Court Concerned With Roads

At the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court of Eastland County on Monday, concern was expressed by some of the members of the Court regarding persons operating vehicles and equipment with metal wheels, tracks, lugs, spikes, etc., upon county roads.

It was pointed out that the operation of such vehicles or equipment causes damage to the roadway and in some instances there have been good county roads torn up to the point which necessitated much more costly repairs than just a grading to eliminate the bumps for other persons traveling upon the road.

It was also noted that the operation of a vehicle or equipment with metal wheels, tracks, lugs, spikes, etc., upon a county road is as much a violation of the State Law as if the act had occurred upon a paved highway, and the penalty for such violation is by a fine from \$1.00 to \$200.00.

The members of the Commissioners Court issued an appeal to persons having vehicles and equipment with metal wheels, tracks, lugs, spikes, etc., such as ditch diggers, bulldozers, plows, etc., to refrain from operating such vehicles or equipment upon the county roads and to move such vehicles or equipment by truck or trailer to help save the county roads and cut costly repairs in some instances.

Also, any person who observes the movement of such public road is requested to notify his or her County Commissioner or a law enforcement official.



While surveys show that tires are involved in less than one percent of all highway accidents", says Malcolm R. Lovell Jr., Chairman of the Tire Industry Safety Council "in more than half of those cases, the tires were bald or severely underinflated.'

Thirty-six states and the District of Columbia now require a minimum tread depth of 1/16 inch, while California has mandated a 1/32 inch minimum.

Another handy way to check tread depth is to give your tires the "penny test". Stick a penny into the tread groove of your tires. If the tread doesn't go past the top of Lincoln's head, the tire is worn down to the danger zone. The tires should be replaced.

If your tires don't pass the penny test you are greatly increasing the chance of having a serious accident, Lovell points

Tires with tread worn to the 1/16 level or less are up to 44 times more likely to suffer disablement than new tires, Lovell pointed out.

On wet roads, a tire with adequate tread depth will funnel the water through its grooves, leaving the rubber in contact with the road. A worn tire with shallow grooves is much more likely to skim over the film of water and send the vehicle into a skid in the phenomenon called "hydroplaning"



### **Candidate For** City Commission **Facts Revelant To Effective** Regulation Of Public Utilities

The core of utility regulation is that both consumers and investors get a fair break. Consumers are entitled to reasonable rates. The stockholders should have enough income to pay for efficient management, pay dividends, and attract capital in order to maintain good service.

Utility regulators need to have special experience and training in accounting, finance and economics, plus a working knowledge of the legal principals which apply. Bob Vaught offers all of these, plus a philosophy and temperament which will accord fair treatment to all segments of the public, in other words, both the consumer and the utility.

Since utilities have exclusive rights to render service essential to the well being of every citizen, and whose prices are not set by competition, their regulation in the total public interest is one of the most important functions of good government. Bob Vaught believes he can make a significant contribution to good government in this community because of his long experience and training in public utility matters

Experts who represent the utilities are well versed in devising means to assess involuntary capital contributions against ratepayers in the form of excessive rates. It is essential in keeping with Supreme Court decisions that consumers do not have to bear such charges. It takes a qualified expert to ferret out the hidden capital contributions which are often proposed in utility rate structures. Bob Vaught is a qualified expert in the field of utility regulation.

Utility customers are mainly captive since they cannot go elsewhere to buy utility services. Government is the logical agency to see that the little consumer is not exploited by the corporate giants. Bob Vaught advocates a strong State Utility Commission, and would expect such a commission to have the expertise to do a job commensurate with fair play.

We are beginning to see on our utility bills the "fuel adjustment clause". Although fuel adjustment clauses in rates create an illusion that they are fair and necessary, they are frequently used to deprive ratepayers of their right to a fair hearing while assuring stockholders of a high rate of return, even though the utility's management is less than efficient. It not fair to ratepayers when they pay returns to stockholders for assumption of business risks only to have such risks shifted back to the ratepayers through such contrivances as the "fuel adjustment clause". The unrestrained use of the fuel adjustment clause can work a hardship on consumers who have fixed incomes, especially

In the foregoing, Bob Vaught has given six reasons why he is a strong advocate of a State Utility Commission. It is his opinion that when your present City Commission sent letters to your State Senator and your State Representative opposing such a Commission, they pre - empted your right of due process since they had no knowledge of your views concerning this important matter.

I trust this discussion of the complicated subject of the effective regulation of public utility rates has been in-
