Bakker, Siebert Top 2; 3rd Slot In 2-Way Tie

O'Brien Withdraws In Favor Of Verner

Composition of the Eastland City Commission remained virtually unchanged, except for the welcome addition of Attorney Mike Siebert, as the result of voting at City Hall Tuesday.

Eight candidates sought election to the three places to be filled.

Incumbent Dale Bakker - polled 348 votes for re-election, and Newcomer Siebert got 283.

Incumbents Mayor W.Q. Verner and Commissioner H.V. O'Brien tied with 266 each for the third slot, in what has been called a most unusual situation. The City Charter calls for a drawing of lots in such cases.

However Commissioner O'Brien who has served two terms, has withdrawn in favor of Mayor Verner.

Other candidates and their votes are Delbert Biggs, 89; Pat Shooks, 104; Bob Vaught, 219; and Bil Morehead, 47.

2 Officials Honored On Retirement

Two public officials were publicly honored Monday as they officially entered the retirement years of their lives after long and faithful service in their respective offices.

Up at Eastland High School, school trustees, past and present, school officials and the press gathered to honor Mrs. Frank (Nell) Hightower, who has retired as Eastland School Tax Collector after 20 years.

Shortly thereafter, the "court house crowd" gathered at the County Auditor's Office to wish Retiring Auditor C.H. (Harl) O'Brien well as he begins retirement after some 27 years as a county official.

Mrs. Bill (Nancy) Pryor has been named to replace Mrs. Hightower as school tax collector.

Judge Earl Conner Jr., has appointed Emma Morris, an employee in the county auditor's office, to succeed O'Brien in the county post.

Mrs. Hightower was presented an engraved plaque and a check by the school in appreciation for her years of service. Coffee and cake were served to some 25 people who surprised Mrs. Hightower at the high school office.

Judge Conner of 91st District Court presided in honoring Mr. O'Brien and he was presented and inscribed pen and pencil set. A certificate of appreciation was presented to O'Brien by Judge Conner and Commissioners Court Judge Scott Bailey.

Mr. O'Brien said in part in his letter of resignation, and read by Judge Conner:

"Words cannot express my very deep appreciation to you and to the people of Eastland County who have helped me in so many ways during the years. I deem it an honor to have had the privilege of serving the people of our county and to count you as my friends.

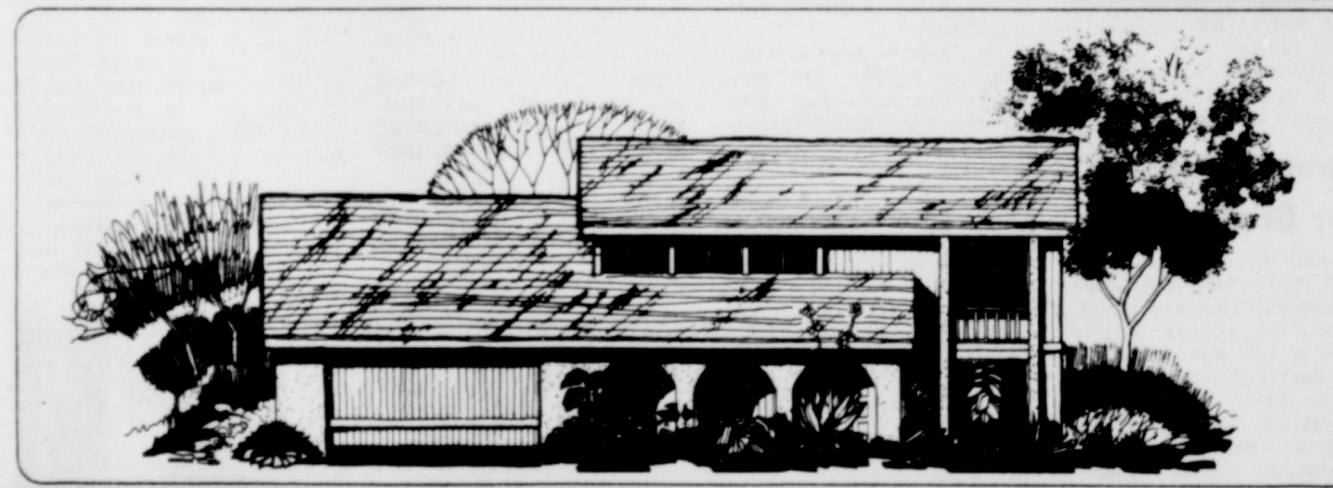

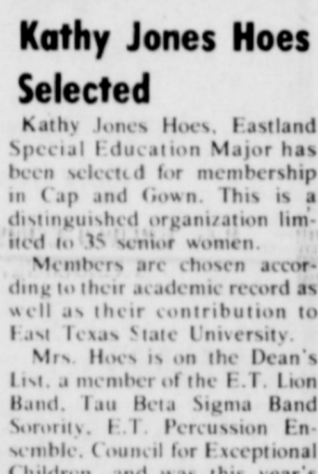

Cable And Channel IF --
"The FCC And What You See"

The purpose of this article is to inform the people in the communities we serve about the latest rules and regulations concerning TV cable. I realize that there are far more exciting subjects than CATV, but when laws and rules are made on something that is brought into your living room, you at least need to be aware of it.

The Federal Communications Commission is, by definition, a regulatory body. Its purpose is to regulate certain areas of communication, and in the past has done a fine job. The primary purpose of this body of men has been to regulate various technical aspects of the communications field such as issuing frequencies for radio and television stations in an attempt to prevent interfering signals in any given area.

But, as is true of most governmental bodies today, the FCC, in my opinion, has overstepped their boundaries.

For example, the FCC has recently created a sports blackout rule which states that if any town is within 75 miles of the "home town" of a professional team and that team is playing at home, then no cable system within the afore mentioned 75 mile radius can import a distant sporting event of the same nature. You may not think that this will affect us and it probably won't immediately. However, suppose that Abilene gets a minor league baseball team. Then on the days they played in Abilene we, as a cable operator, would have to black out the Houston Astros on channel 11 and - or the Texas Rangers on another station. Remember, I'm not talking about the same time, same hour, I'm talking about the same day, regardless of when the games were played.

And while this rule may not affect us a great deal it will have a tremendous impact on thousands of towns across the United States and will in fact cripple the cable industry to some extent.

Certainly a letter from interested parties to the FCC would help give this august body the public reaction to their action.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—"Twenty-five inch color TV console—\$249 for one week only!" Such a bargain might catch the eye of anyone in the market for a television set.

But a tempting value offered at a price almost too good to be true could turn out to be the "bait" that gets you into a store where a salesman will try to "switch" your attention to another, more expensive model or brand.

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division lawyers point out that "bait and switch" advertising has been against the law for almost two years. It was made illegal by the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act.

Even so, reports of such misleading and deceptive sales practices occasionally crop up. Our attorneys say any number of reasons may be given a consumer for not selling him a product as advertised.

A salesman may say that the store is sold out of the item, that it doesn't come with a guarantee, that parts are hard to replace, or that it is generally inferior or defective. And there's always a "more desirable" product close by for him to show you in comparison. Of course, it costs "a bit" more, too!

The best method of dealing with stores that use such tactics is simply *not* to deal with them, our lawyers advise. But remember, if you ask the salesman for a candid opinion

about the merits of the advertised product as compared to others, he may honestly tell you that he thinks another item is a better buy. There's nothing illegal about this.

If you are convinced that you want the advertised item and the salesman persistently tries to dissuade you, however, you should complain to the manager. There's a chance he may not be aware such tactics are being used.

Our Consumer Protection attorneys suggest that you *always* shop around at several stores before making a major buying decision. And, when you shop, compare not only prices, but the various features and guarantees that come with the product. Check into the store's reputation for satisfying its customers, too. If you adhere to this rule, it's likely that you will avoid falling for a "bait and switch" ploy and that you will get a product that fits your needs and your pocket-book.

If you feel a store has unfairly advertised an item it has no intention of selling, in addition to complaining to the manager, you may also want to advise the newspaper, magazine, radio or television station that carried the ad.

And if you have questions about fraudulent "bait and switch" tactics, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, your county or district attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.

If someone in your family dies, check with social security. Monthly checks may be payable.

Do You Remember

As was customary in those days, when cotton picking season arrived, the whole family including the girls and mother were given a dungaree material sack to which was attached a strap made from the same material that was placed over one shoulder for pulling the sack along the rows of cotton. This left both hands free for picking the cotton and placing it into the bag. When the bag was full or too heavy to drag, they went to the cotton wagon to be "weighed out" and the cotton emptied from the sack into the wagon. When the weight of cotton equalled a bale, the father hitched up a team of horses or mules and carried the cotton away to a cotton gin to be ginned and placed in a bale. The farmer usually kept enough cotton seed for feeding his cows and goats the coming winter season. The bale of cotton was sold to a cotton buyer who was always around the gin to buy the cotton for the company he represented.

This was the time of year and with the sale of the cotton crop, the father could buy shoes and clothing for the kids going to school in addition to the family Sunday clothing which would be suitable for going to Sunday School and Church on Sundays. The clothing for the girls was generally hand made by the mother and older girls who had learned to use the sewing machine. The boys shirts and underclothing were also made by the women folk. Even their stockings and sweaters were knitted by the mother as she sat enjoying the warmth of the fire in the fireplace while the winter storm howled on the outside. The dulcet sound of the crackling of the fire in the fireplace and the cooing of the baby in his crib, made life here a contentment in the complete fulfillment as she knitted away on the youngest boys new multi-colored sweater.

drown proofing method.



"Drownproofing" could save your life, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department water safety officials.

Developed by Georgia Tech, drownproofing is a technique of staying afloat and conserving energy.

According to a leaflet from the department describing the technique, 60 volunteers at Georgia Tech tried the method for as long as eight hours without stopping. Twenty had their hands tied behind their backs and 20 more had their legs tied in a half-bend position to make them useless.

The average quitting time was four hours and 40 minutes in the water, and many made it the entire eight hours of testing.

The key, according to officials is to avoid trying to support your head out of water. The average human head weighs around 15 pounds, and trying to keep it high and dry will tire out the strongest outdoorsman.

"The basic ingredient", according to the department leaflet, "is calm, silent, slow motion. Especially lazy people have an advantage here, since they have been practicing slow motion most of their lives, but anyone can learn. The object is to use as little energy as possible and to waste no energy."

"Holding your 15 pound head above water, for instance, is unnecessary except for a few seconds every minute you need to take a breath."

Coast Guardsmen in basic training are taught this method:

(1) With lungs full, float face-down with the back of the

neck just breaking the surface of the water. In fresh water, you may not break the surface much, but in salt water the body has more buoyancy and will float higher. Your full lungs will provide more than enough flotation, even for a natural "sinker". The above position is basically the "jelly-fish float" taught to youngsters. Arms and legs should hang freely, exerting no energy.

(2) Prepare for a downward thrust, using the arms or legs, a combination of one arm and one leg or all four limbs. Many people prepare for a variation of the breast stroke here, which is good if comfortable. Your legs should slowly move apart, preparing for either a scissors kick or a "froglegs" kick. At the same time, raise the arms forward or to the sides, whichever suits you. They will be used to thrust downward, similar to treading water, horizontally.

In both motions, move s-l-o-w-l-y! If it helps, pretend that a shark is near that will attack anything that moves. Some drownproofers find they can use natural wave action to help move the arms. Remember the object is using the least amount of energy. The movements should take 15-20 seconds.

(3) Exhale through the nose while lifting your head. At the same time, (4) slowly thrust your arms downward or horizontally and bring your legs together.

Not much movement is needed to raise the mouth above the water. Don't try to

raise the shoulders or neck above the water. Some can even keep the chin in the water and still get a mouthful of air, but this can also get you a mouthful of waves.

Be sure to exhale in the water, on the way up. If you exhale too soon, you lose the buoyancy of your lungs. If you exhale too late, you waste precious energy in keeping your heavy, 15 pound head above water.

Here, obviously, you take your breath of fresh air. If you are in rough water, you may benefit from timing your cycles to use your natural rising and falling with the waves.

(5) With lungs full, play dead. Face the bottom of the lake or pool, drop your arms to your sides and let your limbs hang lifelessly. Think shark. Depending on your natural buoyancy and the buoyancy from your lungs, you may take several seconds to bob back to the surface. Some people must make a second downward thrust (or extend the first) to keep from sinking too deeply. Use whatever method is best for your body and will conserve energy.

The last step (6) is to relax. With head, arms and legs dangling, hold your breath as long as it is comfortable. It is natural for pressure to build up in the lungs while holding your breath. If you feel this happening, exhale a few bubbles through the nose. After from three to 10 seconds, start the cycle over.

Each cycle should last from 30 to 60 seconds, depending on

your rest period, how often your lungs need air and how much energy you have wasted in moving too quickly. The need for a lifeguard cannot be stressed too greatly for experiments. At first, it is easy to panic and get a mouthful of water. But finally, you will become so proficient that you can run through the drown-proofing cycle in your sleep.

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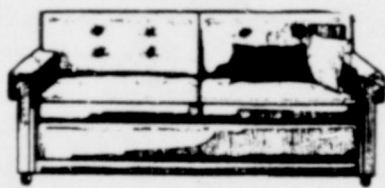

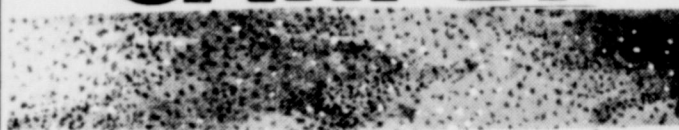

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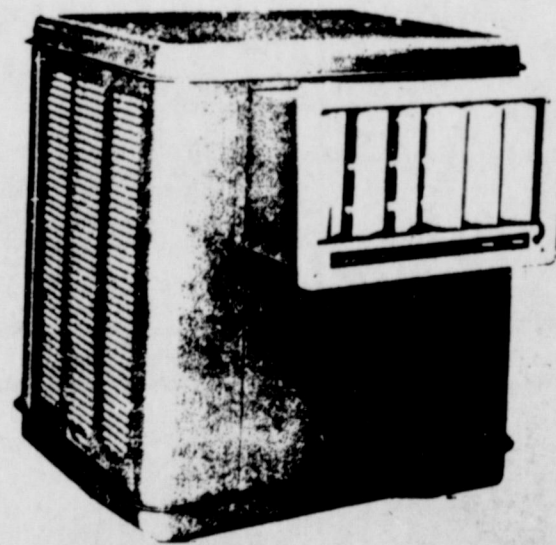
