Ranger Little League Team Nipped by Breck

Breckenridge's pitching a c e, Ronald Bell, calmed Ranger's big bats Monday night to win the area Little League championship. Bell limited the hard hitting Ranger team to just two hits while his teammates put together four hits to post a 5-3 win.

Breck thus earned the right to represent the area in the district tourney.

Only Ranger batters to feel Bell's pitches were Bill Arterburn and Johnny McGee. Arterburn, who got four home runs in helping Ranger defeat Albany Friday night, collected a double, a n d McGee, who had three for five against Albany, added a single.

Ranger jumped to a 2-0 lead in the first frame, and held on until

the third inning when Breckenridge bunched three hits to score five runs. A fifth in ing rally fell short when McGee was thrown out trying to steal second, then Bell retired three in a row in the final inning to wrap up the coveted crown.

Jerry Watson and Larry Black, well divided time on the mound for Ranger and together scattered four hits. It was a short game, with only 24 men going to bat for each team.

Frank Loggans was the leading Breckenridge batter, getting two singles in two trips. Jim Knight and Frank Riney got singles back to back in the third.

Weatherford Rodeo Now In Progress

Professional rodeo cowboys will be shooting for prize money totaling almost \$6,000 when they try their skill against the rough and ready stock in the 14th annual Parker County Frontier Days rodeo, July 26-29, in Weatherford.

Tommy Steiner of Austin is producing the four-night rodeo for the Parker County Sheriff's Posse. It is one of the biggest outdoor shows in the state, and some of the top names in the rodeo world will be competing in the Rodeo Contestant Association approved show.

Featured in the 1961 edition of the rodeo will be Jim Eskew of Ardmore, Okla. Eskew won the last three world's championship roping and horse catching contests that were held.

Also drawing the spotlight will be Earl Horton of San Saba and his American International trial champion sheep dogs. Horton's dogs are in their first year of performing for the public.

The rodeo opened o' Wednesday, July 26 with a long western parade through the streets of downtown Weatherford starting at 5 p.m. The rodeo performances start at 8 p.m. each night at the Sheriff's Posse arena.

Don Wilson to Receive Training In Mississippi

Airman Don Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Wilson of 606 S. Dixie, Eastland, has completed his initial course of Air Force basic military training at Lackland Air Force Base. He has been selected to attend the technical training course for Radio and Radar Maintenance at Keesler AFB, Miss.

Airman Wilson is a graduate of Eastland High School.

Basic airmen at Lackland are selected for specialized training at technical schools on the basis of their interests and aptitudes. They are reassigned to the school after five weeks of basic training. At the technical schools they are given additional military training along with the technical instructions.

Upon completion of special technical training at an Air Force Technical Training Center, airmen are assigned to operational units of the USAF Aerospace Force.

Training School, being conducted this week on the campus of Texas A. and M. College, according to Henry D. Smith, Chief of Firemen Training for the Engineering Extension Service, Texas A. and M. College System. These cities and towns will receive this credit if their firemen successfully pass the test for their selected course, Smith stated.

Attending from Eastland are Fire Chief Guy Robinson and firemen Jack D. Wood and Ray Harbin. Robinson is taking a fire marshall's course and the other two firemen are enrolled in basic firefighting.

The School, sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas and conducted by the Engineering Extension Service, is now in its 32nd year, and attendance at the school has increased from the 196 who attended the first school to the anticipated 1700 who will participate this year. More than 250 instructors and Administrative personnel will take an active part in conducting the school this year. Over 35,000 gallons of gasoline, oil, butane and propane fuel, plus thousands of dollars worth of chemical extinguishing agents and equipment will be used during the week of training for the student firemen, in twelve different courses.

The 1,700 students, instructors, administrative staff and visitors, representing city, county, state, industrial and armed services will come from 25 states other than Texas and registrations have been received from several foreign countries. The school held from July 23 - 28, will be conducted on a new 26 acre training area, recently dedicated by Texas A. and M. College as "Brynton Firemen's Training Field" as a memorial to the late Col. H. R. Brynton who served as Director of the school from its inception until 1955.

Courses offered this year to the firemen include Basic Firefight-

ing, Advanced Firefighting, Fire Marshal I, Fire Marshal II, Fire Marshal III, Firemen Instructor Training, Fire Department Officer Training, Industrial Fire Protection, Armed Service Fire Protection, Fire Department Pump Maintenance, Fire Department Pump Operations, and a specialized Fire Protection Course.

He serves boyhood through the scouting movement in Stephens, Eastland, Erath and Comanche counties with a present membership of 43 Scouting units and 1,200 boys and leaders in the territory known as Noreast District.

Eastland County was represented at the District 8 Girls 4-H Dress Revue by Joy Love of Gorman in the Junior Division and Mary Tonne of Nimrod in the Sr. Division July 20 at Stephenville.

There were 15 girls in each division present from 15 different counties. Joy Love brought home a blue ribbon and Mary Tonne received a red ribbon. These girls won the County Dress Revue, in their respective divisions.

In order for the girls to enter the district dress revue they have to complete a record book in clothing, construct a dress and accessorize it and model their garment in the revue. All three phases are judged and the girl getting the highest composite score receives first place. This year District 8 will be sending five girls to the State Dress Revue, which will be held in Dallas the first week in October.

'Majority Must Say What Shall be Taught'

Dr. Ted Nicksick, president of Ranger Junior College, told Eastland Lions Tuesday that Democracy and education are closely tied together.

"Once the majority of the people lose the right to determine what will be taught in our schools Democracy will fail," the noted educator insisted.

Comparing education in Russia and the United States, Dr. Nicksick said that in the USSR a select group of people, the Central Committee, decides what will and what will not be taught. In America the people as a whole make that decision.
