Good land stands up best; poor land wears out fast. Abandoned land is usually a sign of failure; either the land or someone has failed

Land is usually abandoned because of one or two reasons. Either because of financial failure of the farmer, or the physical failure of the land. In most cases the physical failure of the land is caused by poor land being put under cultivation.

Land in the Upper Leon Soil according to how much care it senger. needs to stay productive. The grading is made on the basis of the land's physical condition, such as its depth above the parent rock, its surface texture, its posi-

tion (flat or sloping), and its present erosion. These conditions present permament limitations to the land.

There are also temporary limitations found in most soils. These are: low amount of organic matter, plow pans near the surface, low ability to take in and hold water and soil foods and many others. The temporary limitations or hazards can be improved or eliminated by applying the proper care that the lands need.

Class I land is the good, deep level loams and clays that can be farmed without special practice to hold the soil against washing or blowing. It has no permanent limitations.

Class II land is not so good. It needs simple care to save it from washing or blowing and to keep it productive. It has a few permanent limitations. This land occurs on gentle slopes and is not badly washed or blown. It is considered good land. Class III land is not as good as

Class I or II land, but it can be used safely for producing crops. This land is hard to farm. It is uneven and washed or blown in most places. The best of the deep blowsands are in Class III land. This land should have a number of well-chosen practices to grow crops and keep the soil in place. Terraces, stubble mulch tillage, and cover crops should be used on all Class III land.

Class IV land is the "in een" land. That is, it is in be-

trict Court Grand Jury for in vestigation. Also seriously injured in the crash was Pat Darnaby, also of Odessa, who was driving the 1955 station wagon in which Gentry was a passenger.

Neither Curry nor a passenger in his car at the time of the accident, Sam Samples of Odessa, was seriously hurt in the crash.

Field Man Of Security Gives Farm Answers

Field Representative Glen Mc-Natt, here on social security du-ties answered the question, "How are farmers affected by the 1954 Amendments to the Social Secur ity Law?" as follows:

"The amendments extend social security protection to most farmifemilies Beginning Jahun y 1. 1955, people farming for themselves are under social security provided they make as much as \$400 profit in a year from their farm operations.

"These self-employed farmers will contribute toward social se curity while they are working and when their earnings stop because of retirement or death, payments are made to the farmer and his dependents or his survivors.

More than three million selfemployed farmers will earn social security credits in 1955 and 1956. This means that within a period of two years farmers who are now age 65 or will attain 65 by the


