Mavericks Lassoed By Loboes, 41-0

A spirited, heavy, but less-than-swift Maverick eleven was subdued by an aggressive Cisco Lobo team, 41-0, before approximately 3,000 fans in Chesley Field in Cisco Friday night.

Coach Jimmy Hughes' red and blacks, minus 135-pound J. D. Ables, just couldn't get moving.

The Mavericks are scoreless after two outings this year. They bowed to Comanche, 21-0, earlier.

The Lobos were kept out of paydirt during the first quarter although they were in possession of the ball the majority of the time.

Fumbles plagued the Mavericks and Cisco scored early in the second quarter and ran the ball over for an extra two.

The Loboes, who went down to Hamlin 30-6 in their opener, added six more points just before the end of the first half, but failed for another attempted extra points for run-over.

In the third stanza the Loboes added two touchdowns and kicked for an extra point.

Early in the fourth Cisco's wirey little back, Nicky Lopez, who sparked a great deal of the winner's program, plunged over for six more. An attempted run-over resulted in a fumble and a recovery for the Loboes, but no extra points.

Eastland's big moment of elation came after the early Cisco scoring in the fourth.

Gary Graham, 155-pound back, found a hole and scurried 30 yards picking up the Mavericks' one first down, before being dropped by a Cisco barage.

It was a third down try and "old man fumble" put the ball in Cisco's hands on the next play.
