\$2,000 WORTH Narcotics Found Here

A cache of dope, valued at approximately \$2,000, was found on the east edge of Eastland recently.

The find followed an intensive period of arrests and investigations by the County Sheriff's department and the police departments of Eastland and Ranger.

Four persons, two from Oklahoma, one from Dallas and one from Fort Worth, were picked up in Ranger by city police there, after a report was sent out from Dallas, concerning a possible "grocery store holdup."

The quartet, composed of Mr. and Mrs. Sanders McElroy, R. L. Herriod and Mrs. Donnie Phifer, had in their possession at the time of the arrest, burglary tools and a syringe and hypo needle; of the type used for injection of narcotics. They were returning from Eastland when arrested, where they were believed to have made contacts with certain persons.

Charged with possession of narcotic paraphernalia by Justice of the Peace Ruby Springer, and placed under heavy bond (McElroy, \$3,000, Mrs. McElroy, \$2,000, Herriod and Mrs. Phifer, \$2,500 each), they were transferred to the Eastland County Jail.

Each made bond separately and Sheriff Lee Horn and his men tailed each as they were released for clues leading to contacts in Eastland.

As a result of the investigations, the location of the stashed dope, which included heroin, morphine and other types, was discovered.

It was picked up by "the second telephone pole" east of the Eastland Veterans of Foreign War Post.

The case has been turned over to federal authorities, and all but one of the persons has been picked up again.

BUSY COMMISSIONERS Talk Is Of Elections, Highways And Many Things at Monday Meet

City Commissioners called an election for two commission seats and handled a multitude of business during an agenda-packed meeting before a good-sized audience at City Hall Monday night.

The election will be held Tuesday, April 2nd, to fill the seats held by Tom Wilson and Mayor Cyrus Frost, whose terms expire this year.

Six men, including Frost, have already filed for the two places. Filing deadline will be 30 days prior to the election, City Manager Jimmy Young said.

Guests at the meet overflowed the row of six visitors' seats and extra chairs were brought in.

Presented were the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, the Jaycees, the State Highway Department, two Eastland women waiting to do business with the city on a property matter and the commission's regular visitor, Clifford Wilson.

Promptly at 7 p.m. Mayor Frost began an appeal for a program to keep Highway 80 (which is to become Interstate 20) routed through downtown Eastland, rather than by-passing the city as is planned.

"This may be our time for action," he said. He went on to explain how other towns have been seriously hurt by having the highway miss them. He pointed to Weatherford, Big Spring and Eastland as prosperous because the highway still runs through them.

There are two points which indicate that this may be a good time, he said—one is that the highway project is a federal project and the federal government is out of money for the highways, and 2. It is

not a state project, which, if it were, would make it immune to political pressure. Being a federal program, it is highly subject to politics, he said.

All we have to do is show with a "professional job" the right people that it would be

cheaper to keep the through-fare through town, and that our town would be killed if it isn't kept, he said.

Consolidation Election Will Be Held March 17th

The consolidation election will be held Saturday, March 17th. County Judge John Hart called the election Wednesday, in compliance with the law, after having been petitioned by school districts.

Estimates are that the cost of the election will be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$500.

Who Pays Election Costs? 'Districts Involved' -- State

The drive in this county to consolidate schools has sparked some interesting issues—not the least of which is "who pays for the election?"

Since the county judge was petitioned to call the election, first general thoughts were that it would be a county-financed election.

"Not so," avowed citizens from the western part of the county—who are not affected by the election in that the schools in Cisco, Rising Star and Seranton are not involved in the consolidation proposal.

And sure enough, Attorney General decisions bear out that the districts involved must "pay the bill."

County officials sought and got a first-hand decision from the Attorney General late last week on this particular matter, and he assured them that the districts, not the county, will pay the election bill.

So Judge Hart has mailed a letter to each of the six involved school board presidents, explaining the Attorney Gen-

eral rulings, and requesting the amount of election materials anticipated.

Estimates are that the cost of the election will be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$500.

He proposed a cost study be made showing the economy of keeping it downtown by routing traffic one-way on Main and Commerce Sts. This would entail building a bridge over the Leon River on the East side of the city.

we could save federal money," Frost said. He recognized Texas Highway Department representatives E. M. Pritchard, district engineer from Brownwood, and Buddy Haun of Eastland, resident engineer, and told them that it wouldn't be the city's purpose to work behind their backs, but rather to "go over their heads."

Mike George, a Jaycee representative along with President Grover Hallmark and Mike Collins, asked the purpose in the highway's missing towns.

Pritchard volunteer that the original conception of Interstate 20 was to be a defense artery and therefore was to be a fully-controlled access highway with interference kept at a minimum. To take the highway through a town would destroy more property, he pointed out, than going around. It will take a block-width for each segment, he said.

He warned that the city would have to get the rules changed and the are "mighty rigid."

What we are going to do is outside the rules, Frost said, and quoted an incident in which the Wesleyan Methodist Church recently had some rules changed in order to get an oil well.

We can change the rules or delay the action if we can get 4,000 people raising a clamor, he said, and raising such a stink that it'll be heard in Washington.

Politicians are susceptible to clamors, Frost said, and cited representatives Burleson, Tower, and others included State Rep. Pogue, but Pritchard offered "No comment" in reply.

The Interstate project is to be completed in 1972, Pritchard said, and the segment from the Callahan County line to West of Cisco is in the planning stage but without financial backing yet. The remaining segment from West of Cisco to West of Ranger will come in the near future.

"We'll do anything to keep 9,000 cars coming through our town," Frost said.

Haun said "Don't lose sight of who you're going to. The rules would prohibit exits or entrances to the road, if it were kept running through Eastland. It would, in effect, divide the town—there would be part of the city on each side of the highway, with entrances and exits to the routes on either side of the city."

Frank Sayre, speaking for the chamber of commerce, in a committee of President Bill Semuels and Manager Lee Ellis, said that the chamber is vitally interested in anything

that affects the community, but that an agreement for participation would, of necessity, have to come from the board of directors.

Hallmark voiced the same opinion concerning the support by the Jaycees.

Mayor Frost said, at the time he did not have authority from the commission actually, but that if all joined in the fight together, we could be so "obnoxious", that we can be heard and we can move mountains.

Near the end of the session after all the guests had left, Mayor Frost asked the commissioners if the \$150 that the city contributes monthly to the chamber wasn't earmarked for industrial development, and if so, couldn't this be used in the fight to save the highway.

Commissioners were of the opinion that the money went into the general operating fund rather than the industrial fund. The City got a boost from Texas Electric Service Co., found itself nearer an oil producing project and laid plans for a park-beautification program during the commissioners meet Monday night.

Resume of business included:

Lot Dispute

Mrs. E. M. Threat of 1115 W. Main St. appeared before the commission concerning a city lot which she believed that she had owned and paid taxes on for 14 years.

She said that she has recently been informed that the lot, Lot 8 of Block 4, in the Thomas addition, was owned by either the city or someone else.

City Manager Jimmy Young showed that the lot has been rendered by one "Don Cranfield" since 1946.

Commissioners agreed to sell Mrs. Threat the lot for \$50 if it is found that the city owns it. She was instructed to talk with her attorney. She said she paid \$4 a piece for nine other adjoining lots at the sheriff's sale in 1956 and thought she owned Lot 8.

Highway 6

The commission signed a minute-order with the State Highway Dept. agreeing to provide right of way (which is already secured), and provide curb and gutter for .25 of a mile of highway on the entrance of Highway 6 into Eastland from the South.

Resident Engineer Buddy Haun explained that the state would provide the paving and maintenance for the project in which the city will build about 1,700 feet of curbing.

TESCO Gift

The commission readily accepted a proposal by Frank Sayre, Texas Electric Service Co. district manager, in which his company would pay a two per cent amount of gross sales, for street and alley rental.

Previously the company had paid two per cent on all sales with the exclusion of federal, state, municipal and industrial customers.

The agreement is retroactive to include 1961 and the city will receive \$4,160 for last year rather than \$3,499 which would be the amount figured with the exclusions.

Oil Business

Okay of tentative water-selling contract with Great Western Drilling Co. was given by commissioners, and they also approved a unitization plan for the secondary-recovery oil project at Lake Eastland.

The water-selling contract is yet to be officially negotiated but fine points have been agreed upon by the city and the company.

Under the contract the com-

pany will buy approximately 15,000 barrels of treated water a day from the city at 35 cents per 1,000.

Both have agreed to a series of checks to insure that the lake is not contaminated by saline water which might come from the re-opened oil field.

A rough draft of the unitization plan, which sets out the participants in the project, was okayed. The city owns 250 acres in the field and would be the biggest beneficiary should the water-flooding project prove successful.

The company representatives indicated that they are highly pleased with the type and content of the water being offered, and guessed that they would want treated water.

After quite a bit of of business visitors, commissioners got down to agenda business at 9 p.m. when Jack Germany proposed a city park-beautification program.

Pretting Park

The city fathers agreed to undertake a project of laying a sprinkler system at the park using material already available, including 5,000 feet of 2-inch pipe and 13 sprinkler heads. Water from the towers would be used and the project was estimated to cost about \$500 in labor and material.

"It would be nice," the mayor said, "for people who can't afford the high cost of water to water their own lawns, to go for picnics."

Commissioner Milton Pullen also suggested painting the lower rungs of the water towers to cover the "years of scribbles" now on them.

Manager Young was authorized to negotiate an agreement with seven home-owners outside the city who have requested a water meter.

Etc., Etc.

Commissioners agreed to buy an ad in the Eastland County Livestock Show maza catalogue, and renewed an agreement with the U.S. Corps of Engineers for the work on the Leon River.

Mike Collins appeared before the officials and requested a traffic study be made on Bassett St. near South Ward School, and volunteered cash cooperation by the Jaycees for assistance in erecting traffic control signs over the city.
