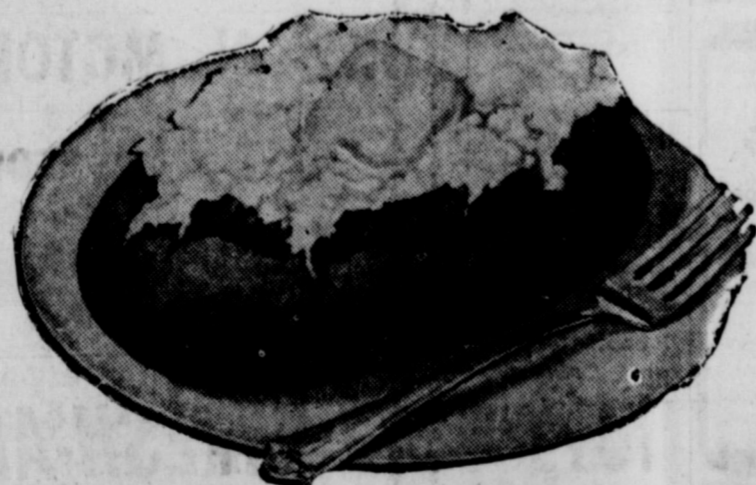

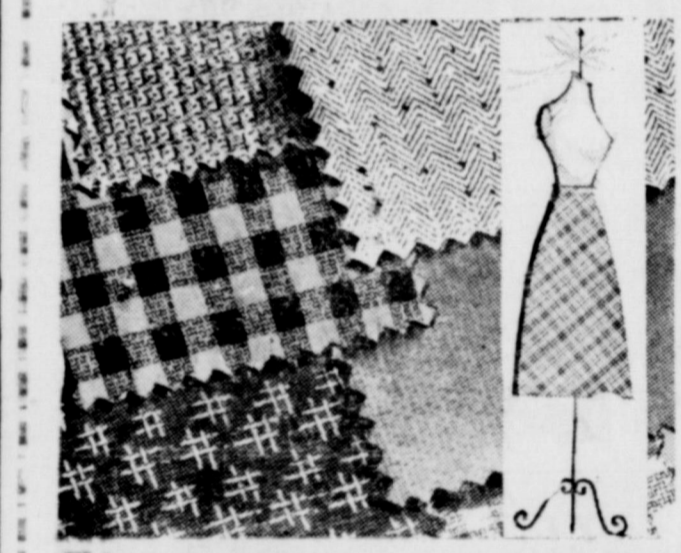

Other places of interest were Liberty store on Regent Street where some of the world's finest goods are on sale. Also, I visited four of London's railway stations, three of which looked about like those I used to see in Massachusetts when I was a boy. I rode one train across the River Thames, a distance in all of about two miles, and my rail ticket cost only three pennies. Coal burning steam locomotives are still in quite general use in England. Double decker red buses are very well patronized on the streets and during rush hours in morning and evening they form a steady red stream and some of the principal thoroughfares.
Last Friday forenoon we left London for Scotland on one of England's famous trains, the Flying Scotsman. On the menu card at lunch was printed, This famous train has left King's Cross at 10:00 a.m. since 1862. On the day before we left Queen Elizabeth took the same train to York to attend the Royal wedding and according to the news account the stationmaster was there attired in formal morning suit and top hat to see her off.
As we sped through the lovely green English countryside we saw cows and sheep grazing on prosperous looking farms. The farm homes were nearly all built of brick, and although they were picturesque I doubt if they provided the comforts of American country homes.
We spent a day in Edinburgh where the old buildings are all built of stone. The fort fired a 21 gun salute at noon as it was the Queen's birthday. Edinburgh is a quaint old place, with the most beautiful gardens of lupin in many soft colors.
Yesterday we took the early train to Glasgow, and as it was a little late we had a mad rush across the city in a taxi to catch the excursion boat for a day's trip down the Clyde. We made it shortly before the gangplank was pulled away, and the trip was delightful. For the first few miles down stream we passed the many great ship yards where hundreds of the world's finest ships were born.
Then through hilly pastures and part islands where there were resort towns and mainland cities of the usual variety. We ate a delicious lunch at noon and at 5:30 were served a high tea, consisting of a fluid, fish, soup, six kinds of bread and a strong cup of English tea. We are now back in Glasgow in a fine hotel.
One novel feature is the nickel steel towel rack in the bathroom, for it is actually a steam radiator having three horizontal warmed bars that provide a nice place to dry things that have been washed. There is nothing Scotch about the bath towels, which are five by seven feet in size.
