RONALD BAILEY, Soil Conservationist here, is also a history buff of the first water. He's turned up evidence that Capt. Eastland, for whom our county and city is named, actually visited here. It's from a Dallas County History, 1837 to 1887 by John Henry Brown.

'Forty - nine years ago, in the autumn of 1837, when all this country, known as North and Northwest Texas, was an unpeopled wilderness, excepting in its occupancy by roving tribes of hostile savages, a company of about fifty volunteers, under the command of Capt. William M. Eastland, left LaGrange, on the lower Colorado, on an expedition against the savages in the upper country, the commander being a soldier of San Jacinto, and the same Christian prisoner who drew a black bean in the lottery of life and was one of the seventeen martyrs shot unto death as malefactors, by the order of Santa Anna, at the hacienda of Salado, in the interior of Mexico, March 25, 1843. In due time this company reached the highlands, new in Eastland county, dividing the waters of Pecan Bayou, the Leon and the Clear Fork of the Brazos. There they divided into two parties - - the larger under Capt. Eastland, returning south on the Colorado slope of the country - - the other, consisting of twenty men, under Licuts Van Benthuysen and Miles, moved northeastwardly, crossed the Brazos near the mouth of the Clear Fork and struck the main or West Fork of the Trinity, in what is now Wise County. There, on the 10th of November, they were suddenly attacked by 150 Indians, but found refuge in a ravine, where they were besieged from forenoon to night, losing Licut

Representatives also ap-

proved extension of the 55 mph speed limit, but did not provide the necessary 100 votes to place it into immediate effect. The present limit, passed more than a year ago in conformity with federal energy-saving mandates, expires at the end of this month.

At issue is whether Texas again goes along with the federally-imposed limit and retains eligibility for allocation of \$303 million in federal highway funds this

year. Gov. Dolph Briscoe said he fears "there is a very definite possibility" the fine ceiling for speeds over-55 and up-to-70 (the old limit) may endanger federal funds for

the highways.
Briscoe said he would prefer a simple extension of the 55 mph speed bill as an energy saver, as well as a life saver and a highway aid saver.

However, the Governor stopped short of saying he would veto the fine bill, which provides for maximum penalties, including court costs, of \$25 without charge to a driver's violation record. Representatives hope to force the Senate to go along with the fine limitation by withholding 100 votes from the 55 mph bill until both measures are cleared by the upper chamber.

REGISTRATION PLAN PASSED

All Texas voters will have to re-register between October 1 and January 31 under a bill passed by the Senate last week.

The relatively non-controversial bill sets up a new computer - policed permanent voter registration system for the state.

Once all voters are signed up again, local registrars every two years would send out new certificates automatically. To help weed out ineligibles, the certificates will be mailed in nonforwardable er.velopes they will be returned if the voter has moved.

Up to 30 per cent on current voter rolls are believed to be ineligible, mainly by reason of having moved, according to Secretary of State Mark White Jr.

A computerized file will be maintained in the secre-tary of state's office to help prevent this situation from occurring again under the new law and local registrars will be compensated for removal of ineligible names as well as for addition of valid new voters to rolls.

#### READABILITY DESIRED

Governor Briscoe and Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie are backing legislation to make health and accident insurance policies "per-

fectly clear" to the insured. The bill would require presentation to each policy holder of a simplified explanation of its terms.

The bill, introduced by Rep. Ronald Coleman of El Paso, also seeks to establish minimum standards for health insurance coverage, including a basic level of compensation and uniform application from one policyholder to another.



## **PUBLIC NOTICE** OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.







EASTLAND MEMO:

In the late 1880's and 1890's, there was an intensity of bird killing for fashion and food. In the north mainly, but in other areas also, the plume hunters were busy the year round supplying the hat makers at the fashion centers. Whole, or parts of song birds were the "In" thing to wear on a hat. Milliners supplied guns and ammunition to the Indians in Maine to kill birds for them, while on the upper coast hotels, and restaurants offered bounties on birds. Great strings of dead birds adorned the front of restaurants advertising these gourmet foods. All along the migration route south, birds were killed. During one week in the spring of 1897, 2600 Robins were killed in North Carolina, and offered for sale from a market stall in Washington, D.C. Milliners paid to a top of \$12.00 for a "12 piece bird". Such stories were read, or heard across the U.S. while the locale could be any state.

It was publicized that the auk was extinct from these killings, and the Golden Plover with other species were getting scarce. Five million birds were estimated to have been killed annually, although we will leave some flexibility in this report. One determined person counted women's hats on the street in downtown Manhattan, and 542 out of 700 hats were wearing all, or parts of song birds representing 40 different specie. Added to this there was a fad of collecting bird eggs, and one fellow collected 917. So between killing birds, and egg collecting, the bird population slowed somewhat.

The preceding along with countless similar incidents were the sparks that set aglow the movement to protect birds, and animals. The pioneers of the Audubon movement were diligent along with other like - minded groups, attempting to have laws passed to protect wildlife. This development led to our present day system of game wardens, and hunting seasons. It is interesting to know something of what motivated the c citizens to initiate wild life conservation. It is hard to imagine anyone today slaughtering birds as they did then, or even hunting them, to adorn women's hats of fashion. The idea of eating song birds would not have too much appeal today I am sure, although we do enjoy Dove, Quail, and other game birds on a seasonal basis. As with the foregoing, we will examine other conditions, and developments that were prevalent in the early days of bird conservation in future articles.

On a trip a few days ago to San Angelo, Sonora, and back home, we saw a multitude of Loggerhead Shrikes and great Red Shouldered Hawks along with plenty of Meadowlarks, Pigeons and Sparrow Hawks in concert with hundreds of various Blackbirds were much in evidencer around freshly plowed fields. A prairiedog colony was as busy as a bee hive about 20 nuies south of Fort McKavett toward Sonora on Ranch Road 864. They were chirping while bobbing in and out of their mounds on both sides of the highway. Rattlesnake hunters were in bloom, and all of the creeks were running. You may wish to enjoy a trip to see the impressive old fort when time permits.



## **Benefits Paid To County Veterans**

Monetary benefits paid to Eastland County veterans and dependents in February totaled \$180,000, according to James Wright, County Service Officer.

During this particular time each year, many veterans and their dependents and survivors are uncertain as to whether their Veterans Administration benefit payments are subject to the income tax laws. According to James T. Wright, Veterans Service Officer for Eastland County, the following information should help each person in filing an income tax return for 1974.

In general, veterans benefits are exempt from Federal income tax, and need not be reported as income. This income tax exemption applies to dividends and proceeds from government life insurance policies, but Federal estate tax does apply in certain instances to proceeds received in settlement of such policies following death of the insured. Also, interest earned on government life insurance dividends left on

deposit or credit with the Veterans Administration is considered income and must be reported on Federal income tax returns.

Among major tax exempt Veterans Administration benefits are disability and death compensation and pension. Also exempt are all educational assistance benefits paid to eligible veterans, their dependents and their survivors. All such amounts, since they are not subject to tax, should not be reported as income when filing a tax return. The income tax exemption also applies to any amounts which are paid to service disabled veterans for specially adapted homes and VA grants for automobiles. Eligible for these special grants are veterans who, because of their military service, have suffered loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, or blindness. In addition, the VA is authorized to pay an annual clothing allowance to veterans whose service incurred disabilities require them to use wheel chairs, artificial limbs or braces,
