

FUNDS SOUGHT

Volunteer Firemen Apply For Rural Truck

ng to Eastland in the form of badly-needed equipment and services, if action initiated by the Eastland Volunteer Fire Dept., and plans formulated by that group, can be completed

The Volunteer Firemen's project would add a powerful and well-equipped fire fighting truck to their arsenal of equipment, to be used primarily for fighting rural fires in the Eastland area. Volunteer Chief Jack Graham

reports that the local department has been notified that their application for the equipped truck has been approved and that delivery could be expected within from 90 to 120 davs

The plan was initiated by the

Volunteers through the Texas Surplus Property Agency, in which an Army surplus "6 by 6" truck can be secured by the department. The truck would be equipped by the Texas Forest Service at Lufkin with a 750gallon water tank, pumps,

nose, a winch and a siren.

Cost to the department will be \$3,500 to be raised by the department in projects and contributions, Chief Graham reported.

The Volunteers will begin immediately accepting donations to the project, and these may be directed to the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department, Eastland, 76448

Rigging and development of the truck should begin immediately in that the department made immediate arrangements to send their share of the total

The truck will be capable of andling the local rural fire fighting chores with its sixwheel drive and will be a valuable addition to the department's equipment

The local department has also been advised of training programs consisting of training in equipment operation, ground cover fires, structural and fire behavior tactics, which is available from the Forest service.



No matter how many checks you write, you pay No Service Charge, if your monthly balance stays over \$300.00.

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
