DRAW BLACK FOR DEATH

From **Maverick Tales True Stories of Early Texas**

In Tropical Mexico, motorists driving west from the port of Vera Cruz along the old Highway 140 toward Mexico City pass a rugged volcanic mountain. It is crested with a formation resembling an old treasure chest. This is the peak named Cofre de Perote, the Coffin of Perote. A mile or so beyond, in a dreary, windswept plain is the little town of Perote. Near the village and hulking over it is a sombre old fort, the Castle of San Carlos. To the men of three luckless Southwestern expeditions the castle was known as the Prison of Perote.

First were those taken prisoner when an expedition from Austin attempted to extend Texan influence toward Santa Fe in 1841. Next were the prisoners taken when Mexico sent a punitive raid in return, into San Antonio. The third group were those captured when Texas retaliated to the San Antonio foray. The last of the three expeditions saw one of the deadliest episodes in Southwestern history: the drawing of the beans, where a black bean meant execution within minutes. That expedition also saw a dramatic escape.

When the viceroy of Mexico, Marquis de Guillas, started construction of the palace two hundred years ago, he designed a fortress that was intended to keep every foe out and every prisoner in. By the standards of 1770 he built well. First there was the essential fort itself, about eight hundred feet square with a long bastion projecting at each corner. The walls were at least thirty feet high, built of honeycombed volcanic rock of a brittle hardness. Fourteen feet thick were the walls at their base, tapering as they rose, with battlements for cannon along the top. Around the inside of the walls ran a wide platform for the guns; the floor of this platform was also a thick ceiling for cells beneath—cells about 18 by 30 feet.

Within the walled area, separated from the outer walls by a space of sixty feet, was an inner square structure, two stories high. In it were the living quarters for those at the castle: barracks on the ground floor, officers' quarters above. And in the center of this structure was a central patio about five hundred feet square. Beneath its thick, paved surface was a massive reservoir for water, filled by an underground stream.

Outside the main walls ran a moat, about a hundred feet wide and perhaps twenty deep, dry until the massive water-gates were lifted to flood the ditch in an emergency. There was only one entrance, entered by a drawbridge over the moat. But the fortifications did not end there. Around the outside of the moat ran a low stone wall, and fifty feet beyond that was the chevaux de frise, the horse-stopping fence of pointed wooden posts about twelve feet high. Outside the fence was another ditch fourteen feet wide, its outer bank piled almost as high as the posts. The

total area within this ditch was about twenty-five acres.

The original purpose was to serve as a secondary defense back of the port of Vera Cruz. As a practical matter, most of its years saw it used as a prison.

Whether castle or prison, it is doubtful that a certain Texan colonel named Hugh McLeod had ever heard of the place when he rode from Austin in June, 1841. Even if he had known about Perote it would have been unimportant at that moment, for he was heading north, not south. His column of three hundred and twenty men, with fourteen heavy wagons loaded with merchandise and followed by a brass sixpounder cannon on a field carriage, was headed toward Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Or it might be better to say Santa Fe, Texas. When Texas won its independence from Mexico five years earlier, the young republic had claimed all of the land west to the Rio Grande. And Santa Fe lies east of that river, by a few miles.

Was the Texan Santa Fe Expedition a convoy of pioneer settlers moving to new lands? A military expedition sent to establish Texas' authority over a remote corner of the republic? A good-will tour of merchants who hoped to open a southern branch of the Santa Fe Trail? Or a highly-publicized project of President Lamar of Texas, to take the people's minds off the depression that was plunging Texas into financial difficulties? Anyone who seeks can find affirmative evidence and negative proof on any of these points. Officially the men were known as the Santa Fe Pioneers. One thing was certain, it was a company of gentleman adventurers heading, each with his own purpose, out across a land unknown to all but a few guides. And even the guides would become lost before the journey ended.

They thought the distance was about five hundred miles. By today's highways it is just over seven hundred miles and is often driven in a single day. But they took a wide detour, and were about four months on the trail. Even today, a trip across the Llano Estacado, the Staked Plains of the Texas Panhandle, is no pleasure jaunt in July. Hugh McLeod was 27 and a West Pointer. At the start, the choice of him as commander seemed wise enough; the men moved smartly and with military discipline. Before the last water hole was reached, months later, there was proof that West Point in McLeods time had offered no courses in prairie travel.

But they were on their way gaily, with their own small band of a few fifes, four bugles, a couple of clarinets, and drums. They moved easily, under no pressure to make fast time. A day's march was anywhere from four to seventeen miles across the rolling countryside.

Around the campfires the men came to know each other's life story; a common topic in remote places, where men either tell a great deal about themselves—or nothing at all. A newspaperman named George Kendall, from the New Orleans Picayune, was along to record everything. He was a Richard Harding David, a Floyd Gibbons, or an Ernie Pyle, ahead of his time.

Insurance Rates To Drop 25% Annually

The State Board of Insurance has entered an order changing seven counties, including Eastland County, from the North-Northwest (Inland) rating territory to the Central (Inland) rating territory for Extended Coverage Insurance. This change is to be effective June 2, 1975.

As originally drafted the order proposed that the Central (Inland) rates would have applied; however after modification this change is going to be effected over a period of time. The rates to be used are the North-Northwest (Inland) rates less 25 percent for a period of one year. Actually this will mean the rates in Eastland

County will be approximately what they were a year ago, as there was a statewide increase in extended coverages rates in January, 1975. This 25 percent reduction will be made annually until such time that the rates for these seven counties are the same as the Central (Inland) rates or until a new rating territory for North-Central and South-North-Northwest counties is created. This is in accordance with the procedure of the State Board of Insurance of limiting a rate change to 25 percent at any time. This information was also contained in a recent bulletin to insurance agents from the Texas Association of Insurance Agents.

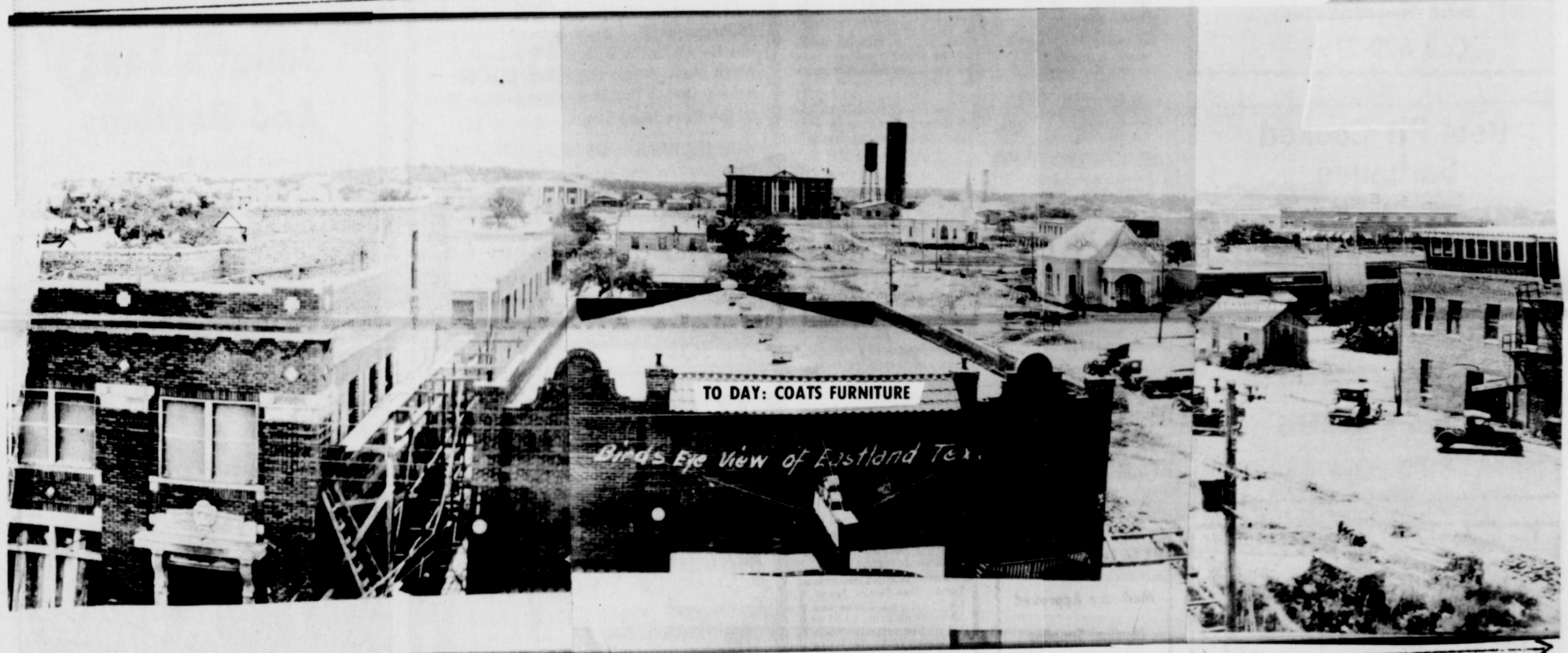

When World War I came along and the United States became involved, the drafting of young men for service in the armed forces affected the local communities as it did for communities all over the United States.
The able drafters were hauled away by train to a military training camp for preparation to enter battle to protect and preserve the freedom of our great young nation. The training camps were hastily set up with tents to house the new soldiers while in training. As soon as the training period was completed the new army units were shipped to the war zones to take their places with the allies to help destroy the aggressor.
There were two cousins in a local community who were drafted together in the very beginning. They trained together and were shipped to the war area with the first American soldiers to enter active battle participation. On the very first assault when the new American soldiers "went over the top" which meant coming out of the trenches to confront and attack the enemy, one of the cousins was hit by enemy gunfire in the mouth from the side. The bullet knocked out the upper front teeth. He fell back into the trench and was carried back to the field hospital which was set up and equipped to care for battlefield injuries. The soldier was treated and finally returned to the States where he was fitted with a bridge and his teeth looked so normal they could not be distinguished from his natural teeth. This cousin was given a medical discharge and a pension for the rest of his life.
The other cousin went on to participate in many battles. He learned that his training instructor was trying to teach him the proper way to jab his bayonet into the body of an enemy. If it is not done properly, he would have to fire his rifle to remove the bayonet from the body. Many of the enemy was removed from service by this cousin's bayonet. He went through the entire war without receiving a single wound. He returned to civilian life in the States but received no disability pension for the rest of his life.

GORDON SPOT

All livestock owners, especially sheep and goat raisers, who are interested in coyote control should attend a meeting at the First National Bank in Cisco, Tuesday night at 8 p.m. It will be decided at this meeting whether or not to hire a predatory animal trapper for Eastland County.

There will be plenty of baling wire available this year. That promise was made by a representative of a major baling wire manufacturer in Colorado. The representative called us on the phone to give us this information. He didn't say what the price will be.

Last week we got a lot of calls concerning peach fall. Dr. Earl Puls, Extension Horticulturist, says it is caused by the late freeze in March. Some damaged fruit stay on the tree and actually grows for a month or two before falling.

If you haven't sprayed your pecan trees already, this is the week to spray. May 28 or 29 will be a good time if you are going to spray one time. If you want

better control you will need to spray twice, about May 26 and June 2. Often insecticides are applied too early for optimum control.

Effective insecticides include Guthion, Malathion, Thiodan, Toxophene, Sevin, or Zolone. Before using any of these materials read the label directions; then follow them carefully.

Although more vegetables varieties are becoming available that have resistance to common diseases, disease control is still a major part of home gardener vegetable production.

Proper cultural practices play a major role in the prevention of disease problems. These practices will reduce the need for fungicides later in the season.

Take the following steps to have a disease-free garden:

1. Choose a well-drained area.
2. Prepare the soil properly.
3. Plant disease-resistant varieties if they are available.
4. Use disease-free transplants where available.
5. Use fertilizer wisely to encourage maximum growth.
6. Plant crops when the soil temperature is correct to reduce losses from seedling disease.
7. Water properly to reduce diseases.

8. Use mulches around plants to prevent fruit rot.
9. Control weeds as they often serve as hosts for vegetable disease.
10. Use the proper row spacing to improve air circulation and reduce foliage disease.
11. Alternate plantings of the same crop to prevent buildup of a disease.
12. Rotate crops to prevent a buildup of soil diseases.
13. Control insects as they spread virus diseases.
14. Harvest vegetables at the proper stage of maturing to avoid storage decay.
15. Keep the garden clean of trash and debris where diseases can build up.
16. Use fungicides to control disease that have become established.

Following these practices will go a long way in keeping disease problems to a minimum in the home vegetable garden. A new publication, "Disease Prevention in the Home Garden," is available at the county Extension office and provided additional information on diseases in vegetable gardens.

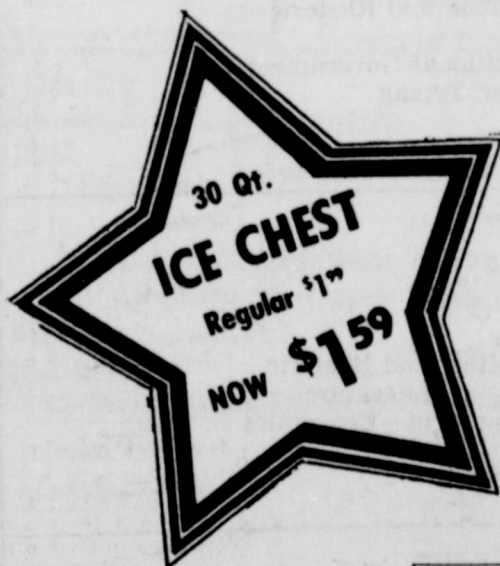

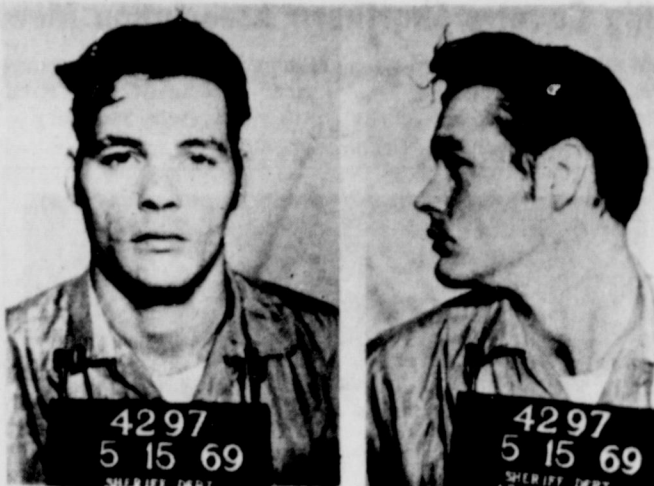

contacted immediately he said. He emphasized the danger of trying to apprehend the two.

Eastland County officials have been alerted that two men who were convicted in Eastland in 1969 have escaped from prisons in Kansas and Oklahoma.

Dist. Atty. Emory Walton said Friday, "There are certain officials here that are being alerted" about the escapees by convicted murderers Harvey Dale Webb and Donald Eugene Richardson, both about 28.

Webb was sentenced to 75 years in Eastland April 15, 1969, for rape, and Richardson was convicted for felony theft on May 27, 1969. Both men escaped the Eastland County Jail after they were convicted and went on a spree of robberies and violence, finally killing a man in Orange County.

They were recaptured about nine months later in a shootout with police in Oklahoma City.

Webb escaped Thursday - from the Federal Penitentiary in Fort Leavenworth, Kan., while Richardson had escaped from the Oklahoma State Prison in Stringtown about a month ago.

The District Attorney said the family of a girl who had been raped by Webb was also alerted.

Richardson is a former Sweetwater man, Walton said, and Webb gave his address as Shreveport, La., at the time he was convicted.

Fort Worth authorities also issued a lookout alert for Webb and said he is possibly headed this way with Richardson.

The police broadcast said the men may be together and reportedly had threatened the lives of some "officials" in Tarrant County here. The officials were not named.

Webb was described as "extremely dangerous".

Webb was one of a trio who kidnapped a young Fort Worth man and his date in 1968 and became the object of a

Flowe Arranging, with an instructor yet to be announced; First Aid, conducted by Larry Simpson; Photography, taught by Olin Odom III, and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation, with an instructor to be announced.

A complete schedule of times and fees will be announced in a short time. Dean Bint stated. He did say, however, that the fees would be minimal, ranging from \$5.00 to \$16.00 in most cases, with the Ceramics class costing approximately \$25.00.

Mr. Bint said that a class would have to enrol at least ten persons in order to be held, and that any community-service course would be offered if there were ten or more requesting it, and providing a qualified instructor could be obtained.

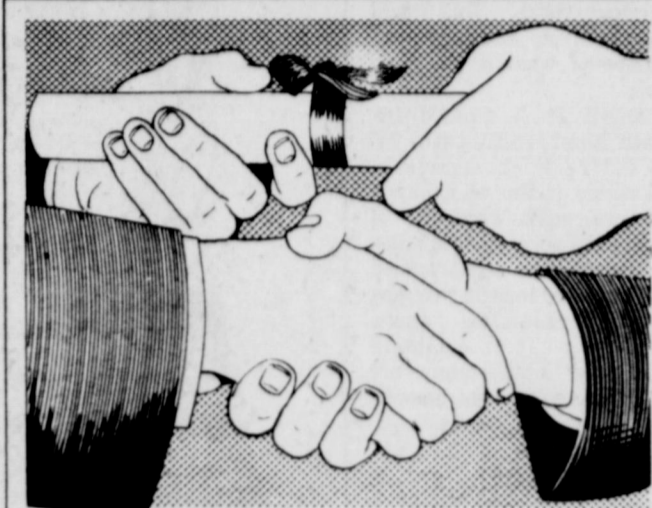

In story book manner, the drama relates the car with which anonymity was made certain...how the selection was made...how an ordinary American, a Chicago orphan, as a sergeant in France was chosen and ordered to walk into a room and place a bouquet of roses on one of four unidentified caskets...how Sergeant Younker placed the bouquet and thus made a selection which he later described as God's choice.

The tomb of the Unknown Soldier is more than a symbol of sentiment. It is an American voice which gives thanks to the glory of God that we as Americans, can and do respect the honor and memory of our departed ones, soldiers and civilians alike.

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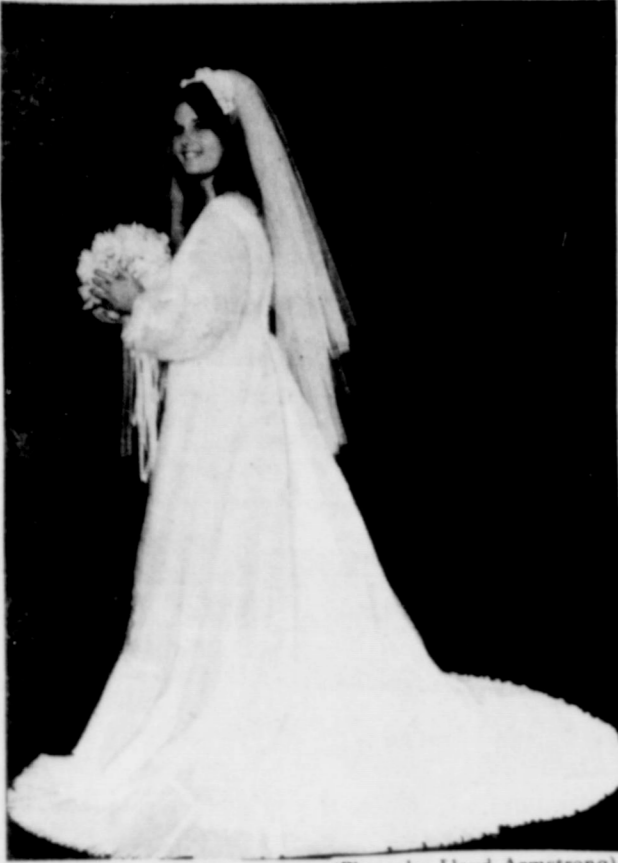

"As it looks from here"

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- NATIONS, LIKE MANY INDIVIDUALS dealing with one another, practice a primary policy of, "What's in it for us." And they should to the extent necessary to protect their national interests.

IT IS ABOUT TIME WE ASK OURSELVES THAT SAME QUESTION. In years past, and particularly since the end of World War II, we have too much ignored this question on our own behalf and looked more simply on what is good for someone else.

AT A TIME WHEN THERE IS SEEMINGLY A MOVE TO CHANGE OUR ATTITUDE towards Castro's Cuba, this query has all the legitimacy of common sense.

IT WAS POINTED OUT IN THIS RELEASE ON MARCH 7, 1974, THAT rumblings were in motion indicating a softening of our Government's attitude toward Cuba and subtle overtures to change our relationship were in the making.

THIS IS NOW DEVELOPED INTO A REAL PROBABILITY AND, PARTICULARLY, since Latin American countries who are with us in the Organization of American States tend to feel that Cuba's subversive threat toward them in less than it was a few years ago. There is sentiment inside the O.A.S. to dissolve the collective embargo placed against Cuba soon after Castro's revolution. In other words, each nation would be free to act in lifting their embargo and re-establishing relations.

IN FACT THERE IS A REAL CAMPAIGN IN THE WESTERN HEMISPHERE TO re-establish these relations which, of course, would be a major victory for Fidel Castro.

It would be the great achievement which he has sought since 1959, but on his own terms.

THIS CAMPAIGN HAS BEEN FURTHERED BY THE RECENT VISIT TO CUBA by two United States Senators - one a Democrat and the other a Republican. They recently visited Havana without the approval of the State Department, presumably as self-appointed emissaries to establish new contacts.

THESE SENATORS WERE GREETED UPON THEIR ARRIVAL BY HARANGUING attacks on the United States in a speech by Castro which lasted about one hour and a half. Evidently, these Senators endured taunts and insults hurled at us but didn't pack their bags and head back home. Rather, they had dinner with Castro and were subsequently entertained by him.

NOTHING IS BEING SAID OF WHAT WE SHOULD EXPECT FROM Marxist Castro in exchange for the lifting of the embargo by the Organization of American States or for any recognition that may be extended by our Government. This is a time when it seems perfectly legitimate for us to ask, "What's in it for us?" What's in it for us requires among other things a satisfactory answer on the Russian military bases now

in Cuba. They would not be there if not for aggression against Latin America, the United States or Canada. Their removal should be a condition of any re-establishment of relations.

THIS SHOULD BE THE FIRST REQUIREMENT, FOLLOWED BY assurances that Castro will not continue to train, equip and support Communist activities in other American states. This would mean a free and open inspection of what is going on there.

THERE IS A CLAIM OF MORE THAN \$1.5 BILLION BY U.S. CITIZENS whose property was seized in the revolution. How we could recognize a Communist government 90 miles off the Florida coast loaded with offensive missile weapons without resolving these questions to complete satisfaction, is certainly not getting any part of the answer as to what's in it for us.

I.R.S. Rates Will Jump To 9%

Dallas, Texas - The interest rate for taxpayers who are delinquent in paying Federal tax bills, or have been granted extensions of time to file, will jump to 9 percent per year beginning July 1, 1975, according to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

A.W. McCannless, district director of IRS operations in North Texas, said today that the higher interest rate will be charged on all overdue taxes as a result of legislation enacted on January 1, 1975. The present rate is 6 percent per year on most taxes.

The government, which now pays 6 percent per year on overpayments by taxpayers, will also pay 9 percent interest starting July 1. Interest becomes payable if the overpayment is refunded to a taxpayer more than 45 days from the due date
