School Districts Organize To Oppose Consolidation

Peanut Harvest Moving Briskly

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And digging is over 14 per cent complete in the Cross Timbers region which includes Eastland County.

And approximately 38 per cent of the Texas cotton crop has been harvested with picking, pulling, and stripping about 81 per cent complete in the south central counties.

Momentum in the cotton fields in the Cross Timbers was expected to increase where about 10 per cent of the early crop is picked, the report said.

Asked Thursday afternoon by telephone by a Telegram reporter, for an invitation, Browder refused to extend an invitation, and said that he and his school was merely acting as host.

He said that the other school administrators had asked that the meet be kept unpublicized.

Asked if he thought "secret meetings" were in the best interest of the public, Browder said he thought this one might be used such a time as released are made.

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Browder presided at the auditorium meet until officers were elected.

Dean Kirk of Gorman nominated Siebert as chairman, but before a vote could be held, the Eastland administrator asked that he be permitted to decline because of the unfavorable attention it might draw to Eastland since the leading proponent of the plan, Dr. Jim Whittington, lives in Eastland.

school would have only two vocational agriculture and four home-making teachers who would get state assisted salaries.

Therefore, Browder said, only 120 boys could take ag and about that many homemakers, unless the district paid for additional teachers.

Siebert emphasized that such a plan would put the school in the position of putting some money (incentive) into one pocket, but taking more money out of the "back pocket" to pay for all the extras.

Perry then told the group that it was his understanding that the advocates of the plan are now planning to drop the Cisco, Scranton and Rising Star schools from the plan.

"They'll try to get those three later," Siebert said.

The group then discussed various aspects of the project:

That it would cost about \$3 million to build a central school;

That board representation for the one district would be difficult to determine;

That such a school would require more administrative assistants than is proposed and they would have to be paid from local tax money;

And then they talked about the idea that the superintendents are against the plan because they all lose their jobs.

Spence said "We've all taught before and we can teach again."

"The nine superintendents," Siebert said, "would all be derelict in their duties if they didn't explore all the aspects of the plan. We have the duty of presenting the facts to the people, who will decide themselves. The superintendents aren't going to decide."

One of the Rising Star board members said that district hadn't known that they were even being considered for consolidation until recently.

"This whole thing is symbolic of the way bad legislation is passed, one unidentified man said.

Stanley Webb of Cisco said we've got to convince the people that the entire county will have to go through a complete tax evaluation to consolidate and he estimated that it would cost from \$100,000 to \$125,000 to get an outside firm to do the evaluation. (Cisco spent \$10,250 recently for an evaluation of their 163 square miles of district.)

Supt. Travis Hilliard of Olden pointed out that the incentive money which he said was being displayed by the advocates as "money from heaven" is really "sacred money" and can be used only for bonds and not for operations.

It was pointed out that a bond election would follow the consolidation election and only property owners would be eligible to vote on bonds, whereas any poll-tax equipped, qualified voter could vote in the consolidation move.

Kirk moved that a committee of 27 men—nine school superintendents and a non-school-connected layman from each of the nine districts—meet as soon as possible to prepare a report to explore all the facts for the public.

The committee will meet one day next week at Carbon to discuss budgets, costs, etc. for one or both of the proposed consolidation moves. (Either the 9 district or the 6 district.)

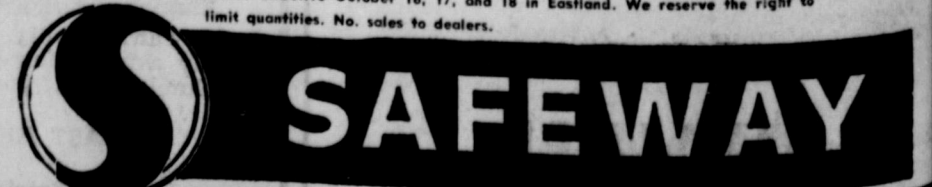
