



## Earl Woody Retires From Texas Electric

After fifty years of utility company work, Earl Woody left his desk at Texas Electric Service Company Thursday to begin his retirement.

The event was climaxed for him at a banquet given in his honor at the White Elephant Restaurant Thursday evening. Fellow employees in the district and their wives attended and presented Mr. and Mrs. Woody with a set of luggage.

F. W. Rogers of Fort Worth, financial vice-president, expressed the company's appreciation for the 49 years of fine service which Woody had given the company. Frank Sayre, district manager, was master of ceremony.

Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Richardson, friends of the Woodys, were special guests at the banquet, which was attended by 65 people.

Woody, who has been district accounting manager with Texas Electric some 30 years, has a service record dating back to May 29, 1912. Prior to this he was employed by the Waco Gas and Electric Company, beginning with them as a meter-reader and collector in June, 1911.

He lived in Waco until he entered the Air Force, a branch of the Army, in 1918. When he was discharged, the company transferred him to Eastland in January, 1920.

On November 17 of that year he married Miss Lillian Phillips.

Woody's recollection of his early days in utility company work takes him back to the time

of the pre-pay quarter meters for gas.

The first company for which he worked distributed both gas and electricity, and it was a part of his work to collect the quarters which the housewives deposited in their meters in order to receive a certain amount of gas.

Once a month he rented a horse and buggy from the livery stable for use in reading meters and collecting on the outskirts of town.

But looking ahead instead of to the past, Mr. and Mrs. Woody plan to move to Knoxville, a favorite city of both. Woody already has plans for hunting, fishing, and gardening.

Until then, they will continue to enjoy their country home on 2-acres, five miles north of Eastland.

## Janis Little's Nationality Is Questioned by Germans

At a time when the image Americans present abroad is of recognized importance, a young woman from Eastland so successfully adapted herself to living in a foreign country and speaking its language that on numerous occasions she was required to show her passport as proof that she was not a citizen of that nation.

Janis Little, of Eastland, returned Aug. 18 after 10 months at the University of Freiburg in Freiburg, Germany. During this period of study as a winner of the Ful-

bright Scholarship Grant for foreign study, she conversed almost entirely in German.

In Eastland now for a visit in the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Little, she plans to enter Yale Graduate School at New Haven, Conn., on Sept. 10. For this work she has been awarded the Woodrow Wilson National Teaching Fellowship.

For the first month of her stay in Germany she participated in the "Experiment in International Living." The program provides that

the student live for a period of time in the home of a family in the nation where they are studying.

The families who apply for a visiting student are carefully screened and those selected receive students of similar cultural and religious backgrounds. Some financial remuneration is given by the agency which sponsors the program.

Janis lived in the home of Dr. Otto Preisler, his wife and their 7-year-old daughter, Martina. The home was the second floor of a 3-story house, and Janis occupied the bedroom that was ordinarily that of the little girl.

The arrangement produced such a strong friendship that after Janis moved, the couple continued to invite her for lunch once a week and included her in their plans for family excursions to the Black Forest, Munich, and Alsace Lorraine.

She entered further into their activities by singing in the choir of the church they attended. The church was the Evangelical, a leading protestant church of the area. It is much like churches here, Janis explained, with the exception that the services are slightly more formal.

After leaving the Preisler home, Janis lived on the outskirts of the town on "Wildal Strasse" (Wild Valley St.) with a view toward the mountains and the ruins of the home of a noble family, the Zaehringers, who founded the city.

As for her studies, some time was required, she said, to adopt oneself to the lack of control by the university.

There is much greater freedom in selecting courses, she explained, with absolutely no requirement that one ever attend lectures. Attendance for seminars is expected, however.

There are no exams given during the course or required at the end of it. An exam is given but usually it is only taken by those who are receiving subsidies from the state. Records of courses for which one has enrolled are kept in a book which the student keeps

J. D. Ables was outstanding in both defense and offense play. Johnny Shoemaker showed up well on defense.

In the first quarter the Comanche Indian recovered a Maverick fumble on their own 30 setting up their first scoring opportunity. From the 30 the Indians used line plugging and off tackle plays carrying the ball to the two yard line. Jerry Todd carried over for the final two yards and the first six points. He also carried over for the two bonus points making the score 8 to 0.

During the second quarter the Mavericks held their own and prevented the Indians from scoring.

The stout Indian defense kept the Eastland Mavericks on their side of the 50 until late in the last quarter.

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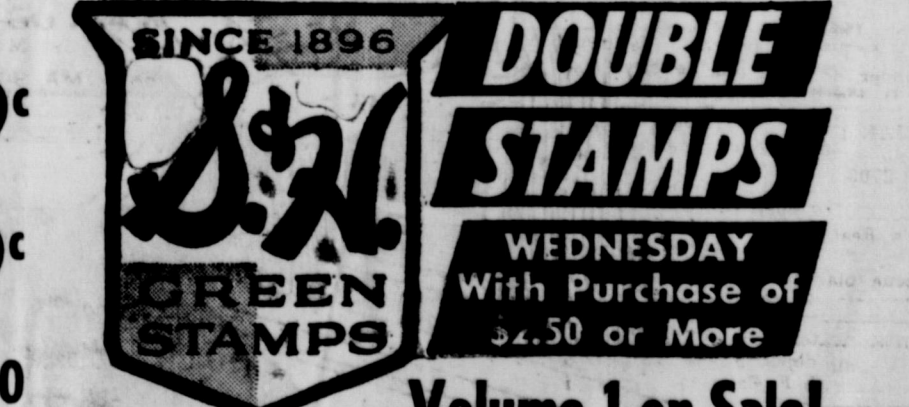
