Eastland County Producers Alerted To Disaster Payments Eligibility

Producers in Eastland county are being alerted to the disaster payment provisions of the 1975 feed grain, wheat and cotton programs administered the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. (ASCS).

We want to do all we can to explain how producers become eligible for prevented planting and low yield payments, David Martin said. Prevented planting means that the farmer is unable to plant because a severe natural disaster, or the disaster conditions beyond the farmer's control striking at planting time, prevented him from planting at anytime during the planting period. Low yield is when a disaster seriously affects the potential yield of a crop after planting. In the case of wheat and feed

grains, if the producer is prevented by a disaster from planting an acreage of annual nonconserving crop at least equal to the sum of his wheat and feed grain allotments, he may qualify for a prevented planting payment. Low yield payments apply

only to program crops of wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley and upland cotton that have been planted, and when a disaster totally destroys the



patriotic individual, Eastland immediately volunteered for the War of Independence, and served as a first lieutenant, Company F., of Burleson's Regiment of Volunteers at the Battle of San Jacinto, where Texas finally won her independence from Mexico.

Although Eastland remained an officer in the fighting forces of Texas, he was allowed to return home, and engaged in the sawmill and lumber business. His first wife died in 1837 and in 1839 he married Louise M. Smith.

It seemed that the Mexicans would not accept defeat, and on March 5, 1842, General Vaquez invaded San

Hemphill for the troops to march to Gonzales and be disbanded. About three hundred men decided to disregard instructions and continue the march into Mexico. Eastland, who had by this time been promoted to captain, was in charge of one of the companies formed. This small army was soon overcome in a battle fought at the border town of Mier, Mexico, and on December 26, 1842, was forced to surrender.

They were at first imprisoned in Mexico City, and by February, were moved to the Hacienda of Salado. Here, still supported by their fighting spirit, they overcame their guards and

During the war between the United States and Mexico. Major Walter P. Lane, on a scouting expedition to San Luis Potosi, made a detour to Salado and the remains of these gallant men were exhumed. Brought under escort to La Grange, they were placed in a brick vault on a hill overlooking the Colorado River and the city. Their last resting place is now known as Monument Hill.

Thus ends the story of the man for whom Eastland County was named. Its forefathers chose well when they picked this brave servant of the cause of independence to honor as long as the county is in existence.

A completed oil well on the land started the flowing of money into his bank account and with wise investments in buildings in the town and other investments soon made him a very wealthy man. Added investments began to turn out not so good and soon the man found he was not so wealthy and finally had to get a job to provide a living for his family. He was able to get a job as a right of way agent buying easements for a new pipeline that was to be built through the country. He went to the home of a land owner to buy his first easement. As he went into the living room, the first thing he saw was his old organ that started it all.

San Angelo Auction

Lamb trade continued steady to strong this week. East Coast dressed trade hovered just under that seemingly unattainable \$100 mark at mostly \$98 to spots \$99 oh choice and prime 35-55 pound carcasses, \$96 on 55-65 pound spring lamb and on oldcrop

The San Angelo auction sparked up considerably Wednesday, regaining most of the ground it had lost last week. However, Texas springers, top-ping at \$48-\$48.50, were still under the \$50 mark common in other places across the country. Choice and prime springers in San Angelo were quoted at \$46.50-48.50, mostly \$47-48.30, some mixed fats and feeders \$46-46.50, shorn oldcrop fat lambs topping at \$43.50. Choice and fancy spring feeders were mainly \$43-46, a scattering of oldcrop feeders \$39-42.

One of the last original bag mohair accumulations in Texas has been sold, about 160,000 pounds of adult at \$1.85 per pound and 130,000 pounds of kid at \$3.85. Sales were made by Ranchman's Wool & Mohair in Ingram and by associated warehouses in Rocksprings, Kerrville and Brownwood. Dale Priour, manager, said some growers had sold off part of their adult hair earlier, but much of the kid had remained. Western Wool & Mohair Co., San Angelo, offered 250,000 pounds of 12 months at sealed bid Wednesday and at press time appeared to have sold most of it. Prices ranged from 55 cents up to the "low 80's" most of the better wool 70-80 cents. Clean prices were estimated at \$1.60-1.65 on the
