

# Man Found Hanged In Jail; Be Buried Tuesday Afternoon

Gene Kelly, 57-year-old Ranger postal employee, was hanged himself in the Eastland County Jail a week after his arrest on charges of an offense against his 22-month-old step-granddaughter, will be buried in Ranger Tuesday afternoon.

Funeral services will be held at 4 p.m. at Killingsworth Chapel in that city, followed by burial in Ranger's Evergreen Cemetery.

The Rev. Calvin Bailey, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, and the Rev. Ralph Perkins pastor of the First Baptist Church, will officiate.

Pallbearers will be L. D. Sharp, Fred Matthews, J. D. Nichols, Tom Williams, Lee Cantrell and Fred Moseley, all of Ranger.

Kelly was born Dec. 8, 1897, at Webb City, Mo. He was a veteran of both World War I and World War II and a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion, in Ranger. He formerly was employed by the Lone Star Gas Company, Sun Electric and D. O. Moffett Electric Company and more recently transported the mail from the depot to the postoffice.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Oleta Thompson, whom he married July 21, 1945; two sons, Eugene V. Kelly and Charles Fred Kelly, Houston; two daughters, Mrs. Lillian Stallings and Mrs. Lillie Pearl Monds, both of Houston; his mother, Mrs. Tillie L. Kelly, Houston; a brother, Denzel Kelly, McKinney; two sisters, Mrs. Nell Wilbrooks, Houston, and Mrs. Ruby Brooks, Santa Barbara, and 14 grandchildren.

Sheriff J. B. Williams said that divorce proceedings papers were served on Kelly Saturday. The prisoner's only company came by to see him Saturday — a minister, who talked to him for some time.

At 6 a.m. Sunday Jailer Allen Jones was alerted by a signal-tap on the jail floor, by another prisoner, Travis Everett. From Everett, he learned that Kelly had been found hanging, in the cell-block they occupied.

According to Sheriff Williams, Kelly, who was being held on charge of assault with intent to rape his little step-granddaughter, had fashioned a wire noose out of a coat hanger, hooked it onto a rod in the wall and stepped off a bunk, after applying the noose.

Justice of the Peace Jim Bogus said the verdict would be suicide. He stated that Kelly also had slashed his wrists with a safety razor blade but that strangulation from the wire had caused death.

He stated that Kelly left two notes, one directing disposition of his body, the other to his wife, in which he complained of "lies" and the divorce proceedings; also that his wife had not visited him.

Kelly had told authorities he was innocent of the offense charged. Officers said that Mrs. Kelly told them the attempted attack took place in a back room of their home while she and the victim's mother watched television in the front part of the residence and the authorities said that over a period of years he had paid fines for excessive drinking. An examining doctor said the little girl had been bruised considerably.

## Observers 9 Places In County

Organization of 9 ground observer posts in Eastland county during the very near future was announced today by County Judge John Hart, following a conference with Air Force representatives.

Describing the establishment of the posts as "A vital step forward toward building an effective air defense," M-Sgt. Charles A. Richey said that posts will be located in the following towns within the county: Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, Morton Valley, Carbon, Desdemona, Gorman, Rising Star and Pioneer.

He indicates that these observer posts will go into operation immediately as full-fledged Ground Observer Corps units as soon as volunteers are available.

M-Sgt. Richey went on to say that workers should come from the local area in order to be reasonably close to one of the posts, and urged that citizens wishing to volunteer get in touch immediately with Judge Hart at telephone 162, Eastland.

In making the plea, M-Sgt. Richey pointed out that no previous special training is required. "A Ground Observer Corpsman must be able to see, hear, and speak distinctly," he stated.

Observers report their observations to the filter center, which in turn tracks the aircraft on a large vertical map of the area, and relays the information to a unit of the Air Force Air Defense Command.

The Air Defense Command is responsible for providing fighter-interceptor planes in answer to warnings sounded by radar installations and members of the Ground Observer Corps.

Last rites for Joe Dale Strother, 11-year-old drowning victim, were held Saturday afternoon at the Church of Christ in Cisco with David Darnell, minister, in charge.

Burial followed in the Oakwood Cemetery.

Joe Dale and his 9-year-old brother, Macon, were visiting an uncle, S. V. Stephenson, employed on the Stephens Ranch near Abilene. They were wading in the tank when the younger boy slipped into the deep water. Joe Dale rescued his brother and then slipped into the deep water himself and disappeared.

Macon ran several hundred yards to the Stephenson home. Mr. Stephenson and son, Tommy, were unable to locate Joe Dale's body, so they called Abilene police. The fire department, highway patrol and sheriff's departments of Taylor and Callahan Counties rushed men to the scene, and the body was recovered.

Joe Dale is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Strother of Abilene; three brothers, Macon, Anthony Wayne and Michael Ray; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Strother of Cisco and his maternal grandfather, A. Holby of Houston.

## Moisture Received Is Vital

It's smile time for Eastland County farmers, following receipt of rainfall ranging from 2.70 inches at some points in the western part of the county down to half inch in the eastern part.

Farmers said the moisture came just in time. Sunshine and hot winds had begun to affect growing crops somewhat and had burned up most gardens. However, the good rains Sunday night and Monday morning restored farm crops to a prosperous appearance, since there already was deep moisture from torrential rainfall of the springtime.

The rain was of varying nature. In Eastland it ranged from about 2 inches in the eastern part of town to 2.70, farther west.

The peanut crop, the big producer in the county, got a fine break — so did cotton, such feeds as maize, sudan and cane, and the pastures were brightened a lot. The rainfall was extremely helpful to the comparatively small acreage of alfalfa in the county.

Eastland County agriculture's outlook this season is quite bright, in the wake of the plentiful rains. Leon Lake's gain reportedly was small. At the Leon Plant of the Texas Electric Service Company it was learned from Plant Superintendent, Jim Kuykendall that the lake there had been about a foot low and water thus did not go through the gates until near mid-day Monday.

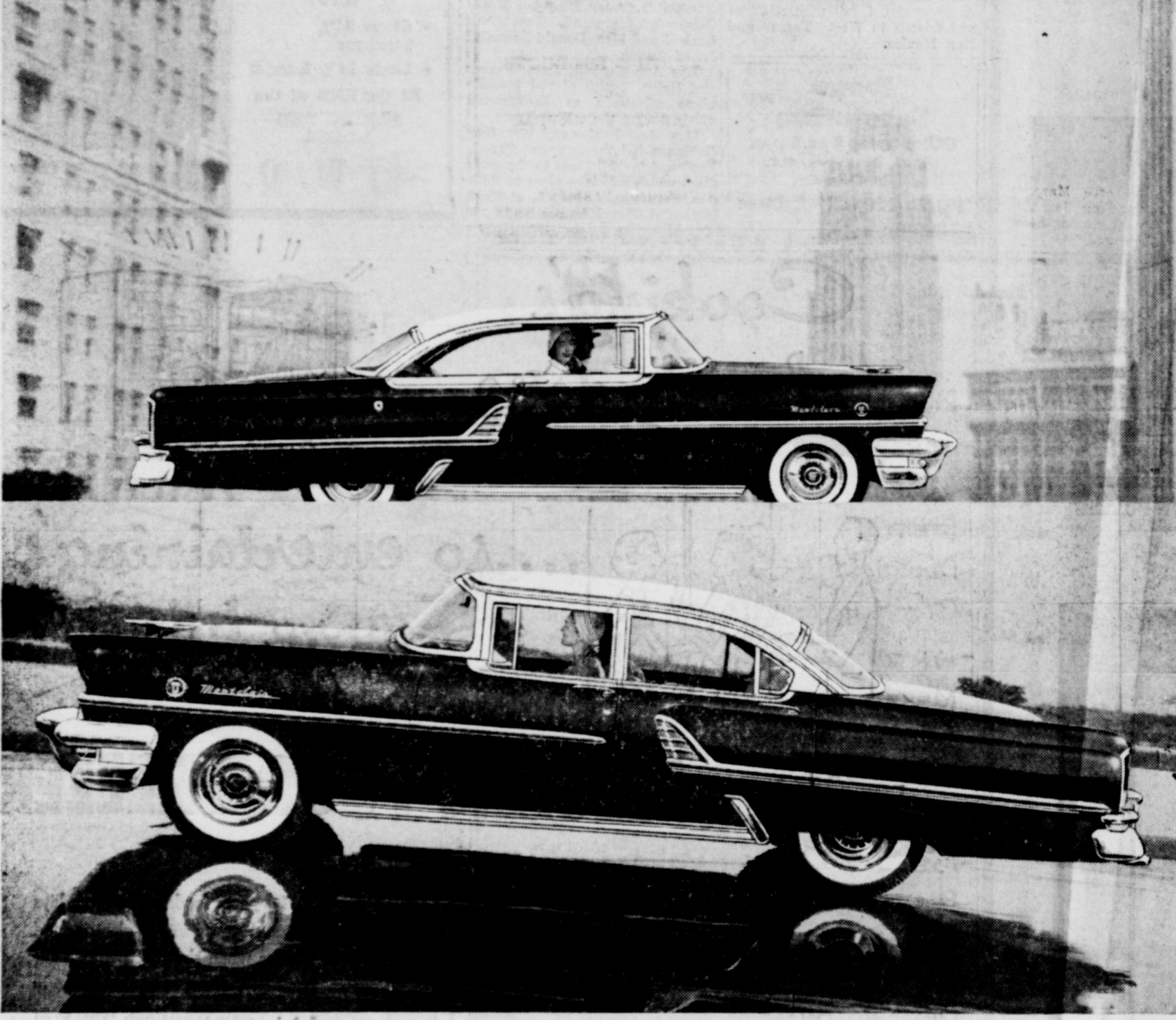

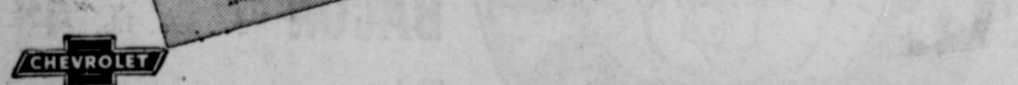

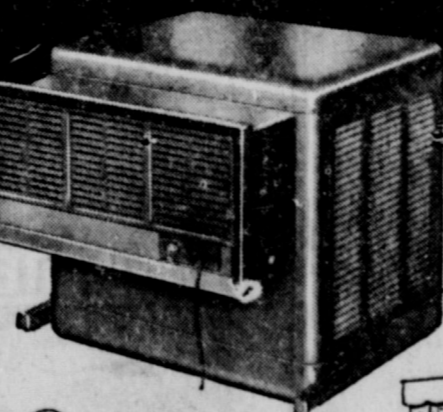

### Highway Patrol Has Convenient County Schedule

For the convenience of auto owners and motorists in this area, the Texas State Highway Patrol has a convenient schedule for its driver's tests over Eastland County.

State Highway Patrolman M. A. Peterson of Eastland is in Ranger, Eastland or Cisco on Saturdays, and in Cisco on the first,

third and fifth Thursday of each month. Written tests are given in Ranger each Friday at 8:30 a.m. and 1 p.m., Patrolman Peterson said. The same hours—8:30 a.m. and 1 p.m.—are also scheduled at Cisco. The written tests at Eastland are given at 8 a.m.

Patrolman Peterson advises drivers applying for renewal of their licenses to send in their applications accompanied by a money order. Or, he said, they may appear at the driver's license offices on the scheduled dates in Ranger, Eastland or Cisco and remittances will be accepted and mailed for the applications.

He strongly advised the latter method. In some cases, applications for renewals are not mailed, allowing sufficient time to be returned before expiration.

However, if the driver appears at one of the local offices, he is given a receipt for payment which is as effective as the new license.

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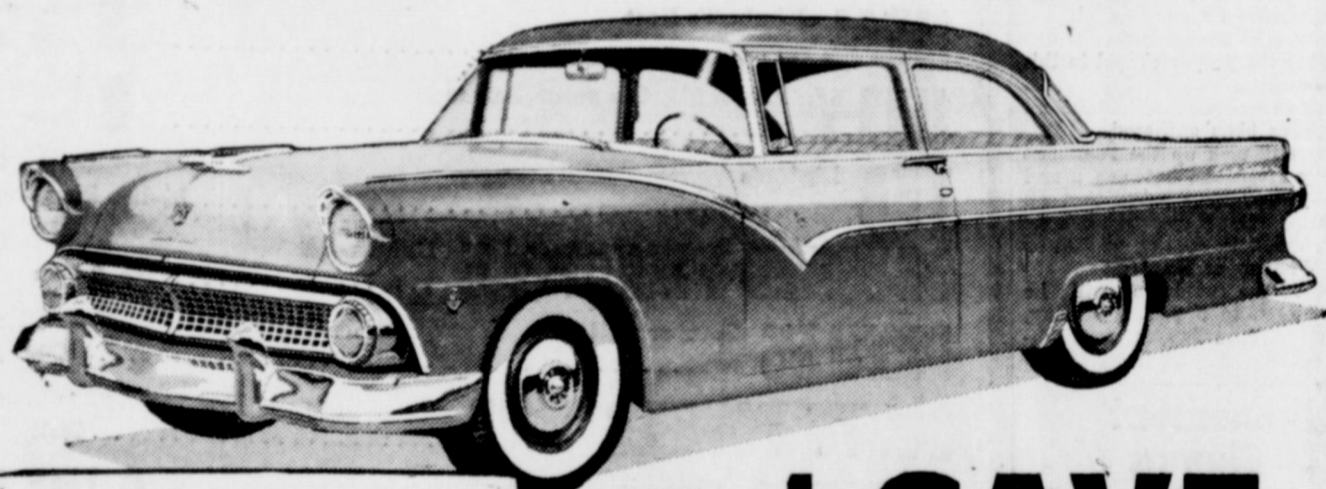
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
