Dr. Peeples EHS Homecoming Speaker

Noted pastor and educator Dr. C.E. Peeples will be principal speaker at the Eastland High School Homecoming religious services Sunday morning, June 22.

Dr. Peeples attended Eastland High School two years, playing on the basketball team and representing the school at the District track meet in Abilene in shot put and discus.

He graduated from Clarendon College, where he played on an undefeated football team and won the outstanding debate award.

He received his Bachelors, Masters, and Bachelor of Divinity Degrees from Southern Methodist University. While there he coached debate and taught government. He also did graduate work at Columbia University and the University of Texas.

He was coach one year at Tahoka High School, coach and high school principal one year at Texline, and superintendent of schools one year at Texline. He served four years as a minister in East Texas and then for 38 years was president of Lon Morris College. During his administration an entirely new plant was built, eleven major buildings and twelve brick homes for teachers. The endowment grew to \$1,700,000.

Dr. Peeples has been president of the Texas Methodist College Presidents' Association, the National Methodist Junior College Association, the Texas Junior College Association, and the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce. He is a member of the Jacksonville Rotary Club.

He is a permanent member of the Lon Morris College Board of Trustees and chairman of the Endowment Committee.

Dr. Peeples married the former Miss Gladys Labenski of Dallas. They have two daughters Mrs. Nelda Darrell of Owensboro, Kentucky, and Mrs. Vernon Weddle Jr., of Los Angeles, California.

Additional plans for the Sunday service will be announced in the future. Mrs. Varge Daniel and Attorney Bill Hart are in charge of this committee.

BICENTENNIAL NEWS

Timely comments on the rider of 1775 are in order. PAUL REVERE was the son of Apollos Rivoire, a French refugee, fleeing because of religious persecution. Louis XIV died the year the Rivoires left Hugon not France. He was born January 1735 - - the first day of the year and was baptized PAUL REVERE.

Paul got a sufficient education at school in the shop and around the wharfs of Boston. He earned money as a bell ringer at Christ's Church and in later life made the famous Paul Revere church bells, some of which still ring in New England belfries. In the silversmith's shop he worked skillfully.

On the eighteenth of February, 1756, Gov. Shirley addressed the young artison as !gentleman! and gave him his commission as 2nd Lt., in the artillery train. The unit saw service against Crown Point. That spring he was a part of the long, struggling line of horses and men - - fighting against the French.

Paul married Sary Orne. He joined the Masons and there met James Otis, Joseph Warren and others so important in the early days of the Revolution army excitement. The important meeting with Sam Adams and John Hancock has been portrayed recently in the Johnny Tremain TV series. By now Paul was a master silversmith 22 years old.

The famous ride which Longfellow immortalized tells the story of 'Twas the 18th of April, seventy five' when he rode to alarm the already forewarned minutemen- of Middlesex County. Some details in the poem are not true- - but the fact that he was able to escape his captors near Lexington and warn John Hancock to flee from his hideaway (for one of the main reasons of the British trip to Lexington was to capture Hancock and Adams.)

And on the 19th of April the first battle was fought at Lexington Green and late at Concord at the old North Bridge. The statue of the Minuteman, by Daniel Chester French, stands guard today - - a replica in stone of the Capt. Isaac Davis who commanded the Action militia and who was killed at the Bridge. The TV and the magazines and the newspapers will carry the details of the great celebration of this weekend.

Sewer Plant In 30 **Days Of Completion**

Eastland's new sewer plant will be completed in about 30 days members of the Eastland Lions Club learned Tuesday in a program that took them to the site southeast of town for an

inspection. Wilburt Simmel was program chairman and introduced City Manager Lewis Tiner who gave verbal rundown on the project, at the Ramada Inn meeting site before departing for the site.

Vice President Ray Pryor presided in the absence of President Otis Coleman and business included the final election of officers for the coming year.

Work at the site is about a week behind schedule due to bad weather, but the contractors lack only minor cleanup, the erection of a chain link fence and other minor work before the system is turned on. The project was started in 1969 and Eastlanders voted in September of 1971 to issue \$92,000 in bonds as the then 45% part of constructing the then projected \$198,000 project. Delays came which were both helpful and costly. The government participation increased to 75% but building costs rose, so the finished project will run some \$350,000. Bids were opened in April of 1974 and the government rejected the low bidder on a technicality, so the second-low

bidder took the job. 'And we're going to be putting this into operation just at the right time", Manager Tiner said, "because the requirements from the Water Quality Board and the Environmental Protection Agency grow more rigid each day.

The city has been paying some \$1,100 a month for the past 18 months on the bond debt, and has only eight years to go, so the payments have been made even during the paper work and construction

Flags a major item too. The Board canvassed the recent election and declared John Morren re-elected to Place Four and John Nevill elected to Place Five.

All trustees were present except Nevill who was out of town and Jim Wright. In the organization meeting Monday, James Reid was re-elected president; Morren, vice president; and Wright, secretary.



The Jubilee is a combination of the former Cisco Folk Life Festival and the Cisco Junior College Ranch Week, and it is designed as a kick-off for Bicentennial activities for the Big Country

Although the Jubilee doesn't officially get underway until Thursday, April 17, the stu-dents of CJC will get a head start by holding a weiner roast, tug-of-war, and street dance on Wednesday evening, the 16th. The campus activities will get underway at 6:30 p.m. and last until midnight.

Thursday, the official Ranch Day at CJC will begin bright and early with a 7:30 chuck wagon breakfast--cooked and served outdoors. Various kinds


As medical doctors, we are unequivocally opposed to, including eight million so called unemployed workers and their families, under a temporary program of Medicare. Temporary is never temporary under any government program. Cost has been estimated as \$1.5 billion dollars a year. Unfortunately, this is the same amount that was projected as the cost of Medicare itself originally, which has proven to be grossly underestimated.

It is time to face a few facts in the United States, though there is considerable unemployment. most unemployment is due to the fact that people do not want to work. Many of them refuse to take jobs that would be of a slightly lower caste status than their previous jobs. Also the various unemployment programs which are endlessly extended, food stamp programs, and the special union organized programs for supporting workers on strike have made it easier to work at not

This program was originally to be financed by a 1% tax on all group insurance premiums. Since that time, the estimate has been raised to an 8% tax on all group insurance programs. This 8% tax would increase hospital cost the same amount. would eventually be paid by the workers themselves as an increased cost. And, in addition, would add an almost impossible burden to the already overworked Medicare

It is time, as politicians that you realize the total physical irresponsibility of such a program and vote and campaign against it if you have any political morals whatsoever.

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

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Do You Remember

As the children grew to adulthood in the early days of the century, there existed a spirit of competition. From the youngest pupil to the oldest, the individual loved to think of himself or herself as excelling in some form of competition. They liked to think of themselves as being better than any other in something.

The teachers recognized this in the small community schools and organized the activities of the school to provide competition in such a way as to permit the development in gifted skills of the students. One arrangement called for a contest in spelling. This was called a "Spelling Bee". Each Friday afternoon, a class would compete with each other in spelling until a champion speller emerged from each class.

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
