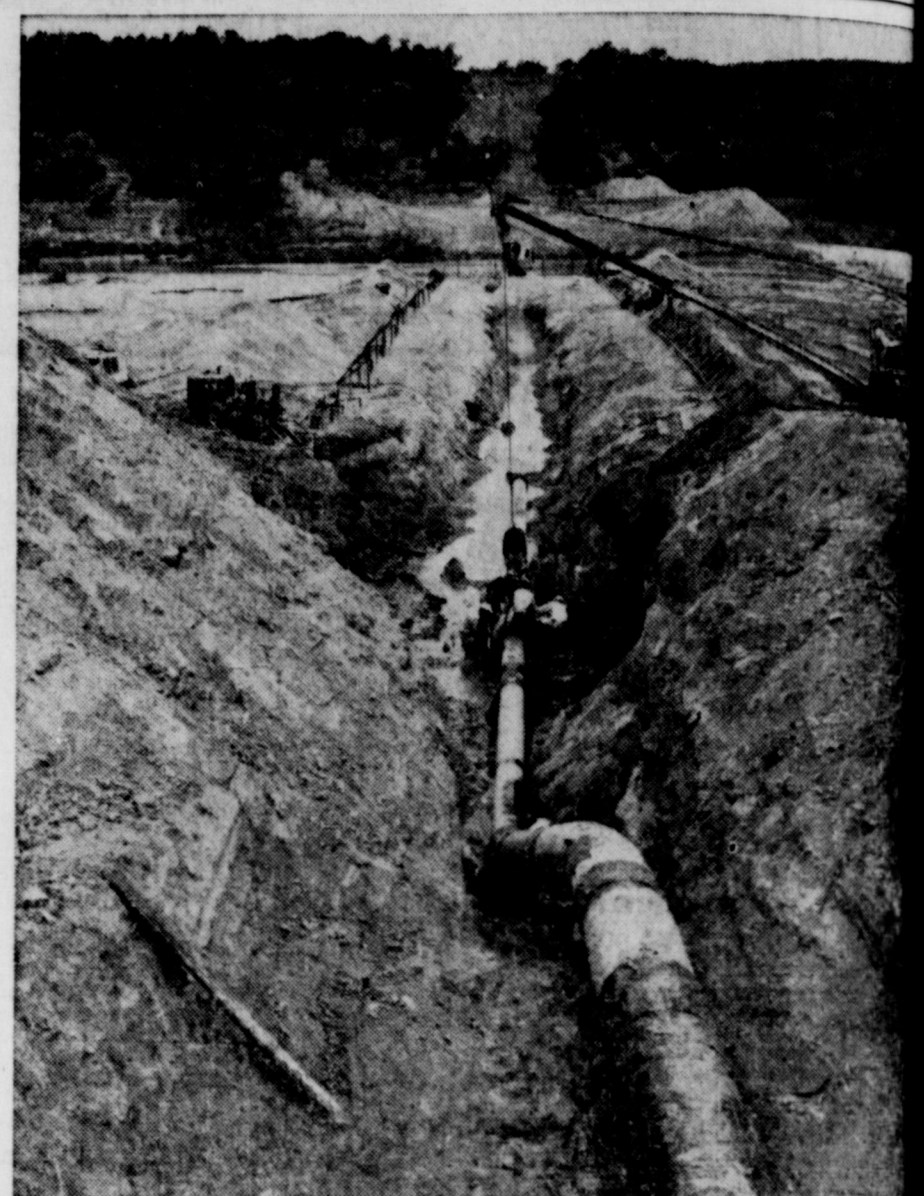
Houses and streets glisten like a washed car.

New Lone Star Pipe In Operation This

Lone Star Gas Company plans to place its newly-laid West Texas 18-inch, 52-mile, 800-pound work ing pressure, natural gas transmission pipeline in operation within the week.

The pipeline, which runs from Springtown in Parker County to Gordon in Palo Pinto County, will ultimately increase capacity of the company's transmission facilities by more than 100-million cubic feet of gas daily, a Lone Star spokesman said.

Immediately upon placing the pipeline in service, Lone Star will be in position to increase its natural gas take from Stephens, Palo Pinto and Erath counties by some 25 million cubic feet of gas daily, the spokesman said.

And once additional compressors are operating at Gordon, the capacity will be increased to about 68 million cubic feet of gas daily. The compression facilities will be completed late this summer, he said.

Total cost of the pipeline, compressors and other gas processing equipment is approximately \$3 million, it was noted.

The pipeline connects at Gordon with the outlet of the company's gasoline plant there and the east end of an existing 12-inch Lone Star transmission pipeline. The 12-inch pipeline now terminates near the corner of Brown, Comanche and Eastland counties. At Springtown the new pipe-

line ties into a 48-inch pipeline completed by Lone Star to the west Dallas county. The gas will continue into Dallas Market area.

There was no more noise that night.

As a young man he was a crack cricket player. lic schools of New South Wales. He told me of the work being done by the correspondence division of the school in educating the children in the remote places, on sheep sections and farms where no local schools exist. Lessons are mailed to these children and when each is completed it is returned to the correspondence school by mail free of charge. Seven hundred teachers serve thousands of children in this manner in Australia. This service is not dramatized to the extent that the activities of he flying doctors is but it reaches many more people and is on a much larger scale.

At the hotel in Milford Sound, New Zealand, I became acquainted with a gentleman from Adelaide, Australia, a member of the Stock Exchange there. We played equally bad pool together and he said that he would be happy if I would look him up when I reach Adelaide. A few days ago I did call on him. 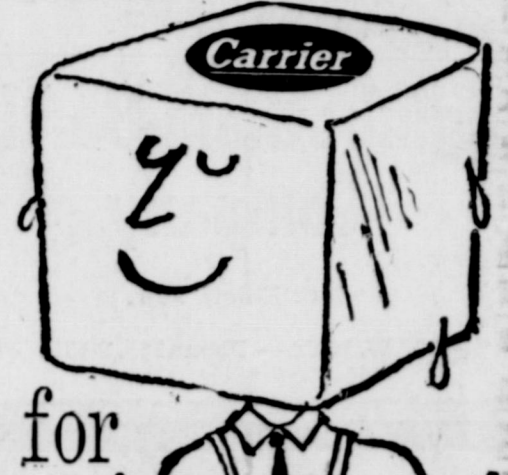

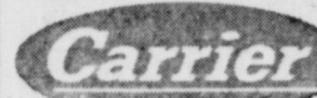
