Countians To Receive Reduced Insurance Bills

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells Tuesday announced realignment of seven counties in his 22nd senatorial district that could reduce home owners insurance bills.

These counties are not frequented by as many tornadoes or subject to fierce winds and hail as the other sections of the plains and Panhandle. Creighton said.

State insurance board chairman Joe Christie has reclassified the counties of Montague. Jack, Young, Wise, Eastland, Brown and Stephens from the state insurance board's northnorthwest territory into the board's central rating territory. Creighton explained.


Residents of these counties will be given the opportunity to purchase insurance at the lower

EASTLAND COUNTY may be included in the newest deal in coyote control measures, according to reports reaching us. This plan employs a helicopter to fly over pasture lands while spotters locate and shoot coyotes with rifles.

The helicopter plan works better than the poison program used several years ago, we're told. It is now being used in area counties and, we understand, efforts are being made to obtain the program for our county. It is a federal program that costs very little to the area's benefiting.



The trumpeters of spring have issued their annual pronouncements, although the breath of northers have since been loosed upon us. This first reveille gave no inkling of the freezing temperatures accompanying it.

A ruby throated Hummingbird partook of a probable first meal from our test feeder on Palm Sunday, March 23rd, and he has been a constant, busy guest during the cold spells. When not eating he is at his sentry post on a branch above the feeder, guarding his food supply from some encroachment, which to me has not been apparent. Since his debut, the Hummingbird population has grown to a few pair, and more feeders have been hung in the yard. If you have feeders for them, your guests are waiting.

On Easter Day while walking at the eastern boundary of Eastland, a Scissortail surprised me, darting from right to left, perching on a nearby tree. What a welcome and beautiful sight on a festive day. This was a single sighting, with his mate not in evidence. We should have the familiar sound of these graceful fly catchers soon, added to our spring accessories. We have had reports of other Scissortail sightings in the area.

During these last few days we have noticed also the vague new growth on the mesquites, and that should settle the "spring" question, although the temperature is not cooperating. The new leaf growth, much of it pale green, makes the small migrating birds difficult to detect at present, while at the same time, the newly arrived Brewer's Blackbirds and Grackles are very much evident in increasingly raucous groups, congregating in our yard.

All of this simply stated means another rewarding spring season is here, for all it can mean to us. The birds, flowers and budding nature around us makes the time much richer and enjoyable.

The lamb market across the country reflected continued packer difficulty in obtaining adequate numbers.

Mohair market has streng. thened again with some adult mohair selling to \$1.65 a pound. In Texas the market was reported 50 cents to \$1 higher on both slaughter and feeder lambs

The sheep and goat raisers. and to some extent the cattlemen in losses of young calves. continue their running battle with the predatory animals. A Texas A&M University report shows that the estimated annual losses caused by the covote to the sheep and goat industries are \$1.834.617 and \$427.000 respectively. The study notes that the timer wolf and Texas red wolf have declined sharply but that coyotes have actually expanded both their numbers and their range in recent years. The covote evidently has been able to adapt to co-existence with man through an ecological

or evolutionary process. A coyote helicopter round-up is being considered in Eastland County after a program has reported success in neighboring counties. For instance, 185 coyotes were killed in 42 hours in Callahan County, and 200 covotes and one bob cat in Stephens County in five days. Eastland County livestock raisers are interested in the federally-funded project.





"Most tornadoes occur during April, May and June during the late after noon although they can occur at any time of the year or any time during the day," points out Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

South and between the Rockies

With a total of 944 reported tornadoes in the United States last year and 361 resulting deaths, 1974 was the worst year for tornadoes since 1925," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist. Although the average annual number of tornadoes reported has quadrupled in the past three decades, the number of tornado fatalities has been decreasing. This is probably due to better methods of sighting tornadoes, warning systems and advance preparation for tornadoes, notes Keese.

Tornadoes usually travel southwest to northeast and stay on the ground about 10 minutes. Their forward speed is about 30 miles per hour but wind speeds in the funnel of the tornado get up to 300 miles per hour.

Because tornadoes are so ratic, it's hard to tell

sudden air pressure changes. "Stay away from windows and buildings such as gymnasiums and auditoriums with wide free - span roofs. If you live in a mobile home, move to

a shelter area. If you are caught in open country, move away from the tornado at a right angle to its path or lie flat in a ditch or ravine," he adds. "Do not stay in your car if you cannot safely evade the tornado by driving away from it or at

right angles to its path." If you sight a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law enforcement officer, but do not tie up the phone with unnecessary calls.

"After a tornado, alway wear thick - soled shoes and gloves in cleanup work and watch for broken gas pipes and downed electrical wires," warns Keese. "Don't light matches or smoke in or near a building that has been hit be a tornado until you are sure there are no gas leaks.

"Furthermore, stay away from disaster areas unless you're helping with rescue and cleanup operations.

The National Weather Service issues a "tronado watch" when atmospheric conditions are favorable for tornadoes. A "tornado warning" is issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar.

"If a tornado watch is announced, stay tuned to a radio or television for weather advisories. A tornado warning demands action, so you should quickly move to a basement. cellar or civil defense shelter.' advises Keese. "Keep a battery - powered radio handy in case power is lost.

If your home doesn't have a basement or cellar, go to the lowest level in the center of the home or get in a closet or small
