

# No School Tax Increase, Now, As Board Takes 'Wait & See'

Eastland public school students have over another month of summer vacation, and Eastland school tax payers have another year, and perhaps two, of no increase in school taxes.

That's the word from Supt. Ray Pruitt who reports that the School Board is holding the tax line this year, waiting to see what develops out of Austin later. It had been feared on many fronts that tax increases were "right around this corner".

There's already been some financing changes but all in all, Supt. Pruitt says, things are going to shake down to pretty much a status similar to last year.

Student will be looking forward to an August 18 school

opening, and teachers will report August 11. Staff assignments are virtually complete, the superintendent reports.

Miss Dianne Young will return as Kindergarten teacher and Mrs. Craig (Jan) Beskow and Bob Blair have been named teachers for the two Fifth Grade units. Mr. Blair will be in charge of maths and sciences. Coach Don Adair will begin a physical education program in the Elementary from grades three through six, in the mornings and have coaching duties in the afternoon.

Newly named head basketball coach is Joe Bagwell who comes to Eastland from Pine Bluff, Ark. A graduate of the College of the Ozarks, he

has some ten years coaching experience.

Don Griffin has been added to the school's expanded vocational education program and the double - in - size vocational facilities are almost complete with a great deal of additional equipment.

Also named for teaching staff at Elementary School are Mildred Adair, Loys Allmand, Patsy Coats, Jan Cooper, Christy Dallas, Hazel Green, Opal Little, Rebecca Siebert, Mildred Turner, Elizabeth Welch, and Marjorie Young.

Eastland's local fund assignment (the amount eh district sends to Austin) has been increased this year from \$78,000 to \$102,000 with prospects of another big increase for the following year, and estimates of upwards of \$63,000 for the next two years.

On the other side of the ledger, based on the new weighted program of revenue of \$90, per ADA, Eastland which has been getting some \$24,000, will now get about \$60,000, so with the increases it'll all pretty well average out.

So the board is taking a "wait and see" approach, holding off tax increases as long as possible, but knowing that in the near future things will decidedly point in that direction.

Realizing that much remodeling and updating is needed at both the Senior and Junior High School plants, the board like most in Eastland, are waiting to see if a sudden influx of enrollment comes and hopes to be ready to move when the time comes.

So as summer moves along, there's still breathing time for vacationing students and for the time being, breathing time for tax payers in Eastland.

## County Working On Land Heritage

AUSTIN -- County Judge Scott Bailey and Texas Historical Commission chairman Mike Collins are working with the Texas Department of Agriculture in registering area farmers and ranchers who qualify for honors in the Family Land Heritage Program for 1975.

The program gives recognition to those who have kept land in the family for 100 years or more, maintaining continuous agricultural operations. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White explained.

Last year over 560 families qualified for certificates and inclusion in the Family Land Heritage Registry, which contains brief histories of all the farms and ranches, the names of current owners, and pictures of early settlers.

"The Texas Department of Agriculture has received many requests for the Registry -- from universities, historians, and government agencies. It provides an interesting record of agriculture in the early days of Texas, as well as anecdotes about members of the families."

"We also included notations on the 100 - year - old structures on the property, no matter what condition. This information can be invaluable to researchers," White stated.

"For this reason, we are trying to register all those who qualify -- not only to give these people some recognition, but also to have a permanent record of pioneer agricultural producers in Texas."

Applications forms are available from the county judge's office.

An Eastland County wildcat drilled 16 miles south of Cisco has been completed as a Marble Falls lime discovery.

It is Rhodes Drilling Co. of Abilene No. 1-B J.F. Cooper spotting 1,560 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of F. Vorn Bauman Survey, A-699.

Daily potential was 24 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water. Flow was through a 12-64 inch choke with 325 pounds casing and 75 pounds tubing pressures.

It is producing from perforations at 2,911-27 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 300 sacks of sand. Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 3,003 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,021 feet.

### Service Academy Applications Being Accepted

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Omar Burleson reminds young men who are interested in competing for nominations to the service academies, for the class entering July 1976, he uses a competitive method of selection so that all young men who meet the necessary requirements may be considered.

The service academies are the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland; the Military Academy at West Point, New York; the Air Force Academy near Colorado Springs, Colorado; and the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, New York. Burleson stresses that political influence is not a factor in his nominations to the Academies. The important thing is not who you know but what you are.

Interested young men who meet the above requirements should write Congressman Omar Burleson, House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., 20515 no later than July 16. Examinations will then be scheduled as a rating device to set up slates for nomination. The competition is keen but Congressman Burleson wants to assure that all young men who are interested in a military career may have an opportunity to compete for nomination.

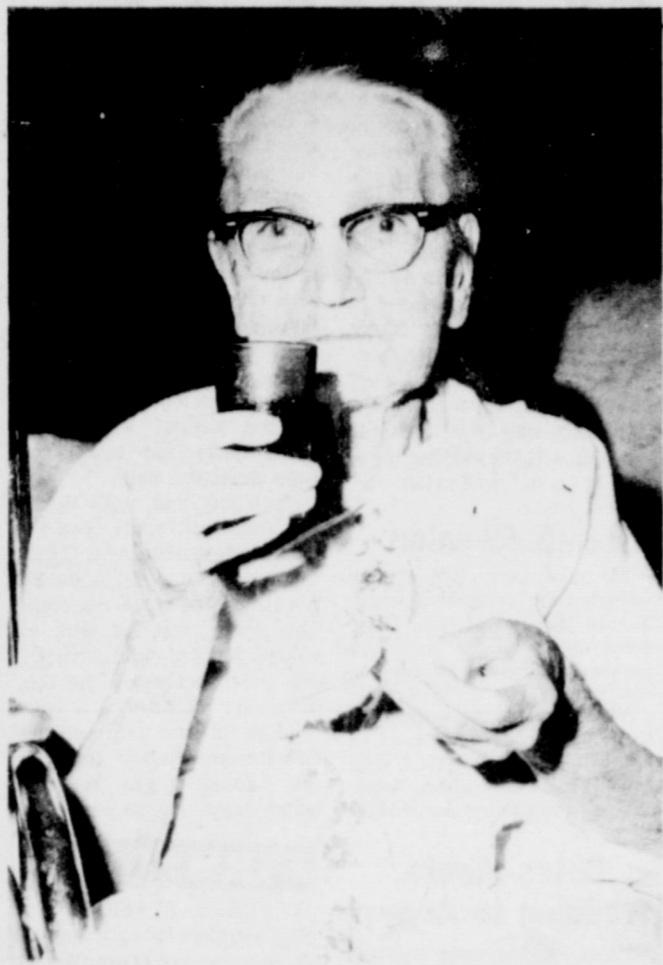

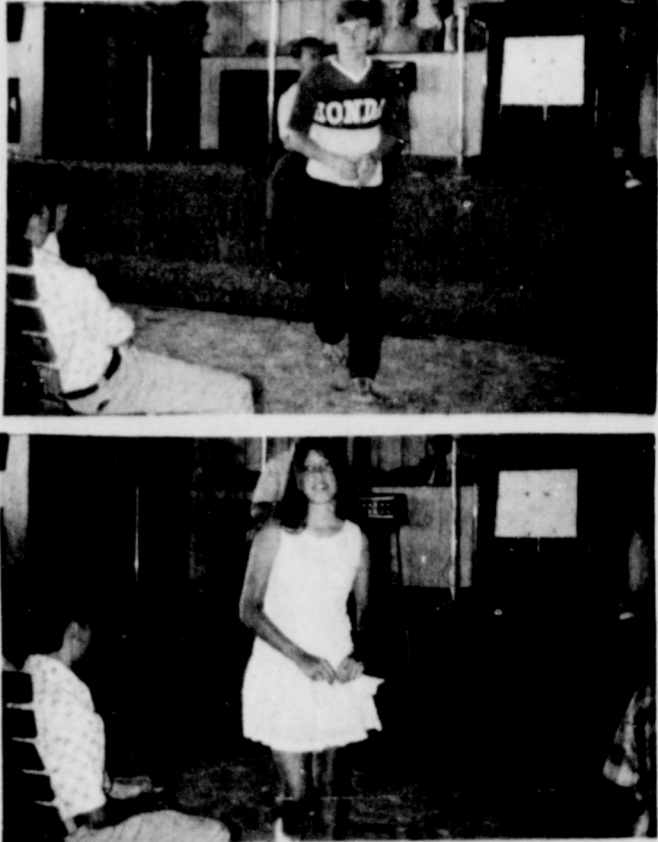
COLLEGE STATION --- What's in store for cattlemen as far as prices are concerned for the remainder of 1975?

"Although there's optimism in some circles due to current stronger market prices and an increase in cattle feeding, it's a little early for cattlemen to begin cheering," contends Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "In fact, producers may be in for another drop in market prices as the year moves along."

So Uvacek advises cattlemen to market or contract calves early and cull old cows as soon as possible.

What are the reasons for Uvacek's gloomy outlook? First of all, the supply of grain - fed beef should increase during the second half of the year. Fed cattle marketings are expected to be about 9 percent larger during the last six months of 1975 than during the first half of the year.

Increased cow liquidations will also boost the total beef supply. Uvacek expects cow slaughter to increase 42 percent during the last half of 1975 compared to the first six months of the year.
