Tickets for the Peanut Bowl Are on Sale in Eastland

Tickets for the Second Annual Peanut Bowl to be held Sept. 30 in Eastland, go on sale Thursday. Approximately 4,000 people are expected for the event which will pit Cisco Junior College and Ranger Junior College football teams,

plus a shower of other entertainment spectacles.

The Eastland Jaycees expect the tickets to be "sold out" by Sept. 20, Grover Hallmark, president, said Wednesday.

Price is \$1.50 per adult and all

seats are reserved. In Eastland, the tickets can be bought at Radio Station KERC studios.

They'll be on sale in Ranger at the Crawford-Doss Drug Store and in Cisco at the Dean Drug.

Between now and Peanut Bowl time the Jaycees are going to repair and erect bleachers at Maverick Stadium to accommodate the many area band students who will participate in the big show.

The bleachers were bought "Army surplus" in Fort Worth for \$30 and the Jaycees expect to obtain seating capacity from them for at least 300 persons, Hallmark said.

The football game proper will begin at 8 p.m. but will be preceded by festivities as well as having a gigantic presentation at intermission.

The Jaycees handled their ticket sales differently last year when they made them available at several places in each town. Hallmark said that it is believed that they will be able to provide better service for the public by having them offered at only one place in each town.

Advantages are that the tickets can be accounted for easier and people will have an opportunity to get better seats, he said.

First Graders In Four Sections

There are more first graders in Eastland's school this year than there has been in 15 years.

A total of 87 six-year-olds are in classes here for the first time. In all, 808 students are enrolled in Eastland schools this fall.

There are 200 in high school which is 20 more than at the end of school last year, Wendell Siebert, superintendent, announced Wednesday.

The increase in first-graders has resulted in the formation of four sections—two at each of the Ward schools.

Mrs. Harold Durham and Mrs. Charles Marshall are teaching beginners at South Ward and Miss Nettie Thornton and Mrs. Homer Smith at West Ward.

The total school enrollment in Eastland wasn't quite enough, however, to lift the system from its second place in enrollment for the county.

H. R. Garrett, County School Superintendent, said that Cisco schools have enrolled 1,030 students this year.

Other figures for the county are incomplete at this time, he said. The increased enrollment resulted in the transfer of the entire fourth grade from West Ward to South Ward for the year, and all available classrooms are full.

Transportation for the fourth graders is being furnished from West Ward to South Ward and return each day.

Fifty-three students enrolled at

Carelessness Principal Cause of Yard Accidents

The amateur gardener is exposed to many hazards and must exercise constant care when using yard tools and equipment, Lone Star Gas Company Manager A. G. Goston cautioned today.

Lone Star and the Eastland Telegram are co-sponsors of the 1961 Home Safety Program in Eastland.

Almost 12 per cent of all home accident fatalities occur in the yard, according to a survey reported by the Kansas Board of Health and the Nassau County, N. Y., Health Department.

Of the total deaths, 5.6 per cent were caused by falls; 1.3 per cent by exposure to fire; 1.3 per cent by suffocation; and 3.1 per cent by miscellaneous causes.

Principal dangers are careless handling of rakes, hoes, and careless use of the power lawnmower. Turn hoes, rakes, etc. downward when momentarily laid aside and store properly when not in use.

Observe these safety rules when operating the power mower:

1. Avoid using an electric mower when the ground is wet. You may cause a short circuit or slip on the damp grass and fall against the blades.

2. Before using, clear lawn of stones, wires, and other articles that the mower may catch and throw into the air. If an object discharged by a mower strikes you or a bystander, it may cause serious injury.

3. Be sure that children and pets are at a safe distance when you are using the mower.

4. Be sure of your footing and balance when you are operating the mower on an incline. Downhill mowing is especially dangerous.

5. To push the mower over obstructions, tip it by manipulating the handle rather than by reaching under the mower.

6. Stop the engine before removing objects from reel or rotary blades.

Annual Peanut Tour To See Starr Crops

Visits to 11 Eastland County peanut farms and a demonstration of rabbit control are on tap for the annual Eastland County Peanut Tour which is underway Friday at 9 a.m. beginning in Gorman.

Farms which are growing the new Starr variety of peanuts for the first time will be inspected by the tourers.

J. M. Cooper, county agriculture agent, said that a great number of people are expected for the tour to get a first-hand look at the county's No. 1 cash crop.

He said that there are now approximately 30,000 acres of peanuts planted in this county.

Other varieties to be seen will be the Spantex, Dixie Spanish, Argentina and Spanish.

Other highlights of the tour will include a demonstration by U. R. Smith, rodent-control specialist from Cisco, who will show how to poison for rabbits.

There has been a great deal of rabbit damage, Cooper said, and if the past weekend's rains hadn't dampened the extending dry spell, there would have been more.

Another specialist who will accompany the tour will be B. C. Langley, superintendent of the Agriculture Experiment Station at Tarleton College in Stephenville.

Langley was developer of the Starr variety, named for W. B. Starr, Cisco area peanut grower and farm leader.

Ben Spears, Texas A&M agronomist as well as the tour, as well as Sid Jenkins, district farm management specialist from Stephenville.

Farms to be visited are located generally around Gorman.

They are places being farmed by Albert Taylor, northeast of Gorman; D. B. Warren, north of Gorman; Royal Hampton, Odessa; Rodgers, Claude Fuller, near Gorman; Mitchell Campbell and Glen Justice, in the New Hope community; and Junior Jackson, Bill Andrey and Gailon Warren, between Gorman and Carbon.

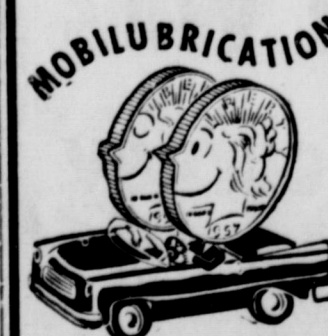

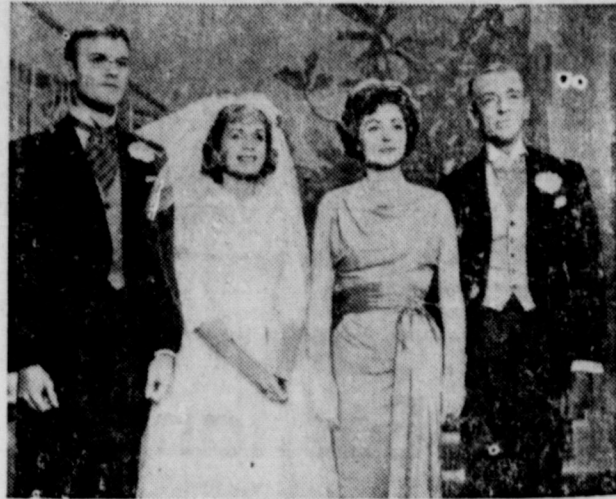

Code of Ethics For Hunters Adopted by NRA

Eastland County hunters are taking stock of hunting equipment in anticipation of the opening of the hunting season Sept. 1, when dove season begins, to be followed by the seasons for hunting deer, duck and quail. With the number of hunting enthusiasts increasing each year, it becomes doubly imperative that safety practices and game laws be followed and that property rights and good conservation principles be observed.

The National Rifle Association of America has adopted a Hunter's Code of Ethics, to which it urges its members to subscribe. The principles in this code are also combined with an identification card to be given to the landowner when seeking permission to hunt on his property. This is another effort by organized sportsmen to open more privately owned land to hunters who pledge themselves to respect property rights, safety practices, game laws, and good conservation principles.

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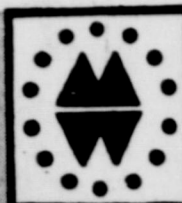

Campaign Launched to Reduce Drop-outs In High Schools

A "Back-to-Stay-in-School" campaign directed at high school and college students has been initiated by the U. S. Office of Education under the leadership of Dr. Sterling M. McMurrin, Commissioner of Education, it was announced today by J. H. Bond, Regional Director, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Region VII.

The campaign will be a year-round effort, through special emphasis will be directed towards reducing the number of drop-outs. George D. Hann, recently appointed Office of Education Regional Representative in Dallas, will head the campaign in DHEW, Region VII, Bond stated.

Over 900,000 students dropped out of the Nation's schools last year, although 70 percent had the ability to finish high school and probably go on to college. Since the drop-out rate will vary from one community to the next, the problem must be approached from that level.

Dropping out of school has a number of implications for the student and the community. The student is restricting earning power substantially by dropping out of school. Opportunities for advancement are limited and in many instances available jobs for the untrained person are few or nonexistent.

The community suffers when a student drops out of school because this reduces the supply of trained manpower available to expanding business and industry.

Hann suggests that those institutions most vitally concerned with community growth and welfare participate in this campaign by encouraging students to leave their summer jobs and return to school. Officials of schools, local governments, employment agencies, business and industry can help by individually and collectively conducting a "Back-to-School" Campaign.

Plucky Stevie Helps Science Toward Answer to Arthritis

Stevie Vardol gives blood sample to laboratory nurse.

For plucky Stevie Vardol, 10, life much of the time is just an unhappy succession of giving samples of his body to science.

But Stevie, who would rather be swimming and roller skating in Minneapolis (if he only could) than spending endless hours in the Children's Rheumatic Clinic of the University of Minnesota Medical School, doesn't feel sorry for himself. He knows he is doing a job that must be done: that the doctors' appraisal of the tissue samples from his swollen knees, specimens of knee-joint fluid, and of his blood may in time prevent in other children the affliction that befell him three painful years ago.

Stevie has juvenile rheumatoid arthritis in the knees, hands, wrists.

Throughout the nation, another 30,000 Stevies—or their small sisters—also suffer each year from this excruciating disease. With March of Dimes funds, The National Foundation (which made possible development of the Salk polio vaccine) is today supporting the University of Minnesota's Children's Rheumatism Clinic with a research grant. Other arthritis research projects are under way at the Rockefeller Institute, at New York University, the University of Buffalo and at other famed scientific institutions, all financed by the March of Dimes.

Additionally, The National Foundation has established arthritis study centers at Columbia University, the University of Rochester (N. Y.), the University of Texas at Dallas and the University of California at San Francisco.

The doctors confidently tell Stevie they will solve the enigma of rheumatoid arthritis

in time, and find a preventive, given enough support. But they don't delude this valiant little boy or his puzzled father and mother who ask, despairingly, "Why should this happen to us, to Stevie?" The medical scientists look him squarely in the eye and say, "We just can't promise we'll make you well again. But then again, perhaps eventually we will."

Stevie's stout answer is to roll up his sleeve for another ten cc's of his blood (which contains an abnormal protein, a mark of his disease); or to pull up his trouser leg to give up another specimen of lubricating fluid from his knee.

In the laboratory, Stevie's blood is compared painstakingly to normal blood in the incessant search for an answer to what is wrong with Stevie and with the other 30,000 children. Perhaps what is wrong is an abnormal development of antibodies. Antibodies are the substance that combat bacteria. Then, samples of the connective tissue around his knees are studied and photographed under the giant electron microscope and compared to normal tissue.

Stevie doesn't cry although his doctors say that the pain he suffers at times beggars description. He is not a "guinea pig" in the full medical sense of the term. But the resolute and uncomplaining bearing of this young gentleman of only 10 is evidence that he knows he is a volunteer of the fight against the nation's No. 1 Crippler—arthritis which, in one or another form, strikes at 11 million Americans.

Delinquency Topic for Lion Club Tuesday Speaker

"The word 'conformity' and the phrase 'moral decay' best describe our society today," the Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor First Baptist Church, told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

Speaking on juvenile delinquency, he said that people are going to have to begin on an individual basis to have respect for the laws of the land.

"Don't blame the teenagers," he said, "they're just following the pattern that has been set for them."

"When we break the law, like speeding and put our kids in the

back window of our cars to watch for police, what kind of example are they being taught?" he asked.

We have become a nation that disrespects the nature of mankind and besides breaking laws of the land, the laws of God are being broken, Rev. Brewer said.

New Jobs Created By Sales Tax

The new Limited Sales, Excise, and Use Tax which became effective September 1, 1961, the beginning of the new State fiscal year, is putting Texas into a new business fast. Robert S. Calvert, who is the State Comptroller, has to administer and collect the tax throughout the State.

Sounds simple until the gigantic task is reduced to the practical question "Who is going to collect the tax?" A limited number of highly qualified professional auditors will be needed to cover the state from the Comptroller's four regional offices. These offices are located in Dallas, San Antonio, Lubbock and Houston.

Calvert has called on the Texas Employment Commission to help him meet this critical need in a professional field which is not presently over crowded. The TEC, through its network of 91 local offices throughout the state, feels confident that, if there are qualified tax auditors available, they will be able to find them.

The job specifications given to the TEC by Calvert range from entry level auditing duties to complex auditing assignments, with the top level jobs requiring supervisory abilities as well as professional and technical know-how. The TEC says it will operate on its regular clearance procedure

and that applications for these jobs will be accepted in any local office of the Texas Employment Commission. Applications and screening tests will also be handled in the local offices of the Texas Employment Commission.

Both Comptroller Calvert and R. L. Coffman, Administrator of the Texas Employment Commission, said that a full job description of each of the three classifications would be available in each of the local TEC offices and that applicants would stand a better chance of getting a job through their own local TEC office. Applicants making a trip to Austin without the preliminary application and tests may find themselves going to needless expense, time, and effort.

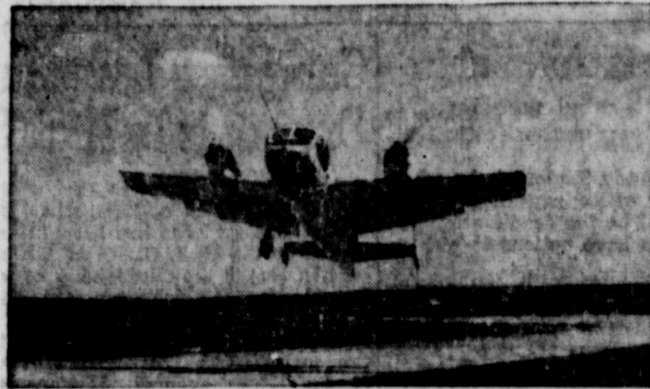

Research in nuclear fusion supported by Texas power companies has been given a place on the program of an international conference on nuclear fusion research which began in Salzburg, Austria, Monday it was reported by Texas Electric Service Company.

Texas Electric is a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, which is composed of 11 investor-owned electric companies of Texas. The Foundation and General Dynamics Corporation are jointly sponsoring research aimed at controlling the nuclear fusion (hydrogen bomb) reaction for the eventual production of electric power. It is the world's largest privately-financed research program in this field.

Also, after Sept. 1 the fee for renewing an automobile driver's license will be \$3 instead of \$2. This is the second increase in recent years in the driver's license fee.

Hunting Dates Set by State Game Dept.

The Game and Fish Department of the State of Texas has issued the following dates and regulations concerning the hunting seasons in the State.

QUAIL—Nov. 24-Jan. 20 in the Possum Kingdom area. General law dates are Dec. 1-Jan. 16. The counties in the Possum Kingdom area are Archer, Baylor, Bosque, Clay, Comanche, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hamilton, Hill, Hood, Jack, Johnson, Knox, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Somerville, Stephens, Tarrant, Wichita, Wilbarger, Wise and Young. Shooting hours: One-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour before sunset. Daily bag limit is 15 and possession limit 45.

Under general law the daily bag limit is 12 and the possession limit 36. Shooting hours are the same.

Special seasons, including the one in the Possum Kingdom area, will not be officially confirmed until the October quarterly meeting of the Texas Game and Fish Commission at Austin.

MOURNING DOVES: North Zone, Sept. 1-Oct. 30. South Zone Oct. 7-Dec. 5 except in those counties having a white-winged season where it ends Dec. 2. Shooting hours, noon until sunset. Daily bag limit 15, possession limit 30.

ANTELOPE—Oct. 1-Oct. 7 in the Trans-Pecos area. Oct. 14-15-16 and 18-19-20 in the Panhandle area. The bag limit is one antelope per season per hunter.

WHITE-TAILED DEER—Nov. 16-Dec. 31 under general law, with a two-buck per season bag limit. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.

Special seasons and bag limit will be listed in the Game Digest Supplement which will be available this week. Three deer bag limits will be authorized in some counties in some areas, the bonus deer to be a doe.

TURKEY—Nov. 16-Dec. 31 Bag limit, three gobblers per season, through this varies from county to county as does the season in some instances. The Digest of Game and Fish laws should be consulted. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.

MULE DEER—Dec. 1-8 in the Trans-Pecos area. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset. Bag limit any one of the following combinations: one buck mule deer and one buck, white-tailed deer; two buck white-tailed deer; one buck mule deer and one antler-

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Replica of Space Capsule to Be At State Fair

A replica of the capsule in which America's first astronauts, Commander Alan B. Shepard and Capt. Virgil Grissom, were launched into space this year, will be exhibited along with other space age displays at the 1961 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 7-22, Dallas.

The full-sized model of the capsule used in "Project Mercury" is being sent to the State Fair by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The capsule will be occupied by a dummy astronaut in flight position and attired in an actual space suit like those worn by Shepard and Grissom. The capsule replica also has a simulated instrument panel and control board of the type used by the astronauts.

The space capsule will be on exhibit in the Varied Industries Building at the State Fair. Other NASA exhibits will illustrate the many aspects of Project Mercury which include wind tunnel tests, capsule drop tests, capsule fabrication, astronaut selection and training, test firings, the chimpanzee "Ham" space flight and the flight of Astronaut Shepard in the Freedom 7 rocket.

Another space age exhibit by the Convair division of General Dynamics will be devoted to the Atlas missile program which is designed to put an astronaut into orbit around the earth.

The Federal Aviation Authority will have a number of exhibits demonstrating how aircraft traffic is regulated. They will include an actual weather reporting station, sector control equipment used to direct traffic in the air corridors, a working model of a modern airport, operating radar for tracking aircraft and a simulated flight control tower where fairgoers can participate in controlling a simulated approach and landing by a model airplane.

Also on exhibit at the State Fair will be several actual Army missiles, including a Lacrosse, a giant Redstone and a Little John rocket.

If the nation's communications systems were suddenly to blare out that sixty-six divisions of armed men would, within the next few weeks, be invading our marshes and forest lands the results would amount to a near panic. Yet this is exactly what is going to happen between now and October when more than a million bright-eyed nimrods will eagerly turn into walking arsenals, set out to drink in the autumn air and return home loaded with prized venison, rare fowl, and in some cases the pelt of a fellow hunter. This is also the time when forest rangers, gamekeepers, local sheriffs and first aid stations tensely prepare for the possible carnage that could ensue when the eagerly sought target turns out to be the backside of a brother in arms.

The National Rifle Association of America suggests that rigid adherence to a few basic rules of

safe and sensible gun handling can spell the difference between a robust, happy holiday and tragedy. N.R.A.'s more than half million members live by these rules: (1) Treat Every Gun As If It Were Loaded—it is always the unloaded gun that seems to do the damage. (2) Always Point The Muzzle In A Safe Direction—the true gun expert is easy to spot by the way he handles his gun. (3) Be Sure Of Your Target—no trophy is worth an uncertain shot. (4) Be Sure Of Your Backstop—bullets can go for incredibly long distances. (5) Avoid Alcoholic Beverages Before And During Shooting—it really doesn't keep you warm and can affect your judgment.

A forest with its autumn colors is a beautiful thing to contemplate thus if you are not sure of your target, light up a cigar—sit down—relax until you have planned your next move.

Jesse White Is Awarded State Certificate

State health authorities this week awarded an official certificate of competency to Jesse W. White of Ranger, plant superintendent for the Eastland County water supply district, for excellent performance of a vital public service.

The impressively designed document, signed by the commissioner of health and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, is sparingly awarded only to those who can demonstrate "skill and knowledge of sewer treatment plant management and an understanding of the public health importance of the work."

Under the State Health Department's operator certification program, operators are carefully examined on their technical ability and on their knowledge of their work's influence on community health. Each must pass a stiff written test to qualify for certification.

The Texas general sanitation law requires that at least one plant operator per shift be certified by the state health agency, but other plant personnel and persons in related fields frequently seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to advance themselves professionally and to increase their efficiency.

"The recipients of these certificates are a credit to their profession and to their communities," sponsors of the certification program said.

Points toward certification are earned through actual work experience and by attendance at annual district and state short schools sponsored and conducted by the Texas State Department of Health, the engineering extension service of Texas A and M College, and the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association.
