

September Pay Increase OK'd for Teachers, Others

The school board of the Eastland Independent School District voted unanimously during a five and one-half hour session this week to declare publicly that they have not and do not at this time endorse the proposal of a consolidated high school for Eastland County.

In making the announcement, the board said, "It is the feeling of the group that such a move would not be economical and that the needs of the high school students at Eastland would not be more adequately met by such a move.

During an agenda-packed meeting, the board also voted to make the teacher pay-increase effective as of Sept. 1, and tentatively approved a \$285,236.98 budget for the year.

The proposed expenditures for the school year now in progress are almost \$39,000 more than was spent last year.

The increased budget includes pay boosts for school secretarial and custodian help. The board okayed a \$25 per

month pay increase for Mrs. An-dy Taylor, secretary, and Mrs. Frank Hightower, school tax collector. The hike will put them at \$250 per month. Members discussed appropria-
