## TEXAS UNITED FUND

## Here's How Part of Your United Fund Gift Is Used

(This is the first in a series of articles explaining the functions of the participating agencies of the United Fund in Eastland. The first article is about the Texas United Fund which includes several individual charities grouped under one heading, for which \$560 is being asked.)

The Texas United Fund is made up of:

United Service Organization (USO)  
Texas has over 300,000 men stationed within its border at 71 military installations, with the USO serving these men and women at 20 centers throughout the state. This is more USO installations than in any other state.

There are 186,000 Texas men and women in service stationed all over the world. The U. S. Department of Defense strongly urges the USO to provide more adequate overseas facilities. The more-than-ever present threat of communism and aggression demands the highest degree of preparedness and morale in our armed forces.

United Seaman's Service (USS)  
Trade, commerce and defense are served by American ships, manned by American seamen. More than 6,000 Texans from every region of the state earn their families' living as seamen. Their wages, below the hourly minimum required by federal law, go to maintain families living in Texas communities.

The USS is serving, in Texas, the second largest shipping state in the nation with the longest coastline of any state.  
At home, Texans are aided by voluntary and government agencies, families and friends. Overseas, there is only United Seaman's Service.

American Social Health Assoc. (ASHA)  
ASHA directs its total attention to the following problems:  
Veneral diseases, children born out of wedlock, children from broken homes, juvenile delinquency court cases and prostitution.  
The agency works with municipal, state and federal authorities in law and health.

National Recreation Assoc. (NRA)  
The National Recreation Assoc. helps counties and communities of Texas provide better recreation for all citizens.  
Texas Social Welfare Assoc. (TSWA)  
The TSWA provides a program of service to the state and its individual communities for analyzing health, welfare, recreation and character-building programs. It seeks to conserve human resources, help welfare programs meet changing conditions, and fit tax and voluntary welfare expenditures to the total economy.

American Hearing Society (AHS)  
The AHS is the only non-profit agency in this county (with member organizations) devoting its entire efforts and resources to establishing, improving and expanding local community services for children and adults with hearing loss.

Council on Social Work Education (CSWE)  
The Council on Social Work Education serves Texas welfare agencies by programs of recruiting and training social workers for the many understaffed positions in social work.

## Rotarians Told Of 'Way Marks'

A large audience, composed of Eastland Rotary members and their guests was told Monday to keep an eye on "way marks."

Dr. P. D. O'Brien, native Eastland County and evangelist, told the crowd that this generation is not only following the trail made by the fathers of old, but are in fact blazing trails for generations to come.

Speaking at the regular Monday luncheon meet, he began his talk with a rollicking story-telling session, and wound up by suggesting that this generation not necessarily make the burden any easier, but rather, strengthen the backs of men in generation to follow.  
Dr. O'Brien, who for the past 20 years has pastored the First Baptist Church of Big Spring, is currently preaching in a revival at the First Baptist Church in Cisco. He recently retired as pastor and is devoting his full time to evangelism.

## Eastland County Cancer Unit To Be Re-Organized Thursday

Plans to re-organize the Eastland County Unit of the American Cancer Society have been announced by Sam Kimmell of Cisco, acting chairman.

The first organizational meeting will be held Thursday, Oct. 19, in the Texas Electric Building, at 7:30 p.m.

All citizens of Eastland County, Kimmell stated, who are interested in learning how they may join the fight against cancer in their own community are cordially invited to attend.  
"Since knowledge is the key to cancer control," Kimmell pointed out, "twice as many cures could be effected with our present knowledge, if patients were treated promptly. However, the lack of prompt treatment is due to the lack of knowledge of cancer's danger signals or the fear of cancer itself. Last year, 100,000 lives were lost to cancer unnecessarily."

"In order to protect Eastland County citizens from the dangers of cancer," Kimmell said, "we need our citizens to take an active interest in the program of the American Cancer Society to save lives from this various and silent killer disease."

"Our Eastland County citizens have a right to know how to protect their lives. It is the responsibility of our community to develop a year-round educational and service program by re-organizing the Eastland County Unit of ASC."

## Youthful Purse-Snatchers Make Bad Choice in Eastland

Three juveniles from Ft. Worth learned Tuesday afternoon in Eastland that they picked the wrong elderly woman from whom to snatch a purse.

Thanks to Mrs. Carrie Flowers thorough description and the work of efficient Eastland law enforcement agencies, the three youths were snugly in the County Jail in little more than an hour after their theft.

Mrs. Flowers who lives at 306 E. Plummer St., was returning from a grocery store about 2:30 p.m. when the three drove up beside her and asked if she would like a ride.

When she told them that she would not, one of the three reached out and snatched her purse, which was on her arm.

She immediately called the Eastland Police Dept., and Chief Ray Lainey who was in the patrol car on the north side of town, rushed to Mrs. Flower's home.

She gave a description of the car and the young men.  
Chief Lainey put the information on the sheriff dept. radio and the state Highway Patrol network.

Highway Patrolman Tom Holland, also of Eastland, spotted the wanted car just west of Cisco, and with the assistance of units from Baird, arrested the purse-snatchers.

Mrs. Flowers had told Chief Lainey that she had had about \$25 in her purse, but it developed that there was \$41.26 in the bag and the three admitted that they had spent \$2.75 for gasoline in Cisco.

One of the boys is 15 and the other two are 14 years old. They gave their address as White Settlement, which is just west of Ft. Worth.

## FOR RANGER P-TA Consolidation Gets Scrunity in Debate

The consolidation advocate asked for an "objective outside study" and his opponent called the consolidation plan a "financial fantasy" during a war of words at a P-TA-sponsored debate at Ranger High School auditorium Tuesday night.

Dr. Jim Whittington reviewed work that had been done so far toward consolidation, during his opening remarks, and explained how Senate Bill 80 had been engineered into law to remove the penalty from consolidation.

The physician hit hard at being able to pay off all the schools' debts by consolidating, and predicted that with the declining population, consolidation will come eventually of necessity.

The opponent, Glen Covington, former school board member and safety director for Lone Star Gas Co., agreed to Whittington's "incentive pay" figures, acknowledging that if the nine districts joined into one, there would be a surplus of \$787,000 after debts were paid, or \$614,605 after debts if only the eastern six districts were consolidated.

However, he went on to explain, using what he called "ultra-conservative" estimates, it would cost some \$5,300,000 in local tax money over a ten-year period to have in a consolidated school what is now being offered in the nine individual districts schools.

Sherman Jordan of Fort Worth was buried in De Leon Monday. Mr. Jordan died of a heart attack Saturday in Fort Worth.

J. C. Jordan of Fort Worth is the brother of Mr. Jordan. Mr. Jordan formerly lived in Cisco and was a member of the Church of Christ.

## Record Property Damages And Fatality During Month

The September accident record during September in Eastland County was almost a repeat of the previous month, except for two grim statistics.

There was one fatality during the month, making the year's total three deaths for the year. The two previous deaths came during the month of July. There were none in August.

The September death was a pedestrian who was killed on the outskirts of Rising Star.  
There were 16 accidents during the month—the same as in August.

There were three accidents in which a total of ten people were injured—the same number as were injured during August.

There were 12 accidents in which property damage amounted to a total of \$13,345, which was a record for the year. The highest previous month was July when \$12,925 in damages resulted from traffic accidents.

On the first day of October there had been 106 accidents, three deaths, 65 injuries and property damages amounting to \$68,444.

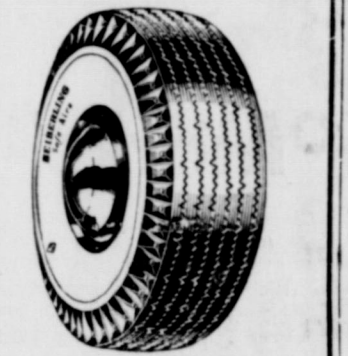

portation; \$9,000 for nine additional buses for transporting high school students; And \$60,000 for interest on estimated \$2 million new schools. The doctor answered in his rebuttal with a list of what he called "silly-tistics", to show, he said, that anyone can prove anything with a set of figures."

Dr. Whittington also read an "open letter" to Wendell Siebert, superintendent of the Eastland schools, and recently-elected president of the county organization that is opposing consolidation. He closed the rebuttal asking for a move into the consideration with a positive attitude.

In his rebuttal, Covington said that the geography was too large and added that the one-school idea could breed juvenile delinquency because of the loss of the community identity.

Asking questions of the two at the end of the debate were Fred Bennett, A. W. Warford, Charles Milliken and Pete Brasher.

The two outspoken debaters graciously shook hands afterwards to the applause of the audience of about 100.

Our charges for cleaning and drying are the same as last year. They are as follows:

- Cleaning . . . . . \$6.00 per ton
- Drying . . . . . 8.00 per ton
- Cleaning & Drying . . . . . 9.00 per ton

The above charges are based on the gross weight before cleaning and-or drying. We now have 50 drying bins and two places to unload.
