DRAFT HEAD SAYS 'No Increase In Call-Ups Expected—Barring War'

"If we stand ready to go, we're not likely to have to go," Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state director of Selective Service, said in Eastland Monday.

Speaking at a joint meeting of the Lions and Rotary club, he said that despite the recent increase in call-up, he doesn't anticipate further increases — unless war breaks out.

He said, "and we are the only country that stands in his way. We have strength and he recognizes that strength. President Kennedy has ordered a manpower increase, and if we all do our part we can keep that strength up."

"We must have solidarity and strength," he said. Col. Schwartz, a veteran of 40 years active and inactive service in the Army, briefly outlined the history of "conscriptio" which dates back to Biblical times.

The cost of water in Eastland and Olden is going up five cents a thousand gallons. Eastland City Commissioners voted unanimously Monday night to increase water rates to offset the increase that the Eastland County Water District has imposed.

Chevy Trucks On Display

Commissioner Milton Fullen, who is also a director for the Water District, explained to the Commission that the district can't pump water for four cents a thousand.

"The district isn't getting one cent more than they need," he said.

Reason for the increase, Fullen said, is to bring two mandatory accounts up to par, and the only way to do it was to either raise taxes or increase the rates. The district sells water to Eastland, Ranger and Lone Star Gas Co. It costs approximately \$12,000 a year to pump water, Fullen said. Jesse White is manager of the water-supply organization.

City manager Jimmy Young explained that the city buys about 43 million gallons of water a year which isn't billed to anyone, amounting to about 25 per cent, for which the city receives no money.

"The no-billed water includes that which is lost through leaks, and that given away to such projects as the swimming pool, the first 5,000 gallons to the hospital, fires and flushing of fire hydrants."

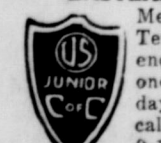

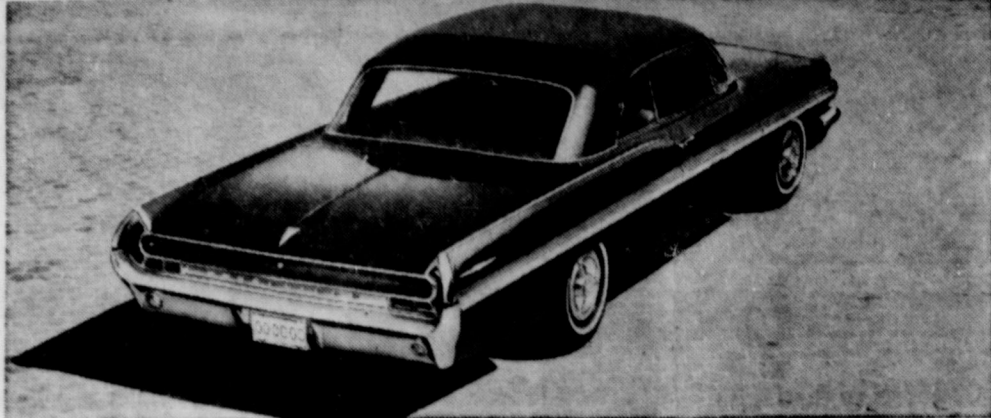

TELEPHONE TALK

TELEPHONE SERVICE NEAR NORMAL AFTER HURRICANE CARLA STRIKES

Hurricane Carla has come and gone, and I know we were all glad to see her go. Even though we were not directly affected here in Eastland, I like to tell you a little of what she did to telephone service on the Gulf Coast and what Southwestern Bell did about it. It's an interesting and dramatic story.

As Carla faded northward after her terrible blow at the Gulf Coast, she left behind:

- damage totalling \$6 1/2 million to telephone facilities
- 144,000 telephones knocked out along a 500-mile stretch of coastal front and inland points
- miles of telephone lines and poles flattened in a twisted maze of wire and splintered wood
- 15 Southwestern Bell exchanges completely isolated, including Freeport, Bay City, and El Campo, along with 28 other communities

Telephone people were ready for the emergency. Before the winds and rains had subsided, Southwestern Bell had men and equipment rolling to the disaster area to restore crippled telephone service.

An army of 5,400 telephone men from many cities and states was hastily assembled in the Galveston - Corpus Christi-Victoria area. More than 900 came from points in North Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, and Missouri. Equipment flown in.

At the same time, the company flew emergency generating equipment for electric power in to the storm area from many places in our five-state territory. From other cities in North Texas, special mobile radio trucks converged on the stricken area to help bridge the gap left by the silenced telephones, relay emergency messages, and maintain contact with the "outside world."

These joined forces with the men, trucks, and other emergency equipment which Southwestern Bell already had sent into the area as a precautionary measure when hurricane warnings were first issued.

Operators from West Texas While repair crews began the work of restoration, 150 telephone operators from Lubbock, Amarillo, Abilene and other West Texas points were sent to Houston and other storm-hit cities to help handle the tremendous volume of long distance calls . . . many of them vital messages from police, public health, civil defense, and other agencies.

With skill, determination, and co-ordinated teamwork Southwestern Bell people worked 'round the clock until all circuits were restored and all telephones back in service (where the condition of homes and business permitted). Telephone service in the disaster area is now back to normal. It was a tremendous job, carried out under trying conditions at top speed.

When Hurricane Carla struck, telephone people "came through" 100 per cent in the emergency. Southwestern Bell's "telephone team" of men and women again demonstrated their ability to meet the challenge of the storm in the highest tradition of "The Spirit of Service."

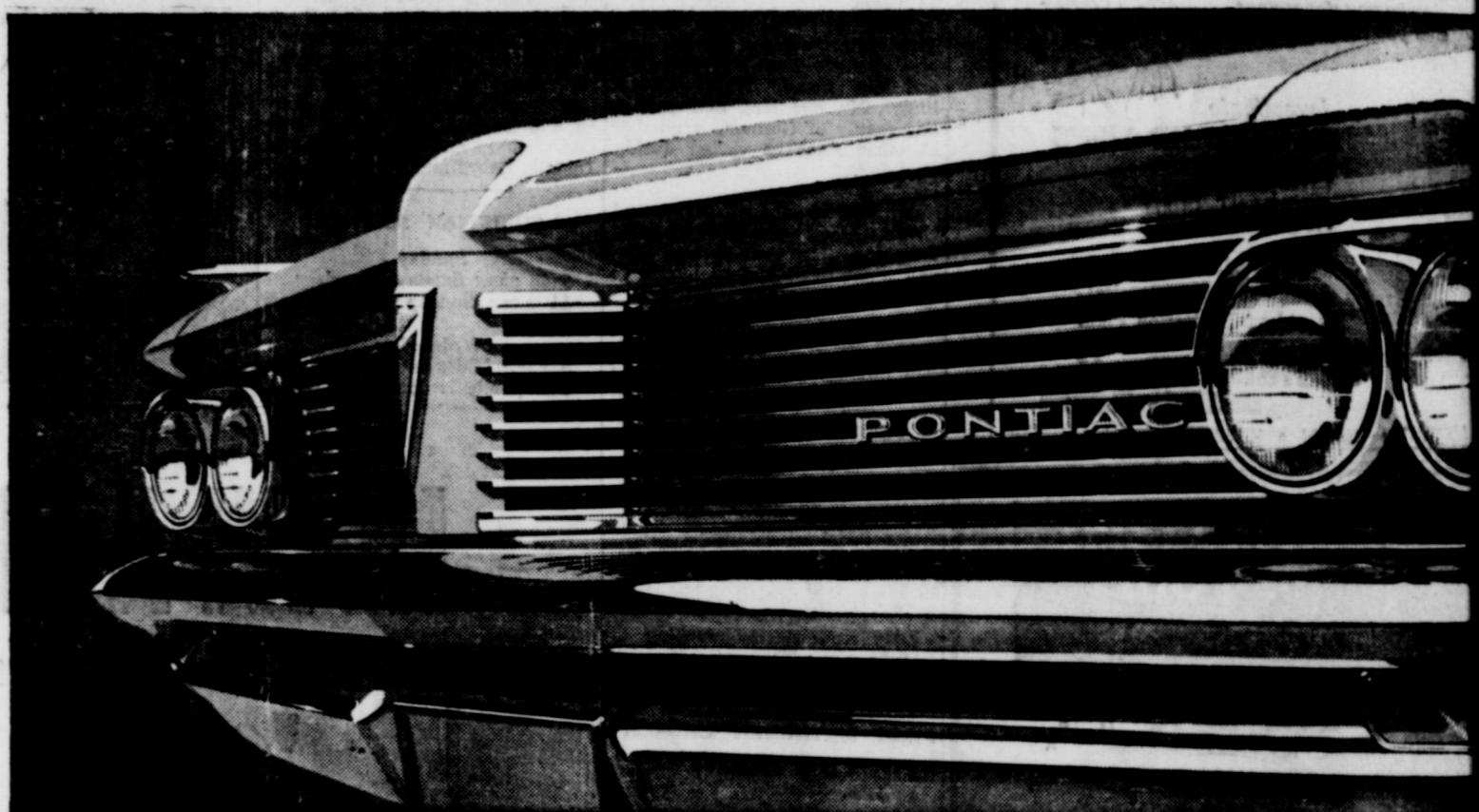

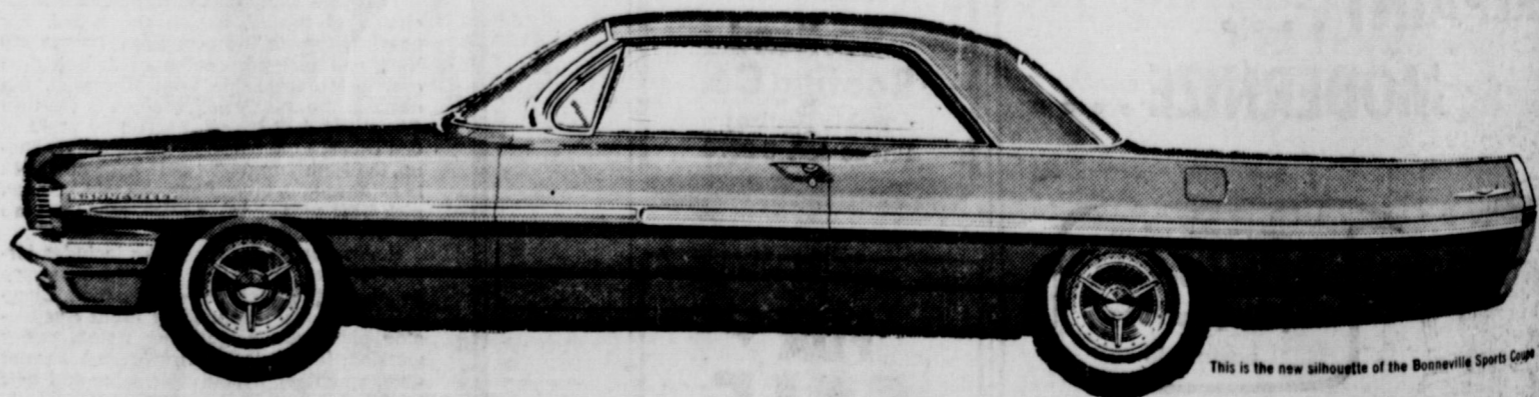

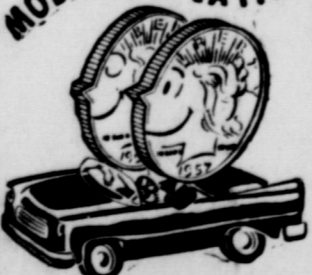
