





sought to buy rights for a canal across the isthmus, but Columbia turned us down. So in 1902, Panama revolted from Columbia and our warships kept Columbian troops from landing in Panama. Thus Panama's independence was obtained with the help of the American Navy while Theordore Roosevelt was President.

Then in 1903, we signed a treaty with Panama by which we obtained rights in perpetuity to a 10-mile wide strip of land across the 50-mile wide isthmus, and we built the Panama Canal from 1964 keep this waterway open. to 1914. Panama reserved what is called titular sovereignty.




