





Flood Curbing Program Told By Madeley

By R. C. MADELEY

Control of the first water de ention structure completed in the Green Creek Watershed Flood Prevention Project was transferred from the Soil Conservation Service to R. L. Tolbert and J. L. Kiker in March, 1955. This structure is the first of thirteen planned in the Green Creek Watershed. Three dams are now complete except for sodding and seeding and one other is under construction.

Construction was started on thi first dam in November, 1954. Because of unseasonable conditions sodding and seeding was not completed until April 23, 1955.

The Upper Leon Soil Conservation District has assumed responsibility for maintenance of structure which is known as Site No. 3 in the Green Creek Plan. W J. Fritts, chairman of the board of supervisors, completed the official acceptance when he signed the maintenance agreement between the district, the Green Creek Watershed Association and the Soil Conservation Service at the regular meeting of the supervisors in March, 1955.

The structure at Site 3 is earthen dam of 109,941 cubic yards. It is located in the northeast portion of the Green Creek Water shed on the Tolbert and Kiker farms. It has a flood storage capacity of 542 acre feet with flood storage surface area of 66 acres. The structure is designed to hold flood water from its 1,140acre watershed that is expected during a fifty year frequency period. Flood water is released from the structure through an automatic draw down tube that is designed to let the water out only as fast as it will be conducted off by the stream channel below. An emergency spillway is provided for




