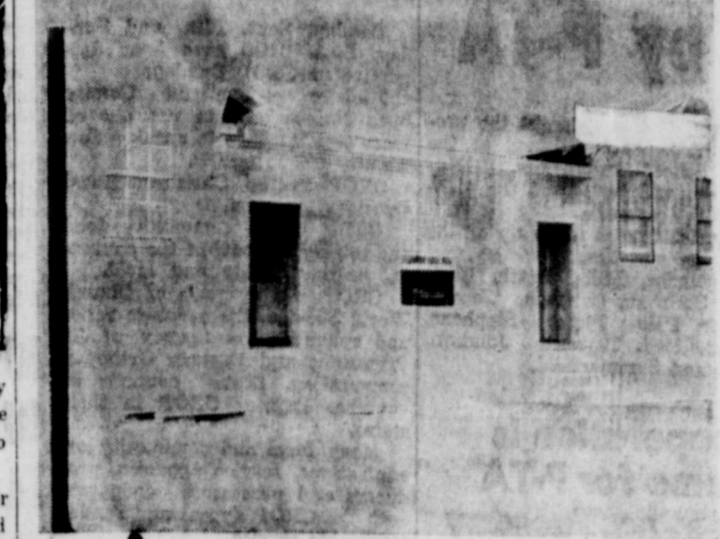

Introduction. By fairly general consent of those who know the field, the most influential book in New Testament study during the last forty years has been the Commentary on Paul's Letter to the Romans by Karl Barth of Switzerland.

"No one book," writes one, "has done so much to shape a large section of Christian thought and stimulate theological renewal."

This book, written by an unknown man while pastor of a small church in the Swiss Alps, was the herald of God's springtime in the midst of the darkness and gloom of Europe in 1918.

God spoke through an Alpine village pastor His Word for that day, and for the days since then.

1. Paul's Letter to the Romans is the most orderly presentation of the nature of the Christian Gospel in the Bible—or anywhere else.

It does not deal with everything, but it has been so important and influential in the life of the Church that every period of reformation and spiritual renewal in the history of the Church has been spearheaded by a new and renewed understanding of what God has to say to us through its words; by Augustine, who stood between the fall of the Roman Empire and the Middle Ages; by Luther, between the Middle Ages and the Reformation; by Calvin, between the Reformation and the modern world; and now by Barth of our day, between our modern world and whatever God has in store for us.

Coleridge pronounced Romans, "the most profound work ever written." Luther called it, "the chief book of the New Testament and the Gospel."

Calvin wrote that it "opens the door to all the treasures in the Scriptures."

Knox, in Interpreters' Bible, wrote, "it is unquestionably the most important theological book ever written."

2. The chief question of Romans is, "What is the Gospel, and how do we live it?" Or, to put it otherwise, "How is man to become righteous in the sight of God?"

The central emphasis is God's Will and Purpose, not man's salvation; God's requirements, not man's wants or needs; God's judgment of us, not our judgment of God; God's choice of us, not our choice of God; God's Word to man in Christ, not man's word about God.

We know only as God reveals Himself to us, not as the end of our striving toward Him—and it is not ours to say when, or how, or where God must make Himself known.

He chooses the time and place and way.

Knox writes: Underlying everything in Romans is Paul's conviction that "man's life depends on God."

Only when we realize the nature of that relationship, and approximate the consequences which follow from it can we hope either to understand our life or to deal successfully with its perplexities.

Whether we like it or not, we are creatures wholly dependent upon God."

The Christian Gospel is God's Good News that God has done for us in Christ what we cannot possibly do for ourselves.

His gift of forgiveness could never be earned—we never could merit it.

The illumination of His Spirit enables us to respond in lives of gratitude, trust and obedience.

We die to self and live to Him. God takes hold of us, not we of Him, and His is a love which will not let us go.

Conclusion. Read, study, and ponder well Paul's Letter to the Romans. It is not easy, but whoever supposed the understanding of God's Word to man was easy? God may speak to you, here.
